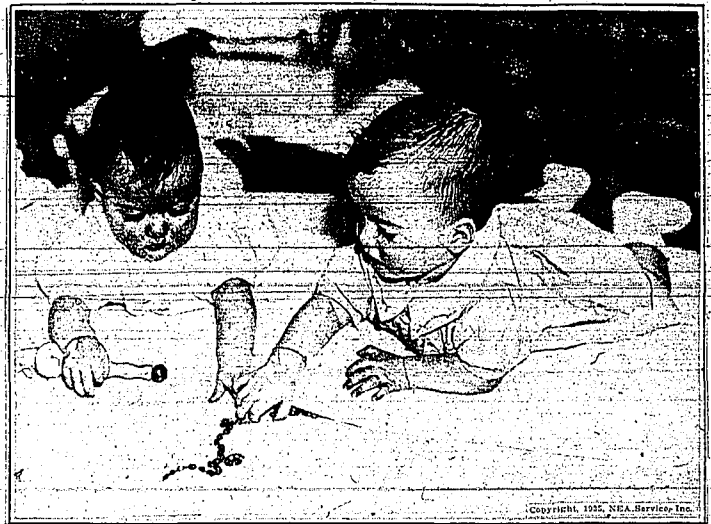
DRAMATIS PERSONAE: YVONNE, a quintuplet; CECILE, her sister.

FISH PLANTING SCHEDULED FOR BIG DAM LAKE

BOULDER CITY, Nev., April 13 (AP)—A lake 22 miles long stretched behind Boulder dam today and preparations were being made to plant thousands of bass in the water. The lake has been rising two to three feet a day recently, as the Colorado river pours in at the rate of 10,000 cubic feet a second. Seven thousand feet per second—enough for irrigation needs downstream—is being let out through a tunnel in the dam, while the remainder swells the lake. Eventually the lake is expected to be 110 miles long, a huge reservoir overtopping up the flow of the now raging, now trickling Colorado. Bass will be brought to the lake from a federal hatchery at Denver, N. M. Between thirty and forty thousand fingerlings will be planted next month. Other fish may be added later.
