KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 11 (UP)—A thick dust pall hung over eight states today. It appeared to be blinding, but the silts were not as low as they seemed. Visibility from central Missouri to western Texas was everywhere most of the way.

In the Oklahoma panhandle the shifting silt-blankets were making tracks of automobiles, trucks and wagons hearing the household goods of farmers and stockmen as they fled. More than 100 families have left already.

Wheat Rained
In western Kansas the dust showed up in a thick, white blanket. From Garden City southwest the wheat crop was a complete failure. Discontinued farmers applied for federal funds to help them to leave their once fertile but now barren fields. They learned there was no money for that purpose.

In the Texas panhandle the disintegrated topsoil moved with the wind in great waves, drifting over railroad tracks and highways, making travel hazardous.

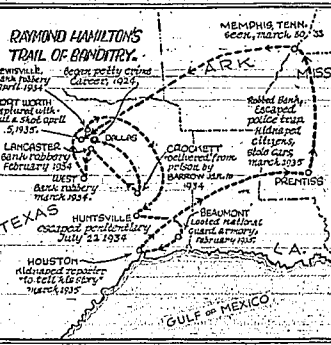
Wear Masks
In eastern Colorado where the dust three weeks ago climaxed as the inhabitants were made to prevent recurrence of the "dust pneumonia." The United States wired from Springfield that cars should hold their windows closed without relief, or rain. All traffic was stopped, schools were closed and a "wear mask" day was proclaimed.

Dust—From Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado, Texas, spread west, north and south over New Mexico, Missouri and Iowa.
Bolsheviks Hoped
Washington, D. C., April 11 (UP)—Senators and congressmen pleaded with President Roosevelt for federal money to help build "breaks" in the dust-affected regions. But in many counties of western Kansas, where the dust has been worst, the money is not available.

"GOD'S COUNTRY"

Pictures and accounts of dust storms in the plains states, news of floods and resultant deaths in California and the disaster caused by a week-end tornado in Mississippi, should make local residents feel that they are living in God's country.

Time was, when the dust rolled over southern Idaho, drifting into prove-up shacks, peppering food with lava ash and the wind blew incessantly in the springtime, that the pioneer settlers and their wives, wished secretly at least, that they were "back in God's country," which meant wherever they were from, whether it was Washington or Iowa, Kansas or Nebraska, Ohio or Illinois.

It was while the dust storm era here was at its worst, that the disastrous San Francisco earthquake occurred, and that made local residents feel more satisfied, for they felt this section was free of such major catastrophes, at least. As the land in these parts became settled, the dust problem abated somewhat, so that today it is no longer the bane of householders that it once was.

Other sections continue to have earthquake and climatic dangers, while southern Idaho fares generously at Nature's hands. The rigorous winters of the middle-west with extreme cold, deep snows and blizzards are unknown here. Children here go all year bare-legged, they know little of huge snow drifts, winter-long skating and sledding and other sports familiar to those in other climates.

Finally it can be said that this section enjoys a mild climate, with a majority of the days sunny ones. Such violence as earthquakes, tornadoes, cyclones, floods, monster dust storms and bitter coldness are unknown.

There is no satisfaction in knowing that pestilence stalks in other sections, but there is comfort in the knowledge that southern Idaho is a favored area, that there is no need of any of its residents wishing that they lived in God's country.

ELECTRICITY GAINS IN USE

B. W. Kerr, representing the National Electrical Manufacturers Association, appeared before the House Interstate Commerce Committee the other day in the hearings on the utility holding company regulation bill. A congressman asked him if there was any doubt that a good market for electricity exists.

"None whatever," he replied. "Why, we have the best salesman in the United States selling electricity—the President."

And there is something in that remark. Whatever may be said about the present electric power controversy—and there is much to be said on both sides, and little of it is being left unsaid—we are at least stepping up our electric power consumption at a tremendous rate.

Whether government or private industry provides the juice, we are going to be using more and more of it from now on. The age of electricity is just beginning.

Civilized nations brought about the last war, and now they predict the next war will end civilization. So what?

TO THE RIDICULOUS

Every American can think of plenty of reasons for opposing a dictatorship. One of the most cogent is the fact that the natural tendency to glorify the dictator's personality eventually is carried so far that it turns into something very like outright idolatry—and when that happens the government becomes irresponsible, in the sense that it is quite beyond the control of anyone but the man at the very peak.

This tendency is amply illustrated by recent dispatches from Russia. An American correspondent in Moscow undertook to tabulate references to Stalin in speeches by party workers. He found that every speech contained something like "Our dearly beloved leader," "Our darling Stalin," "Our best of all," "Our guiding star," and so on.

Such fulsome phrases are nothing less than ridiculous. But they are simply the logical outcome of a tendency inherent in any kind of one-man rule.

Hand things over to a dictator, and you have to glorify him—even if it gags you.

Mahomet, who went to the mountain, couldn't have been so wise, or he'd waited for a dust storm.

With those dust storms increasing, let's hope the government does something for the land's sake.

ADA TAKES OVER CLUB PREMISES

County in Charge of Swanley Raided Bar as Federal Men Withdraw

BOISE, April 11 (UP)—Ada county officers were in complete charge of the Senate club at the Boise hotel today after federal tax officers withdrew from the case.

The club, swankiest of Boise's night clubs, was raided after owners failed to comply with the federal law requiring the payment of \$100 annually for alcohol taxes.

Federal Judge C. C. Cavanaugh signed a temporary injunction which restrained the federal agents from confiscating the large supply of liquors on the premises. The injunction ordered Sheriff Earl Coleman to padlock the club until further notice.

William A. Moffatt, prosecuting attorney, will ask the court to close the club for one year if the federal men fail to prosecute.

Action of closing the bar was by many to hasten the jurisdiction of the alcoholic laws of the state. Some attorneys say the federal government will control over alcoholic sales unless vendors fail to pay their taxes.

Officers and officials of the county said they were not trying to press their drive until the state liquor store is opened some time next week. After that, they said, "it's all over."

Under the new liquor law, any such clubs cannot be operated but there are so many in the state that a cleanup would be nearly impossible. When the state store is supplying a regular supply, patrons say trade will fall away from the "boozing joints."

Some officers will have an easier time controlling the number of clubs operating bars, they think.
