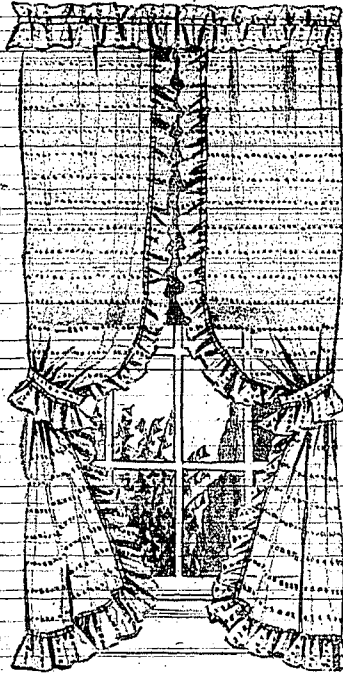

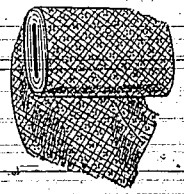

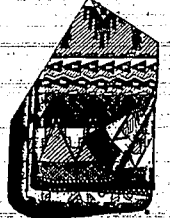

SENATE PONDERES CHANGES IN AAA

Amendment for Licensing of Processors Brings Fury To Witnesses

By ILLIUM W. OLIVESTAD
 WASHINGTON (Special)—The Senate committee on agriculture and forestry has been enjoying a Roman holiday consisting of Senate adjournment, referred to by Secretary Wallace as the "vacation chart" of agriculture. Several changes are proposed for the most part, farmers and farm organizations are definitely opposed. One of the first important amendments provides for the payment of rental benefits "in kind" in other words, if a farmer reduces his wheat acreage under the agricultural adjustment act, the government would give him wheat as a benefit payment instead of cash, if he so desired. No appreciable objection was made to this proposal.

Licensing of Processors
 Another amendment provides for licensing all processors of agricultural commodities. Several witnesses developed high displeasure over this amendment, declaring that it would extend to retailing of milk and other food stuffs. The department replied, "so what?" and is supporting it.

Another provision of the bill calls for licensing processors of agricultural commodities where a majority vote is to be had. This is somewhat different than the provision in the bill which proposes to license all processors whether they want to be licensed or not, and to license farmers if they desire.

Can Check Books
 The amendment which apparently filled the cup of processors' bitterness to overflowing, however, is a provision which requires the processor of agriculture to go into processing plants and accounts not only in connection with marketing agreements but for any purpose connected with the business. One witness representing a shipper association, became so enraged by this proposal as to make a vituperative speech, in which he contained in the bill, but they did not seem to wave the red flag.

TRADE HEARINGS
 During the past week the federal tariff commission conducted hearings to gather information to be used in negotiating trade treaties with Canada. Someone, apparently, spread the information in Idaho that the Administration had proposed to reduce the tariff on potatoes causing much concern. As a matter of fact, however, the administration was considering nothing of the sort. The conference considered all commodities and manufactured articles of whatever description to gather information for the purpose of the American "traveling salesman" who will haggle with Canada's officials. There was, so far as we can learn, no recommendation whatever that the tariff on Canadian potatoes be reduced. However, through the efforts of a few laboring "senators" from North Dakota, Hale of Maine, and Popo of Idaho, growers' bills were filed in opposition to any reduction of the tariff.

Europe Fearful Germany Will "Grab" At Strategic City of Memel on Baltic Sea

LONDON—Now that the problem of returning the Saar territory to Germany is solved, the Nazis are sure further to disturb European peace by turning their attention to other slices of land and asking that they be returned to the Third Reich.

And the first of these probably will be Memel.

In addition to the Saar, the territory to be returned to Germany by the League of Nations is as follows: Alsace-Lorraine, which to France; Euphrat and Malmedy, to Belgium; North Schleswig, to Denmark; Danzig, a free city, but somewhat under Polish direction; and the famous Polish port of Gdansk, through German territory; the best part of Upper Silesia, to Poland; the city of Vilna and the hinterland, to Lithuania. In addition, Germany has her claim on the Baltic coast.

Hitler declared that after Germany got back the Saar, there will be no more territorial questions with France. Thereby he seems permanently to have given up all hope of territorial expansion westward. He is to tackle little Belgium just west of Euphrat and Malmedy because of her strategic position in the English Channel. The same applies to Denmark's possession of North Schleswig. Her colonies were handed over to England and her dominions to Spain. Hitler has no territorial powers—and Hitler will not tackle them for the present.

Memel in possession of a weak little Baltic state and this is the reason it will be the Christian socialist's wish. The return of Memel territory to Germany is a marked socialist tendency. It became united with Poland when the royal house of the Saxe-Weimars intermarried.

When Poland was carved by Russia, Austria and Prussia, Lithuania, like Poland, shared her fate and became a Russian province. The World War set free all the Russian Baltic provinces which then became the independent states of Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia.

Disrupts Tradition
 Lithuania expected to get back the real Baltic tradition, which has been the capital of its ancient kingdom. But the Poles pulled a clever trick. They pulled the Lithuanian out of the Baltic and turned it over to Italy.

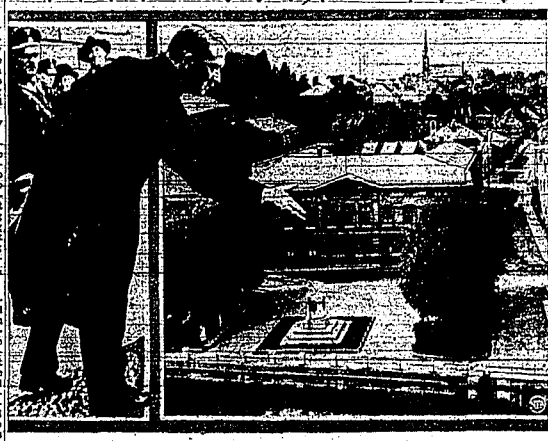
The Allies regarded the thing as a body of irregular Polish troops, seized Vilna, Poland, boss of Poland. The Allies were highly displeased by this action and it became a Polish city. Since then Lithuania has maintained relations to have any relations of any kind with Poland.

But blood
 Even when Germany was a real republic, there was bad blood over this. A German complaint was filed by the Hague Tribunal which, by its vote in 1921, decided that Lithuania never had a right to be challenged. Things have moved to fever heat since the Nazis came into power.

In Memel, Pastor von Bass formed a Christian socialist working union. Its avowed object was the return of Memel territory to Germany. It marked socialist tendencies alarmed the big German landed proprietors in Memel and a new civil Nazi party was formed. Its object was to secure the return of Memel territory to Germany, acting as judge, decided the new party was the real thing and voted the von Bass organization.

The Nazis became so bold that they formed military organizations based upon the model of German Storm Troopers and encouraged the teachers in the Memel schools to spread propaganda all in a day's work against Lithuania. They were stimulated from Germany. A notorious German adventurer established himself at Tilsit in German territory, from which to direct Nazi activities in Lithuania. Fearing that some day these people would organize a push on grab Memel, the head of the Lithuanian state promulgated a law dissolving the Nazi organizations, forbidding the wearing of Nazi uniforms and taking away from the Nazi parties their right to vote.

NEW INVENTION TELLS WEATHER

Instrument Reports Prevailing Conditions in Terms of Human Comfort

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (U.S.)—An instrument which analyzes temperature and relative humidity, and in a single reading indicates prevailing weather conditions in terms of personal comfort has been developed at Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

meteorology, designed the instrument. The device combines a bimetal thermometer and a hair-hygrometer which, reacting to temperature and humidity, register atmospheric conditions in a single reading. The air mass indicator, the instrument is known, is expected to be of special value for warning pilots of the dangerous conditions of temperature and humidity in which ice begins to form on airplane wings.

While it does not make weather forecasts, it analyzes prevailing weather conditions. Its operation is based on the knowledge that in an analysis of weather conditions, the most important factors are the temperature and humidity of the air mass. LABOR RELATIONS MEASURE RAPPED

Manufacturer and Communist Tell Senators Bill Can Harm Workers WASHINGTON, March 28 (U.P.)—The Wagner labor relations bill was rapped today by an executive of the Illinois Manufacturers' association and a representative of the Communist party. James J. Donnelly, executive vice president of the manufacturers group, told the senate labor committee the bill would be harmful to workers and to the public. Donnelly, representing the Communist party, declared the bill was "dangerous to the economic and social interests of working people."

'WRITE-UP' BARED AT UTILITY PROBE

Duke Power Company Juggled Values to Pay Dividends, Board Informed

WASHINGTON, March 28 (U.P.)—A "write-up" in fixed capital accounts of Duke Power Co., largest hydro-electric utility in the south, established payments of millions of dollars in dividends to stockholders during the past decade, the federal trade commission was told today.

Doris Duke Cromwell, "world's richest girl," is second largest stockholder in the company. Roger E. Barnes, commission economist, testified the "write-ups" totaled \$20,000,000 on December 31, 1933. He was testifying at the hearing into affairs of the company during the past six years. Barnes told the commission the write-ups reached \$30,000,000 for the company's entire system on March 31, 1934, but "the write-ups" were reduced to \$1,000,000 through elimination of the "inflation" on properties as they were retired.

Between 1917-33, Barnes said, the company paid dividends totaling \$35,000,000. He testified that "the write-ups" were used in paying dividends to the Duke Power Co., the largest American stockholder in underlying companies.

TOO SHY

NEW YORK, March 28 (U.P.)—Beata Royce, who says she is the only bubble dancer who wears no costume at all, today had admitted she was too shy to charge Sally Band with plagiarizing her idea. She dances at a Broadway cabaret. Miss Royce, who is 20 and a Methodist from Kansas City, explained she began thinking of a balloon dance when she was 10 years old and copyrighted the idea last year. "But I don't want to sue Miss Band," she added. "You are too shy," suggested her employer. "You are too shy," said Miss Royce.
