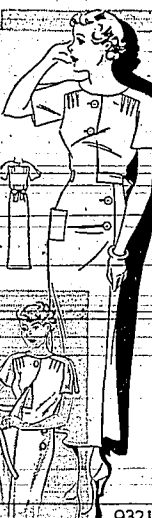

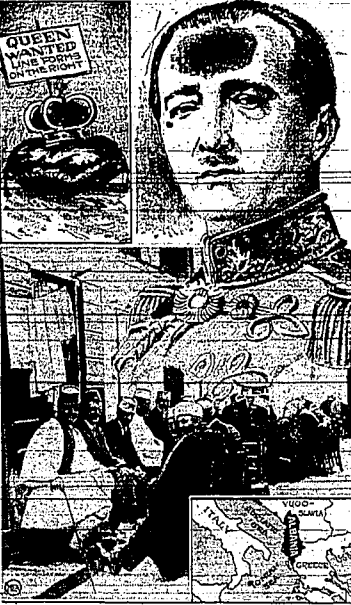
Here You Are, Girls—Wed King Zog If You Possess Mere Million a Year

LONDON — Assuming, girls, that you have an income of a million dollars a year, there are a few points you ought to consider before you take ship for Tirana, Albania, to play for that vacant job as queen.

The only bachelor king in Europe, who has decided he'd like to see you, is King Zog, who has a million a year, which is much the same thing.

He's willing to have you—no lock—among the big end of royalty remaining in Europe. He's willing to wed an American girl with an advanced—mild—ability, good looks, and a million a year. Who wouldn't be you?

In the first place, King Zog disputes with Lega Dismog the title of "Albanian king." You must know what happened to Lega. As King Zog's queen, you'd be almost certain to have never a dull moment. For somebody who is always taking a vacation, he's a busy man.

Constant Fidget

In 1924, one of Albania's political enthusiasts really plotted the king's death. He was in a Vienna hospital, his car was pulled in and Diamond's fashion, but he escaped.

MICHIGAN CANAL EFFORT RESUMED

Plans for 30-Mile Waterway Across Upper Peninsula Urged on FERA

GLADSTONE, Mich. (U.P.)—The proposed Au Train canal across the upper Michigan peninsula, connecting Lake Superior and Michigan, first suggested in 1887, again is receiving support here. State officials recently submitted the project to the federal reclamation administration for survey, study and preliminary planning.

The estimated cost is \$85,000,000. The canal would be 35 miles long and would reduce the cost of transporting iron and copper ores from northern Michigan and Minnesota to Chicago in addition to its advantages in national defense.

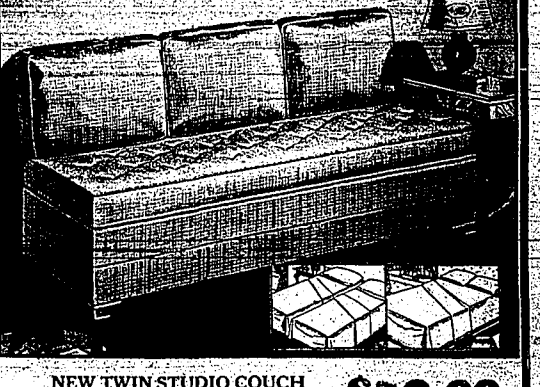

Most solicitous of Long's favor is C. E. Gates, state representative, who has indicated he will be a candidate for governor, lieutenant governor and United States senator next year. It was Long who introduced the unsuccessful resolutions inviting Long to address the legislature.

When Long vacationed at Hot Springs early in the winter one of the men he called from Little Rock to his hotel suite, was former Governor Don Terral. There has been much speculation of an alliance between Long and Terral for a United States senate campaign.

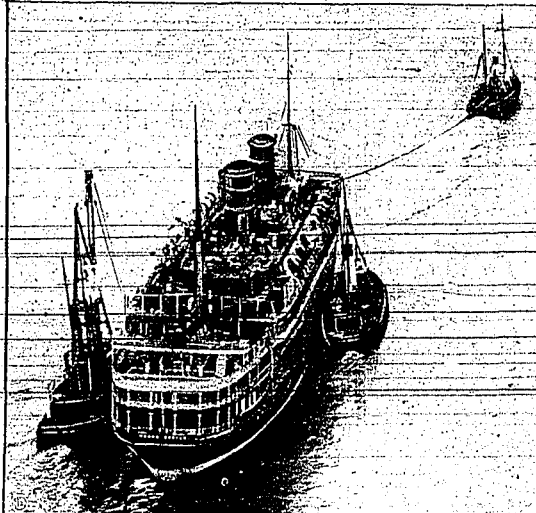

LAC DU FLAMBEAU, Wis.—The Lac du Flambeau Indian tribe, under new self-government, has approved plans for immediate construction of one of the great fish hatcheries in the United States. With a capacity of more than 100,000,000 game fish per year.

The plans include construction of the largest muskellunge, pike and bass rearing ponds ever attempted. Two entire lakes have been set aside by the tribe for propagation of these studies.

The fish will be used to stock only the lakes within the Abnott Reservation, which has a population of about 600 Chippewa Indians and is located in Vilas county, Wisconsin. The reservation has a total area of 144 square miles and is said to be the most concentrated lake region in Wisconsin, containing more than 300 spring-fed lakes.
