













## HAWAIIAN SUGAR CUT 15 PER CENT

Last Major Producing Sector  
Brought Under Federal  
AAA Program

Production of sugar beets in the Hawaiian Islands under provisions of the agricultural adjustment administration for the three-year period, 1935-37, will be reduced by 15 per cent, in contrast to the 10 per cent general decrease in consumption of sugar beets recommended in a statement from the U.S. secretary of agriculture and given out here today by Carl C. Long, chief of the Bureau for the sugar section of the AAA.

The adjustment of production limits for sugar beets has approximately 3,150,000 acres of contracted production for 1934, to 275,000 tons. Inauguration of the sugar beet program will start next year, bringing the last major sugar producing area supplying the United States into the general sugar adjustment under the Jones-Costigan Act.

### Similar Contract

The island contract is similar to that for the 1934 sugar acreage limit program. In other areas with special adaptations for the conditions under which sugar is produced.

## AAA RE-ASSIGNS SUGAR ACREAGE

Unused Allotment Shifted to  
Other Districts; Idaho  
Change Made

WASHINGTON, April 8 (UPI) — About 32,000 acres of unused 1935 sugar beet acreage allotments had been reallocated today by the AAA.

This readjustment will affect a transfer from draft territory to areas where planting conditions are better. The new arrangement will result in 25 per cent of the total acreage allotted to domestic growers under the best production districts.

Under the voluntary subscription to both producers and processors, acreage not wanted for processing purposes can be put in a national reserve, making it available to growers who want to plant more than the allotted acreage.

### Will Map Schedule

A sample of first planting date will be distributed to the sugar beet district, the U.S. announced.

Where acreage under contract is to be planted before the first date, it will be reallocated to other growers dealing to increase their plantings. Districts to which additional acreage is to be allocated include those serving the district and the original and increased allotment include:

Idaho upper Snake river valley districts, American Falls Sugar Co.,

\$7,000 and 38,000 acres.

Mountain—M's and S's districts, American Falls Sugar Co., 10,000 acres; Stoddard, Holtz, Holt Co., 13,030 and 10,714 acres; Chinoock district, Utah-Idaho Co., 6,737 and 11,600 acres.

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## SUPREME COURT MOVING JUNE 3

**Justices Will Leave Historic Chambers for Impressive New Quarters**

By JOHN A. REICHMANN

WASHINGTON (UPI)—On the afternoon of June 3 nine tired Justices will push their leather padded chairs back from their long marble desk and leave their offices in their chamber and leave the majority room to its ancient memories.

The dimly lit semi-circular room that has been the home of the historic scenes it has witnessed, inhabited only by nine white marble busts of former chief Justices and a silently screaming gilt spoked eagle.

Honor to Be Shared.

The court will take any living use of the room once the Senate chamber where pre-Civil War debates raged, was made by W. C. Boggs, late speaker, to decide to make the room a shrine for the education of visiting tourists.

The court will take in its deliberations next fall in a magnificent \$10,000,000 white marble temple to be built in the Civil War era. It is anticipated that future scenes there will transcend those enacted in the independent chamber.

It is just two years since the time of the outbreak of the Civil War that the court formerly housed in the basement of the state house in the room in the basement of the new, moved to the basement.

Civil War Crisis.

The crisis started by the famous Dred Scott decision had played its part in precipitating the crisis, part of which was that the country had been Democratic. When it returned to its bench two had died and one, a Southerner, had resigned. It was the Southerner who altered the composition of the court by appointing Northerners to the place.



## SIKORSKY LOOKS TO SEA FLIGHTS

**Designer Says Giant Aircraft  
Will Operate on Regular  
Non-Stop Routes**

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI)—Construction of a seaplane capable of regular non-stop transatlantic flights with 30 passengers is a "practical possibility," Igor Sikorsky, aircraft designer, said here.

Rents obtained from the Sikorsky-built Clipper plane operated by Pan-American Airways have convinced the aviation engineer that the Atlantic aircraft could be built immediately.

"This ship," he said, "would have a range of 4,500 miles, while the distance across the Atlantic is 3,900 miles. On short trips of 1,000 miles, the plane could carry 100 people in every comfort."

"Such a ship would have a wing-spread of 180 feet, six motors, propellers 16 feet in diameter, a tail wing 28 feet high, a gross weight of 50 tons."

**Structural strength.**

"The structural weight of the S-42 type clipper ship is only 70 per cent of its gross. In other words, ships flying in and out of Miami should be able to haul their own weight in useful load."

Regarding flights at great altitudes in the stratosphere, Sikorsky said he had some personal experience. He discussed the most efficient travel levels for commercial flyers will in the near future be between 20,000 and 25,000 feet. At this altitude, he points out, planes will be practically flying "above the weather" and capable of crude navigation which would amaze us at the present time.


