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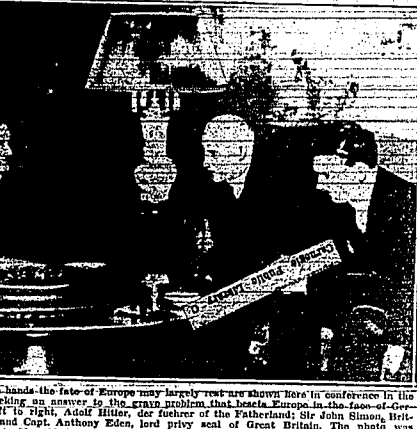
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Radiophoto Shows Momentous European Meeting

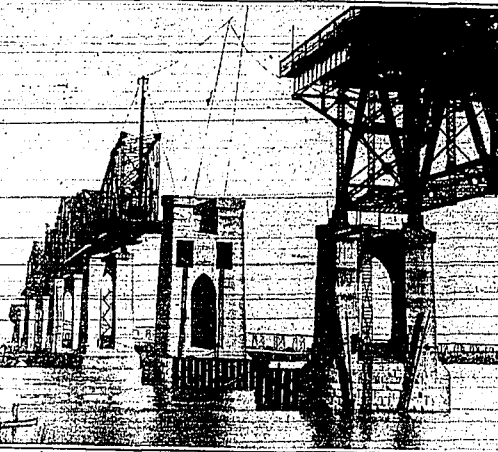

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NEW DRUG FOUND HELP-FOR-HEART

Powerful Stimulant Evolved By Scientists From Deadly Poison Nut

NEW YORK, March 29 (AP)—A deadly poison not that for ages had taken human and animal life in India and the Hawaiian Islands, has been proved to contain the most powerful heart stimulant yet discovered. Already the new drug has saved lives in experimental work here, it is reported.

Dr. J. K. Chen, told the 20th New York Cardiological society. Dr. Chen's wife, Dr. Amy S. H. Ling Chen, extracted the drug from the nut or yellow olefin tree. The drug is a powerful heart stimulant and is called "strychnine."

Dr. Chen's experiments with the nut three years ago. Dr. Chen is director of pharmaceutical research in Lilly research laboratories, Indianapolis. The result was the water-like liquid which called "strychnine."

ONLY ONE ISSUE

Twin Falls appears to be taking this city election business in a calm fashion, refusing to get excited over attempts to upset the present successful administration.

People, generally, accept the fact that there is but one issue and that is the record which has been made in the past two years.

Since the present administration has made good there is no call now to kick out of office those who have demonstrated outstanding ability.

Mayor Bobier was kept in office six years, and was elected his last term without opposition, as a courtesy which was due him and his administration. Those who serve on school and highway district boards are reelected as a matter of common consent. Precedent here has dictated that men who give their time and effort at paltry compensation, such as that allowed a mayor or city commissioner, are entitled to re-election, especially when their administration meets with such universal satisfaction as has the one which now faces either commendation or reprobation at the hands of those whom it has labored untiringly to serve.

This newspaper would be remiss in a public duty if it did not urge voters generally to give first consideration to those present officials seeking reelection, who have proved their ability, their fitness and their efficiency, particularly during such times as those through which we have been passing the last two years.

People of this city know now that the present city administration has been alert constantly to all opportunities for federal aid in employment and in permanent improvement projects; they know that the appointees of the present mayor and council, to a man, have been efficient and economical, several having lived among us for long periods of years; they know that taxes have been lowered; that under Mayor Johnston the city has developed a civic consciousness which did not exist here previously; and that a continuation of this forward-looking program is assured for another two years under his leadership and those in sympathy with this sort of a program.

The record which this administration has made in the only issue in this campaign and is the one upon which voters will be called upon to cast their ballots next Tuesday. A vote of approval is the least that taxpayers can give in appreciation of the faithful performance of duty on the part of their public servants.

SOIL NEEDS PRESERVATION

One of the most important measures now being pursued by the federal government is the effort to check soil erosion. The problem of erosion—which most of us hardly recognized as a problem at all, until recently—was graphically presented in a recent speech by H. H. Bennett, director of the Interior Department's soil erosion service.

"Most American soil has been tilled only a short time in comparison with that of Europe," he says. "Yet in the area east of the Appalachians, where there was no erosion when the white man took the land from the Indian, there are now 100,000 gullies 50 feet deep and a mile long.

"America has wasted its soil resources more rapidly than any other country in the world."
"It is worth remembering that our tremendous agricultural resources have been the foundation of our greatness. The task of preserving them is one of the most vital responsibilities."

ESCAPE FROM REALITY

The way in which an economic crisis can be a direct menace to world peace was strikingly illustrated by a paragraph in a recent news dispatch from Berlin, telling of Germany's reaction to Hitler's rejection of the military clauses of the Versailles treaty.

"The entire country," said the dispatch, "has forgotten its economic troubles during the last few days to swamly Hitler's office with enthusiastic letters and telegrams of gratitude."

It is right there that the danger lies. Any national leader, confronted by an insoluble economic crisis, can always take his people's minds off of their troubles by adopting a "strong" foreign policy. The temptation to adopt such a policy; therefore, is extremely great.

But a strong foreign policy is the kind of policy that eventually leads to war. In trying to submerge the economic problem, the leader runs the grave danger of starting something that can only be finished by fighting.

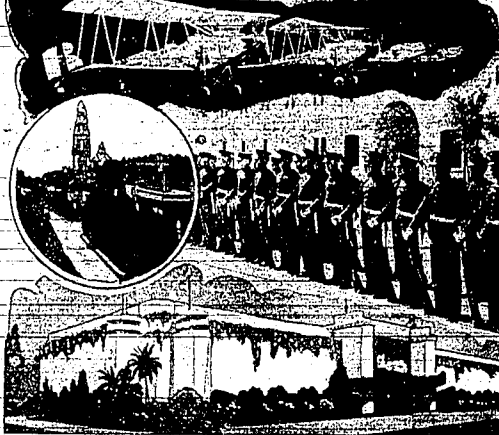

Retailers Strike Back Against Housewives With 'Ging' 'Ging' Show

LOS ANGELES, March 29 (AP)—A "spring style show" of 1935 meat cuts was offered by Los Angeles butchers as the answer to a meat boycott directed at the high cost of living by more than 10,000 housewives.

Max O. Cutler, Chicago meat specialist, will arrive here Sunday to instruct butchers in the proper cutting of meat, proper cooking and importance of meat in the diet.

Public Campaign
The Housewife's League, organizer of the strike, meanwhile issued its campaign by distributing "meatless menus" and obtaining pledges from housewives to eliminate meat from their dinner menus until prices are brought within reason.

Organization's appeal to Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace for federal aid in reducing prices brought a curt answer to "blame the drought, not the government," Mr. Wallace said.

Secretary Wallace said meat prices are "not unusually high" and are 18 per cent lower than they were in 1930.

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DIRIGIBLE TURNED TO FLYING "LAB"

Los Angeles, Moved to Big Mast, Will Be Scene of Experiments

LAKEHURST, N. J. (AP)—The dirigible Los Angeles, last of the navy's lighter-than-air ships, has gone back into service—but no flights are planned.

The ship has been moved from its hangar here and moved to the big mast in the center of the navy reservation here. The dirigible for the coming year will be a floating laboratory.

The object of the "floating lab," according to officials, is for scientists with their instruments to record results of meteorological tests to be made in furtherance of scientific knowledge of dirigibles.

Training Ship
According to reports made at a Charles Rosendahl, the ship also will be used for training of officers and enlisted men and that such training will not interfere with the scientific tests.

A crew of 15 men will be constantly aboard and the number will be increased in times of high winds. Preparations for the tests have been under way for several months, according to Commander Rosendahl. While the Los Angeles was decommissioned after the Akron had been completed and the Macon was near completion, navy officers here are hopeful that the ship may be recommended for limited flight service.
