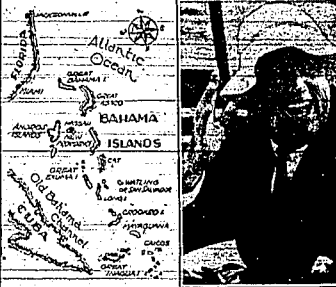

NEW MACHINERY DEMAND COMING

Survey Shows Vast Potential Need for Replacements In Industry

DAVENPORT, Ia. (AP)—Latent demands for machinery are sufficient to put 4,000,000 workers back at their jobs for at least two years, according to Charles F. Pasche, president of the Davenport Dealer Co. machinery manufacturer.

Based on his estimate on a survey recently compiled by the Machinery and Allied Institute of Chicago, Pasche declared that the total value of potential demand for replacement of obsolete machinery, outdated since 1929, approximates \$18,750,000.

Staggering Sum

FRENCH BETTING AGENCY THRIVING

PARIS (AP)—When the Parliament Urban was instituted in 1932 as a means of checking clandestine bookmaking, the success of the venture was doubted, but the steady increase of bets registered in 25 cities appears to have fully justified the measure.

In 1932, this office recognized existing organizations in 20 cities, and sub-agencies in 20 cities. That year the bets totaled 629,626,000 francs. The following year, 629,600 francs were added to the list—and the total of wagers attained 676,201,600 francs. Last year, the figure reached was 754,142,500 francs.

Paris, with sub-agencies and auxiliary offices in operation over the city, mainly in tobacco stores, totals by far with 410,000 francs in 1932—494,720,000 francs in 1933 and 645,797,500 francs last year.

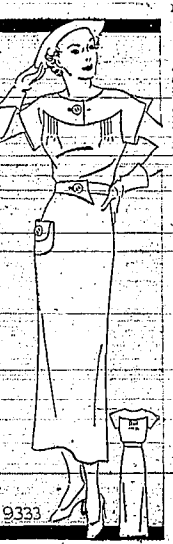

WAR ANTI-PROFIT PLANS ENDORSED

Munitions Probers Tell Senate That Program Must Be Specific

WASHINGTON, April 1 (AP)—The munitions committee informed the senate in a preliminary report today that it was in "substantial agreement" on a plan to eliminate war profits.

More time will be required, however, to complete the inquiry into various phases of the arms business.

The report by Chairman Gerald P. Nye said the committee was in agreement upon a "principle to govern the export of munitions and munition-making materials."

The committee is emphatically convinced, it said, "that no bill which contains only general authorizations to the president to set prices, or to commandeer industry or to arrange for priorities and licensing is at all adequate to equalize the burdens and take the profits out of war."

That statement was interpreted as the committee's position on the McSwain war profits elimination bill pending in the house. The McSwain plan would fix prices of commodities at the outbreak of a conflict.

The committee expressed "interest and sympathy with the efforts of the American government to secure agreement of more rigorous international control of the arms traffic."

It offered no recommendations, but expressed support for a constitutional amendment to eliminate tax exempt bond. Such a plan was endorsed by Bernard M. Baruch, financier who testified before the committee last week.

Gooding, Jerome Counties Running Close Farm Race

Preliminary report received here today from James B. Holden, state supervisor of census, carried on in the agricultural areas under the U. S. department of commerce, reveals that Gooding and Jerome counties are running "neck and neck" in the matter of farm totals.

Jerome county, by preliminary count as of Jan. 1, 1935 had 1,031 farms, compared with 989 on April 1, 1930; while Gooding county had 1,008 this year, compared with 811 five years ago.
