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COUGHLIN RAPS CHARGE BY FOES

Denies Paying His Workers Small Wages; Condemns Dictator Trend

DETROIT, April 8 (UP)—Communists' oftentimes parade in robes of the learned and in vestments of the church. Father Charles E. Coughlin charged yesterday in a raptorial denunciation of capitalism.

The priest—devoting part of his weekly address to a defense and an outline of the aims of the National Union for Social Justice, denounced charges made last week in New York by paid labor leaders that he is a "labor wage."

"Distinct Time"

"Mon. like British and ecclesiastics like Bishop Francis J. McManis, all fronts at the National Union, attack me directly and indirectly with their threats," he said.

"It was said I built my church at twice 40 per cent below American standard of labor rates and that I employ a non-union printer. I could answer higher than present-day wages. I have sold the noble 600,000 volumes bearing a union printer's label made under the cloak of religion that I may my office help less than a living wage. The truth is that from day to night paid secretary our wage schedule equals that of government officers."

Cleric Fawcett

A definite spirit of Fascism is indicated in America, Coughlin declared, in the activities of a congressional "subcommittee" headed both in its campaign for office and in the house where "pernicious" legislation is passed "by a mandatory legislation."

"Mussolini, the radio priest, made the family and the right of his civilization," he said, "and he is compelling them to pay just and living wages."

"There are many just and good things under Mussolini's dictatorship, but nevertheless the dictatorship, rule of one man who may be as evil as another is good."

His Big Deal

"The fascist tendency in the United States, the priest said, parallels Mussolini's program through the appointment of representatives of big business set up with presidential approval to guide the department of commerce in framing legislation.

"It is the same fascist trend which founded the United States Chamber of Commerce, which the industrialists write codes favorable to big industry and not to the small industry, labor and agriculture."

"Just as Fascism in the 'rule of one man' so Hitlerism in Germany is the 'rule of one party.' Hitler, the priest asserted, is a fascist, but he is not a fascist only for the benefit of Germany, nationalizes trusts and corporations, controls interest, or land loans as well as it prohibits speculation in land.

"No Hitlerism in America," the National Union holds no sympathy with Hitler as he assumes the role of dictator, and launches indiscriminate attacks against Jews, signing treaties with "Catholic" states whose ambition is to destroy Catholicism."

He said.

"To Congress proposes to pass legislation beneficial to the people through the use of the ballot to replace conservative incumbents with liberals, the priest said.

Coughlin declared his "people's lobby, numbering millions" will sweep the New-Spanish land bill; the Franzer-Lemke farm bill; the Patman bonus bill; the Thomas-McAuliffe bill to establish production at a profit for farmers; the Wagner bill and the Wheeler-Rayburn public utilities bill.

Receives Jail Release After Serving Five Months on Love Allotment

RUTLAND, Vt., April 8 (UP)—Mrs. Bertha Moore, 40, daughter of former President Calvin Coolidge, has been released from jail here after serving five months on a \$5,000 allotment of affection.

It was understood that Mrs. Moore had transferred to Mrs. Charles Gilman her interest in a \$400 trust fund left by an uncle, former Governor W. W. Sullivan of Ludlow.

Mrs. Moore, former town clerk of Ludlow, was found by Mrs. Gilman, 43, for alleged infidelity of the affections of Albert Gilman, truck driver and former cemetery policeman.

During the trial, a letter was introduced in which Mrs. Moore reportedly referred to Gilman as her "sweet potato." Mrs. Gilman was awarded \$100 damages. Her husband withdrew October 31 last by John G. Sargent, attorney general in the Coolidge cabinet.

MAJOR RECOVERY EFFORT

America is embarking on a huge undertaking in a supreme effort to end the depression and to bring full recovery through the expenditure of \$4,800,000,000.

Passage of the measure over the week-end has been anticipated for several months and plans are all made to launch a huge program to take men off the "dole" and to put them to work on thousands of construction projects.

HAWAIIAN SUGAR CUT 15 PER CENT

Last Major Producing Sector Brought Under Federal AAA Program

Production of sugar beets in the Hawaiian islands under provisions of the agricultural adjustment administration for the three-year period 1933-35 will be limited to 10 per cent, in contrast to the 15 per cent general decrease in continental United States. It is revealed in a statement from the U. S. secretary of agriculture and crop but here today by Carl C. Lowe, field representative for the sugar section of the A. A. A.

The adjustment of production limits the island crop from approximately 2,500,000 tons, estimated production for 1934, to 2,500,000 tons. Indagation of the sugar section program in Hawaii is being the last major sugar producing area supplying the United States into the general sugar adjustment plan under the Jones-Costigan act.

The island contract is similar to that developed for sugar adjustment programs in other areas, with special adaptations for the conditions under which sugar is produced in Hawaii.

Wage and labor provisions provide for a minimum of 24 hours of work and limit labor of children between 14 and 16 years of age to eight hours a week. The secretary of agriculture is empowered, after public hearing, to determine the minimum wages, working hours and method of payment. The secretary may also determine labor contracts between planters and laborers.

It was stated by Mr. Lowe that at Burley Wednesday there will be an open hearing conducted in an effort to adjust the contract in the Twin Falls-Burley districts, and to effect a compromise between the growers and the \$22 charge sought by labor.

MUSEUM GIVE PIONEER RELICS

Souvenirs of Idaho's Earliest Days Donated to Southern Branch Collection

FOCALTELL, (Special)—A wooden shoe lot by iron road pioneer and dug up in gravel excavation near Focaltell, Idaho, included in a collection of historical relics donated by W. P. Haver to the museum of the University of Idaho, southern branch, the faculty museum committee announced.

Also donated by Mr. Haver is a map, published in 1848 of the Rocky mountains and California in 1844-45, as a volume supposed to have been used by Abe Lincoln of Downey in crossing the plains; a homestead claim and weights acquired by Mrs. H. E. Shaw from a prospector, who found himself without money for the overland crossing; a fifty-foot surveyor's chain on which Mr. Moody, who surveyed in Blaine county 50 years ago; four mammoth bones from a mammoth slain near McManis; a mammoth tusk and two small bones from the American Falls reservoir; and a piece of tape supposed to represent petrified wood found recently near Lava Hot Springs.

Old Powder Horn
An old powder horn, which was found near Fort Hall, right photographs if the railroad shops and railroad men at Eagle Rock, to the 1850's, two photographs taken on the Fort Hall, Indian reservation at about the same time, have been secured for the museum by A. L. Albrecht, industrial engineer and civil engineering, from Mrs. Florence Myers. In 1855 it took nine months and forty days to travel on a train to make the trip from Ogden to Focaltell, according to an estimate also included in the collection. 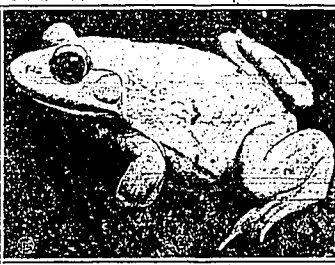

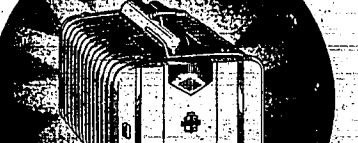

SUPREME COURT MOVING JUNE 3

Justices Will Leave Historic Chambers for Impressive New Quarters

By JOHN A. REICHMANN
WASHINGTON (U.P.)—On the afternoon of June 3, nine first justices will plant their leather padded chairs back from their long mahogany benches "away" out of their chamber and leave the majestic room to its new occupants. The dimly lit semi-circular room then will become a shrine to the historic scenes it has witnessed, inhabited only by nine white marble busts of former chief justices and a silently screeching gilt spread eagle.

Room to Be Shrine
The decision not to make any kind of use of the room, once the Senate chamber where pre-Civil War debates raged, was made by the Senate last session. It was decided to make the room a shrine for the education of visiting tourists.

The court will take up its deliberations just fall in a magnificent 100,000,000 while marble temple across the Capitol Plaza, but few anticipate that the majestic temple will transcend those enacted in the inconceivable old chamber.

Part of the court's time of the outbreak of the Civil War that the court formerly housed in a small and remote building, the base of the Capitol, moved into the chamber.

Civil War Crisis

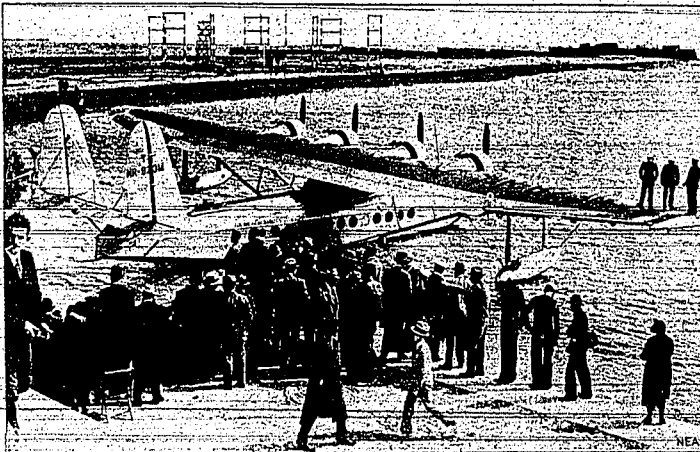

DEADWOOD, S. D. (U.P.)—A total of 500 acres of forest land in the Black Hills National Forest, in the Rosebud Ranger district will be planted with pine this spring.

The plantation will be made from two and three-year-old seedlings from the Halsey, Neb., nursery by CCC workers from Rosburg and Mystic camps. Seven hundred trees will be planted for the year, which will make a total of 200,000 trees.

NOME GIVEN NEW SWIFT AIR TIME

Revised Plane Schedule Puts Alaskan City Nearer to New York

NOME, Alaska (U.P.)—This city, in the shadow of the Arctic circle is 2,000 miles from New York, and Atlantic seaboard cities. Surface transportation time is 32 days, but now it is possible to travel from Nome to the little city near the top of the world in far off Alaska in four and one-half days.

United Air Lines has announced here the new schedule: Leave New York on United Air Lines plane at noon, arriving in Seattle in time to catch a steamer for Juneau, Alaska's capital. There one boards a Pan-American plane flying over the old Gold Rush trail, and in a few hours the passenger is at the richest north city under Uncle Sam's flag.

Similar "seavoy" are made to other Alaska cities through the new air lines radiating from Juneau.

The air line expects that in addition to the business traveler, big game hunter, and sportsman, the city will take advantage of the drastic fall of travel time.

Syrup Bootlegging Irk Ohio Farmers

CHARDON, Ohio (U.P.)—Geauga county is stirred up over a maple syrup "bootlegging" war. Odd to believe, genuine Geauga county "molasses in bond" is being "bootlegged."

First reports of a "cut" in maple syrup came from T. H. Winstrom, Cleveland detective, who owns a farm near here. Winstrom told authorities that "bootleggers" in Cleveland were manufacturing a synthetic maple syrup and retailing it in the city for \$1.50 gallon as genuine Geauga county syrup.

VON LUDENDORFF REJECTS OFFERS

MUNICH, April 8 (U.P.)—Gen. Erich von Ludendorff has declined Reichsminister Adolf Hitler's offer of a field marshal's baton, the director of Ludendorff's publishing company said today.

Gen. Werner von Blomberg, defense minister, arrived to convey personally to Ludendorff the army's congratulations on his 70th birthday. An honor company of the Munich garrison, with the 20 imperial colors, will be drawn up in Ludendorff's honor tomorrow.

SIKORSKY LOOKS TO SEA FLIGHTS

Designer Says Giant Aircraft Will Operate on Regular Non-Stop Routes

MIAMI, Fla. (U.P.)—Construction of a seaplane capable of regular non-stop transatlantic flights with 50 passengers is a "practical possibility," Igor Sikorsky, aircraft designer, said here.

Details obtained from the Sikorsky-built slipper ships, operated by Pan-American Airways have convinced the designer that transatlantic aircraft "could be built immediately."

"This ship," he said, "would have a fuel capacity sufficient for a range of 4,500 miles, while the distance across the Atlantic is 3,000 miles. On short trips of 1,000 miles, this ship could carry 100 people in every comfort."

"Such a ship would have a wingspread of 180 feet, six motors, and one of the motors would be of the wing in the 'Iravellan Clipper,' and a gross weight of 69 tons.

Regarding flights at great altitudes in the stratosphere, Sikorsky said that while this has been much discussed, he believes the most effective method for combating air sickness will be in the near future, between 12,000 and 20,000 feet. At this altitude, he points out, planes will be practically flying "above the weather" and capable of cruising at speeds which would amaze us at the present time.

Professor Debunks Haiti Voodoo Tale
CHICAGO (U.P.)—Stories of seers and fiction writers of "voodoo" rites in the West Indies have been "debunked" by Dr. M. J. Herskovits, who recently returned from a three-month sojourn in native huts of the most primitive peoples in Haiti and western Africa.

Dr. Herskovits, professor of anthropology at Northwestern university, has engaged for 10 years in research among black races. "Voodooism is not the bloody terror that movies and books make of it," he said. "It really is a most peaceful religion. Its devotees attend ceremonies regularly on Saturday night, much in the nature of Wednesday prayer meetings. There is no magic, no sorcery, no witchcraft."

Two female monkeys were injected with a preparation from a human breast cancer. The breasts remained normal for several months. Growths then began to appear, and one of the monkeys died after 11 months.

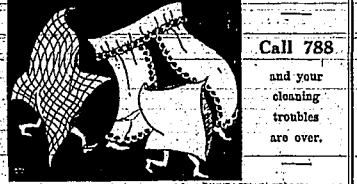
Study of the growth in the dead monkey revealed, however, that at the time of its death the swelling of the lymphatic system was not a cancer. The other monkey is coming from the skin.
