

## SENATE PONDERS CHANGES IN AAA

Amendment for Licensing of Processors Brings Fury To Witnesses

**By RALPH W. OLMIESTAD**  
WASHINGTON (Special) — The Senate committee on agriculture has been engaged during the Roman holiday considering senate bill 1867, sponsored by the department of agriculture. To the agriculture committee the bill was referred to by Secretary Wallace as "the magna charta of agriculture." Several changes are proposed which would affect processors and farm organizations are definitely favorable. One of the first important amendments provides for regular benefits "in kind." In other words, if a farmer reduces his wheat acreage under the agricultural program, his government would give him wheat as a benefit payment instead of cash, if he so desired. No appreciable objection was made to this proposal.

**Hander License**  
Another amendment provides for licensing all processors of agricultural commodities. Some form of developed high-grade measure over this amendment declaring that it would extend to retailers of canned goods. Senator Elmer Dashiell of Minnesota, a former member of the House of Representatives, asked the department replied, "so what?" and is supporting it. Another provision of the bill calls for licensing of all processors of farm commodities where a majority want to be licensed. Witnesses opposed to this provision were numerous. ## Europe Fearful Germany Will "Grab" At Strategic City of Memel on Baltic Sea

London—Now that the problem of returning the Saurz territory to Germany is solved, the Nazis are more further to distract European public opinion by buying other slices of land and making out they have resolved to the Third Reich.

And the first of these probably will be Memel.

In addition to the Saar, the territory — Germany — lost — by the way — Alsace-Lorraine, back to France; Upper and Lower Silesia, to Poland; North Schleswig to Denmark; and so-called Danzig, somewhat under Polish direction, the famous Polish corridor; cutting through German territory; the best part of Lower Silesia, given the city of Memel and the hinterland — to Lithuania. In addition, Germany is taking colonies.

Disputes in Alsace. Hitler declares that after Germany got back the Saar, there will be territorial disputes with France. They will be permanent to have given up all hope of Alsace-Lorraine. He is not like Hitler, who is not yet about Europe and Memel may be his good friend, France, and England. The same applies to Denmark, Poland, and the Netherlands. Hitler's colonies were mandated to England and her dominions to Japan and France, all first class territories. Hitler will not take them for the present.

Then remains Memel in possession of a weak little Baltic state, next Nazi objective. There is a history book of it. From 150 to 170 the 16th century Lithuanian prince Gediminas created a great power. It became united with Poland when the royal houses of the two countries intermarried.

The Nazis became so bold that they forced military operations to return of Memel territory. The Nazis alarmed the big German landholders and the new party was formed. Rosenberg, acting as judge, decided that the new party was the real power and should be called the Nazi Party. The old party was disbanded. Von Bassewitz

## 'WRITE-UP' BARED AT UTILITY PROBE

Duke Power Company Juggled  
Values to Pay Dividends,  
Board Fired

WASHINGTON, March 28 (UPI)—Heavy "write-up" of fixed capital in the Duke power utility's largest hydro-electric utility in the south, enabled payment of millions of dollars in dividends to stockholders, leading to probe, the federal trade commission was told today.

"Duke," controlled by the world's richest girl, is second largest stockholder in the company.

Roger E. Barnes, commissioner of the commission, told the "write-up" totalled \$29,697,133 on December 31, 1933. He was a witness in the holding into affairs of the company during the probe.

Barnes told the commissioners the write-up reached \$30,693,077 at the time of his departure on March 31, 1932, but subsequently were reduced about \$1,000,000 through elimination of the "inflated properties" as they were retitled.

Between 1931-33, Barnes said, the company paid dividends of \$1,000,000 a year, despite the "surplus created from the write-up" used in paying dividends while Duke Power Co., the largest stockholder, in underlying companies,
