Your Garden

PLANNING, PLANTING THE VEGETABLE GARDEN



There are many ways in which the beginner should not assume that the practice which are nowadays usually followed is the best. They are merely what experience has proved to be, in most situations. While many vegetables will grow in straight rows, the modern grower is turning to the zig-zag row. This will save the trouble of weeding and the work of cultivation, and the soil will be more evenly worked. The soil is more evenly worked in zig-zag rows. Flowers planting north and south are best to let sunlight reach the soil after the plants are well grown. Distances between rows should be considerably less than the usual garden "well-kept" rows of two or three feet. The best distance for crops not exceeding 2 feet in height is 18 inches, which enables you to cultivate each able in one strip with the wheel hoe. Seed counts usually state the number of seeds which each crop needs. These are relative rather than exact figures, what to fit your special needs, remember that a crowding young crops may retard the yield.

Plan Whole Season Your plan should provide for the whole season. Two or more crops may be raised in the same vegetable acre, if desired. There are two methods, getting them either out at about the same time early in the season and late in the season, which will come into yield at different times, or make two crops, one in the early part of the season, ten days or two weeks apart. FISH RESOURCES SEEN IN DANGER

Oregon Inank Walton Leader Says Northwest's Salmon Face Extinction

CHICAGO, April 12 (U.P.)—Cherter McCarty of Portland, Ore., president of the Oregon Council of Inank Walton Inver, urged delegates to the organization's annual convention in America's fish resources are threatened with extinction. ENVOY SEES NO U. S.-TOKYO WAR

Ambassador Finds No Cause Either in Economic or Political Picture

NEW YORK (AP)—"There is no possibility whatever of war between United States and Japan," declared Hiroo Uchiwa, Japanese ambassador to the United States in a magazine article. "The relations are not competitive in any sense, but complementary. There is no cause for any incidence between two major countries in other parts of the world. Furthermore, there is no political speaking, no reason at all for war."

Why Alarmed?

"Why, if there is no chance of war, are your countrymen alarmed by such unimportant incidents as our decision to have our naval maneuvers in the Pacific this summer?" the ambassador asked. "Those things appeal to the imagination of the 'big man' in the street. He is a fool. He would, if possible, rather not have popular sentiments expressed in any form at a moment when rumors are abroad. Of course, the naval maneuvers are not international anything at all."

The blame for these rumors of an impending war

between the United States and Japan are partly misanthropic and partly patriotic. Historic facts have given rise to suspicion and misapprehensions among the United States people as to Japan. There are sometimes exaggerated in the mind of the man on the street.

Exclusion Murks

"The single act that has done most to offend the Chinese in America's 1924 immigration act, the Americans had reasons enough for passing the law, but it was a case of discrimination, a discrimination between European and Asiatic and we thought it was another instance where the Americans showed a preference for the white race. But really the question is only one of discrimination in the matter of immigration. Under a quota system such as you apply to Europeans, only about 100,000 Japanese would be admitted each year. Now I think there is a growing sentiment in the United States to amend the law."

Tells Ways To End Dust Peril

Federal Export—Offers List of Remedies Farmers Can Use

WASHINGTON (AP)—Advice on how to stop dust in the fields was published recently in a department of agriculture bulletin. The advice was given by Dr. Charles E. Kellogg, acting chief of the soil survey of the bureau of chemistry and soils, who observed that dust is a disastrous dust storm.

Dr. Kellogg emphasized that "dust" soils are far more subject to blowing than others and said "this fact is the key to the problem."

Here's Solution

The solution lies in getting to the soil and soil crops those most subject to blowing, he explained, together with effective tillage methods on the land less vulnerable to wind.

He recommended use of special windbreakers, such as plantings of shelter belts, more carefully planned crop rotation and better control of grazing.

"By taking advantage of known facts," the bulletin said, "the farmer can prevent the general region ordinarily subject to soil blowing can be so arranged that the most likely to blow may be devoted to pasture and crop-crops will be greatly influenced in the percentage of the various crops."

Veteran Member Offers New York Plan Asking One Six-Year Term

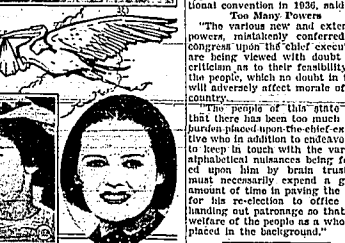

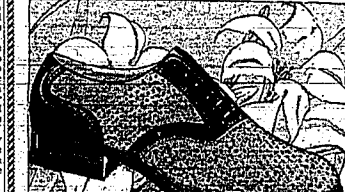
New foundations in addition to those uncovered by CWA labor last year have been found.

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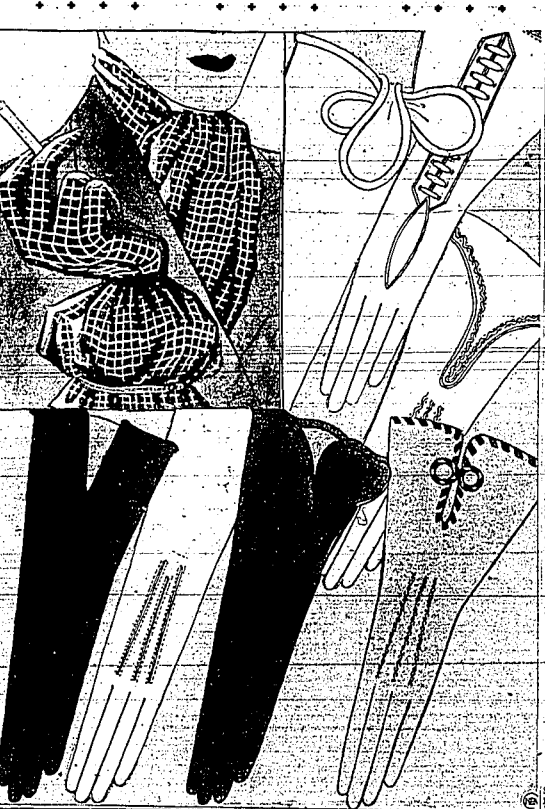
