U. S. ASKS DEATH PENALTY AGAINST AIDE OF NELSON

John Paul Chase, California Gambler, Goes on Trial For Cowley Slaying

WOMAN WILL TESTIFY

Widow of Gangster Expected To Take Stand as Major Federal Witness

CHICAGO, March 28 (AP)—John Cowley, slain machine-gunning gang boss, was slain from records of the law today as the federal government made its demand for a death penalty under the federal court case involving the murder of a government employe.

The defendant was John Paul Chase, California bootlegger and gambler. He is accused of killing the slain gang boss, John Paul Cowley, an inspector of the justice department, Bureau of investigation. He is the first murder case since 1893.

Killed in Gun-Fight Cowley died last November, with federal agent, Herman E. Hollis, in a gunning highway fight with George "Baby Face" Nelson, leader of the Dillinger gang, and a companion.

The government recovered the body, but it was riddled with bullet holes except for a blanket, which was found in a Chicago suburb, 30 miles from the scene of the fight at Barrington, Ill.

Nelson, now and a tentative ally will be one of the government witnesses. He is expected to be brought to the trial from the reformatory where he is serving a term for a similar offense. He is the husband of Justice Charles C. Dillinger's attorney, Dwight H. Green, who is expected to talk freely on the witness stand.

Chase was arrested with Nelson and his companion, Fred Barker, in a fight with federal agents in Chicago. He is now in the custody of the federal government.

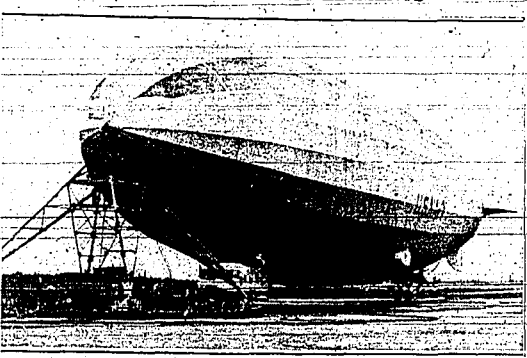

Your Garden

Water has been a decorative garden feature for thousands of years. A pool imparts a sense of coolness and adds immediate interest to the garden plan.

A pool of still water offers a feeling of serenity and the beauty of reflection. The cascade or the fountain, which is part of some water features.

This small pool, above, its construction 10000, fits harmoniously into a natural landscape. The majority of the pool-planting plan (cut-tails, umbrella-plant, hedges) is entirely hidden by the appearance of the pool. The screen planting will eventually separate the pool more distinctly from the general lawn, and will be harmonious and beautiful.

Let the construction of the pool be substantial, best of reinforced concrete, or brick, or of tile, while the informal pool has a curb of naturalistic rock.

The rectangular, well proportioned pool, shown above, is a good example of a formal pool in a formal garden. The stately trellis at the end, the bank on one side and the open hedge on the left confine the garden.

Although the hybrid water lilies are numerous and lovely, they make it impossible for the pool to catch a complete reflection of the trellis and the tall vase. A pool in this position needs only the reflection of the sky and its surroundings to give it life and color.

A very few plants, with a smaller texture of leaf, might be better than the water lilies.

The setting of the pool must be considered in planning its margin. A reflecting pool may have a very simple marginal planting or none at all, while a pool that is a feature of a rock garden must have its margin planted as a continuation of the planting in the garden.

EXPERT ADVISES CARE OF GARDEN

Pleasure and Profit Depends On Energy You Expend, Says Prof. Tucker

MOSCOW (Special)—The degree of pleasure and profit you will get from your garden depends on the great deal upon the care you put into planning and execution, says Prof. L. R. Tucker of the University of Idaho college of agriculture, department of horticulture.

—The plan which—about—has been handled well in advance of planting is the application of well-kept budget. The rate of about 20 tons per acre, Prof. Tucker says, is the best.

—Tucker advises, and work this measure well into the soil. Prowl soon as the ground has reached the crumbly stage and can be worked freely without packing.

—Whatever the size of the garden, Prof. Tucker emphasizes the point to "never—dig—when—planning—first—plan to get the largest possible returns from the garden, and second, plan to get the largest possible returns from the labor expended."

—To make best use of your garden, Prof. Tucker says, the gardener will allow, planting quick-maturing crops between rows of wider spaced slow-maturing crops, and making repeated plantings of quick-maturing crops to assure a continuous supply.

—To make the best use of your labor, take advantage of all labor-saving devices available. Plan the crops most frequently used near the house, and the least frequently used in the garden.

—If the garden is large, if it is small use hand implements which will accomplish a maximum
