Initial Stock Will Be Bought Monday at Approximate Cost of \$100,000

BOHPS WILL BE BEMPEL

BOISE, March 29 (UP)—The first purchase of liquor by the Idaho liquor commission probably will be made next Monday, according to Commissioner M. B. Yeaman. The approximate cost will be \$100,000. The stores will be established and stocked as rapidly as possible, Yeaman said.

BOISE, March 29 (UP)—The Idaho liquor commission is getting set up at a "million dollar corporation" in the establishment of the state's chain of liquor stores. The stores are expected to be in operation by May 1 and 2. The commission is expected to be in operation by mid-April, the commission here.

Members of the commission realize that the success of the liquor law rests very largely with its execution, said M. B. Yeaman. Idaho's "Prohibition" who is a member of the commission and spokesman for the commission to the press. All new releases are to come from Mr. Yeaman.

It is right there that the danger lies. Any national leader, confronted by an insoluble economic crisis, can always take his people's minds off of their troubles by adopting a "strong" foreign policy. The temptation to adopt such a policy; therefore, is extremely great.

But a strong foreign policy is the kind of policy that eventually leads to war. In trying to submerge the economic problem, the leader runs the grave danger of starting something that can only be finished by fighting.



The race carried a golden shower of about \$1,700,000 in sweepstakes prizes to American.

Last year's winner, at 21-1, was the heaviest favorite in the history of the world's greatest steeplechase.

Thomson Place Third Blue Prince, another outsider, finished second, three lengths behind Golden Miller. A favorite, another horse, J. H. Whitney's Thomson II, was a poor third, eight lengths behind Blue Prince.

It was a thrilling race, 21 of the 27 starters, roping down on the 30th yard line, jumping the 41-mile water that comprise the 4 1/2-mile track. The field finished in this order:

Golden Miller's \$2,000,000 in single bets and doubles (total) had been made on Golden Miller. His fall saved the bookmakers from disaster.



HOPES FOR FOUR HOSTAGES WANES

Police Capture Three Bandits But Fear Kidnaped Quartet May Be Dead

CHICAGO, March 29 (AP)—Police announced today that a man and a woman kidnaped by a group of U. S. marines in the vicinity of Cicero, Ill., the same afternoon, previously reported were reported held as hostages by the fleeing gunmen.

Chicago police officers here to obtain custody of the bandits in a suit over a \$50,000 ransom report that caused police officers to launch a search for four kidnaped persons.

Chicago, March 29 (AP)—Hope for the safety of two men and two women kidnaped by bank robbers Tuesday night today was questioned by the three bandits and failed to obtain any satisfactory explanation of their fate.

Police feared the victims, taken as hostages following an unopposed attempt to rob the Union Trust State bank, just before either killed or left behind in some isolated spot.

The three arrested youths, all confessing at attempted bank robbery, asserted they released their captives Wednesday afternoon in suburban Cicero.

Disagree on Spot
They disagreed, however, on the exact spot where they said they left the abducted party's big green sedan and told them to "accompany" them to a "safe" spot.

The captive youths, 21-year-old Thomas Stojan, 21-year-old Edward Zimanyi, 20-year-old residents of Cicero, the former proprietor of the Capone gang.

Chicago police officers and government agents and police in an attempt to free after his home was surrounded. He leaped from the roof, fled through an adjoining house and was captured only because a parking box he used as a ladder in surmounting a fence collapsed with his weight.

Tells Acquaintances
He revealed the names of his companions under questioning at the office of Thomas J. Courtney, state's attorney.

Retired Teacher Kills Self Through Fear of U. S. Investigation


CINCINNATI (AP)—Fears that she might be cited for income tax evasion was believed to have driven Mrs. Rosa J. Grossman, 85, to suicide.

Utility Bill Too Drastic, House Committee Advised

WASHINGTON, March 29 (AP)—As a means of creating closer ties (Special) Analyzing various bills and phases of the Rayburn bill which was introduced by Sen. E. E. Clegg, president of the Electric Bond and Share company, called to the attention of the Senate committee on Thursday the number of bills presented as a substitute for the present locally-regulated, private-operated public utility system.

"Certainly nothing so drastic as this bill should be enacted into law, unless and until those who would destroy what now exists have prepared and submitted a definite and workable plan of procedure," Mr. Inch said.

Effects of the Rayburn bill would ultimately increase the costs of electric and gas service to the consumer and by demoralizing local companies would impair service, Mr. Inch also stated.

A large number of operating companies' receiverships would inevitably follow the passage of this bill because necessary financing now obtained from holding companies would not be forthcoming, said Mr. Inch.

"The next five years, instead of being the demoralization and destruction of these great industries as private enterprises under this bill, would see them again engaged in constructive expansion," he said.

Mr. Inch brought out that in 1930 three out of four companies more than a billion dollars on construction alone in an effort to help stem the depression.

"Our own accelerated companies are now spending \$25,000,000 a year for construction," said Mr. Inch. "In normal years they spend a hundred million dollars a year."

"This is just an indication of what things will be like in the drive for business recovery."

Means Foreign Tax
"If this bill becomes a law, we must sacrifice \$250,000,000 a year, invested in foreign countries, to be sold by government which would force us to get rid of our foreign holdings and us to enter the foreign utility field."

DIRIGIBLE TURNED TO FLYING "LAB"
Los Angeles, Moored to Big Mast, Will Be Scene of Experiments

LAKEHURST, N. J. (AP)—The dirigible Los Angeles, last of the navy's lighter-than-air ships, has gone back into service—but no flights are planned.

The ship has been moved from its hangar here and moored to the big mast in the center of the navy reservation. The dirigible for the coming year will be a floating laboratory.

The object of the "floating lab," according to officials, is for scientists with their instruments to record results of meteorological tests to be made in furtherance of scientific knowledge of dirigibles.

Training Ship
According to reports, a 200-ton ship, the Charles S. Doolittle, the ship also will be used for training of officers and enlisted men and that such training will not interfere with the scientific tests.

A crew of 15 men will be constantly aboard and the number will be increased in times of high winds. Preparations for the tests have been under way for several months, according to Commander Rosenblatt.

While the Los Angeles was decommissioned after the Akron had been completed and the Macon was near completion, navy officers here are hopeful that the ship may be recommended for limited flight service.

Attaches of Bellevue hospital said he probably would recover from what police termed a suicide attempt.

Police entered the apartment of the 36-year-old radio operator after tenants complained of a strong odor of gas.

On a table near Alagna's unconscious form they found a note apparently started by him, but left unfinished.

It was addressed to "Dear Ed" and it contained the words "I love my mouth is feeling dry." Police declined to reveal the entire contents but said the writing near the end was an illegible scrawl.

WOMAN, 2 MEN DIE ON GALLOWS
MONTREAL, March 29 (AP)—A woman and two men were executed on the gallows in Bordeaux, France, today.

Mrs. Tommasia, 51, died for arranging the murder of her husband for his insurance. Leon Gagliardi, 35, and Angelo Donatelli, 37, high school students, the actual killers, shared the scaffold with her.

She was the first woman ever executed in Montreal, the third in Quebec province.

Max O. Cutler, Chicago meat specialist, will arrive here Sunday to instruct butchers in the proper cutting of meat, proper cooking and importance of meat-in-the-diet.

Public Campaign
The Housewives' League, organizer of the strike, meanwhile issued its campaign by distributing "meatless menus" and obtaining pledges from housewives to eliminate meat from their dinner menus until prices are brought within reason.

The organization's appeal to Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace for federal aid in reducing prices brought a curt answer to "blame the drought, not the government," said the secretary.

Secretary Wallace said meat prices are "not unusually high" and are 18 per cent lower than they were in 1930.
