COMPROMISE ON BONUS ATTRACTS VETERANS' FIRE

Administration Bill Offered By Harrison May Block All Action

PLANS BOND PAYMENTS

Measure Would Give Federal Securities in Place of Actual Cash

By H. O. THOMPSON WASHINGTON, April 16 (UP)—The administration's peace offer to the soldiers' bonus has encountered vigorous opposition from veterans' organizations.

In proposing a compromise on the bonus, the administration committee has not been given assurance that the plan is satisfactory to those who have been fighting for immediate cash payment.

Should the different factions begin a quarrel among themselves the result might be a bill which would adjourn without enacting any of the various bonus plans.

After once offering its compromise, the administration would be in a position to say it cannot do this it could not be blamed for failure to pass the bill.

Administration senators who are coming up for re-election next year could make similar claims.

Harrison's bill, which does not provide for immediate cash payment, would include a list of bonus plans. It includes the plan for the payment of the bonus by the Treasury through issuance of currency.

The Wilson bill, rejected after controversy in the house, provided for immediate cash payment of the bonus.

He praised the progress which has been made by the administration of President Roosevelt in the recovery from "the results of the old leadership."

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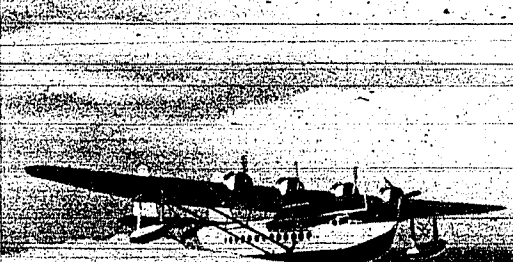
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Giant Clipper Ready for Flight to Honolulu

MEET DATE SET BY ASTRONOMERS

World's Experts Will Stage Biennial Congress at Paris July 9

PARIS (U.P.)—Three hundred foreign astronomers are expected here between July 7 and 12 to attend the biennial congress of the International Astronomical Union.

Presiding over the sessions of the congress will be Prof. Frank Bessel, director of the Lick observatory, the Yale university observatory. He also heads the executive committee, which is busy preparing the agenda. Professor Schaeinger is an expert on stellar parallax, variations of latitude and spectroscopic binaries, and these subjects, with others, will be included in the program.

In charge of the French national committee on Astronomy, is attempting the practical details of the congress. He is aided by Jules Baillaud, an astronomer from the Paris observatory.

Thirty nations are to be represented, as was the case in 1927, when the congress was held at Harvard university, in Cambridge, Mass. The congress will attempt to make an inventory of the stars discovered within the past three years, and particularly those stars given to the nature and habits of the new star, recently discovered by an amateur astronomer.

NATURAL GAS IS CURB ON SUICIDE

Jowa Town Discovers Death Figures Taking Sudden Decline

DAVENPORT, Iowa (U.P.)—Installation of natural gas in Davenport has resulted in a 20 per cent drop in suicides registered here in 1934 as compared with 1933, according to County Councilman D. C. Cawthon.

For three years Davenport led cities in the United States in the number of suicides tabulated. But last year, the number dropped to 83 from 103.

"Installation of natural gas in 1933 probably accounted for the big drop," Cawthon said, "since this type contains none of the deadly monoxide in artificial gas."

"To Easy," he said that gas was "so easy a way out" and pointed to records of past years in which almost 50 per cent of the cities claim that self-destruction were attributed to inhalation of gas.

Your Garden

Each year brings improvements in the ambitious petunia family. The latest offering to you fame is the new American variety, 'The Washington,' which was given an award of merit in the 1934 trials. Among other features, it has large and small flowers, single and double, and both trailing and bushy habits of growth. No matter what annual flowers you have, 'The Washington' is a dwarf variety of bush form, bearing single, ruffled flowers three inches in diameter.

Compact Bush—Each plant makes a compact bush nine inches tall, which is almost hidden beneath the three inches in diameter. The first part of the bush is a vibrant pink, and the center is a strongly veined white red, deepening to dark violet in the throat.

Petunias of this type are the result of plant breeding directed toward the summer garden. The fact that petunias bloom constantly throughout the summer is one of the most popular flowers for window boxes and outdoor beds. They are easy to grow and have a trailing or sprawling habit of growth which is the natural tendency of the family are difficult to use in situations which call for more dignified, perhaps more formal positions.

Martha Washington petunia will make fine edging plants, especially if they are grown not in a continuous row, but with each plant far enough apart so that it may develop its characteristic habit of growth. Allocated with other plants of similar habit, for instance lobelia, or a dwarf geranium, the color of the petunia will be brought out.

FLORIDA OPENS FROG-LEG HUNT

Natives Turn to Profitable Avocation After Tourist Crop Leaves

WAUCHULA, Fla. (U.P.)—With the tourist crop, and the winter vegetable and strawberry crops having been harvested, this section is preparing now to harvest another crop—frogs.

This town is the county seat of Hardee county, considered the center of the wild frog industry. As many as 40 barrels of frogs have been shipped from here in a single week. The best output for a month was 302 barrels.

Reports indicate that an unusually dry season has cut down on the supply of "hoppers," but there will be plenty to meet the hunters and make it worth their while at a time when they are not otherwise engaged.

Cash on Delivery Hunters are paid cash for the frogs and prices usually range from 10 to 15 cents a pound, great. Common bullfrogs bring the lower price, while other varieties such as pond frogs and spring frogs command the top.

Frog hunting is carried on at night and the darker the night the better. Just after a spring or mump rain is the ideal time. The record catch for a single night is 120 pounds and four hundred caught 1,600 pounds in four nights.

The hunter wears a headlamp on his cap, operated from a battery carried on his back. The light blinds the frog, making it easy to spear him.

During the mating season, spring and early summer, frogs call to each other in mellow, musical tones that reveal their sex. But even if the frog sits quietly on the bank and does not call, his eyes glow like two tiny white lights when rays from the hunter's headlamp strikes from. The frog will move and he is easily "gipped." But if the light flickers off for an instant, he hops off and the hunter usually is out of luck.

The wild frog industry is comparatively new in Florida. It started around Okechobee, Vaucluse, and Indian lakes in the 1920s. Florida points five or six years ago.

Home-Made Traps Will Stop Advance of Ants



By MARIAN ROBINSON Written for NEA Service A trick in the house may mean that its "mecanismo," the ants, is around. Whether living in hotels, apartments, country homes or camps, summer brings swarms of ants. Bed, table or brown, they invade pantries, refrigerators and even lightly capped food containers.

Although preferring sweets, some species are carnivorous and will devour raw and cooked meats and foods of all kinds. Watch the line of march, locate the nest and drench it with gasoline, kerosene or benzine.

Ant traps can be bought or made at home. A syrup-cake sponge attracts hundreds. While the insects are swarming in it, burn the sponge or immerse it in scalding water. Bees are attracted to a liquid which will ensure them. A paraffin bag having two small holes at the bottom and holding bait will trick them.

In summer hotels and camps, where the situation is acute, they can be warded from tables and shelves by placing receptacles of water mixed with kerosene under table legs or around other-upright objects.

The highly developed sense of ants provides the surest means of their extermination. To keep members with the intelligence to descend or move to safer quarters when large numbers of the colony have been destroyed, it is best to prevent any further contact with the steadily persistent driver rather than the intermittent campaign which discourages them.

THE JEFFERSON CLUB

Idaho Democrats are at their best in such a meeting as that held here last night upon the occasion of the annual banquet of the Twin Falls County Jefferson club.

The affair provides a common meeting ground for all members of the party in contrast to the sort of thing which goes on at any political party convention when factions contest for men and measures.

Tradition has it that the Jefferson club takes no hand in individual candidacies, but is interested only in the promotion of the Democratic party as a whole without regard to personalities.

The annual banquet of the Twin Falls county club has taken on statewide significance, and in campaign years particularly it is doubly important for it affords opportunity for an unofficial gathering of party leaders and tents to chart the course of the succeeding months. Many times the Jefferson day addresses have served as virtual keystones for the campaign.

The Jefferson club is the oldest political organization in the county, and over a quarter of a century has a tradition of constructive service for the Democratic party.

It has gone right on functioning in good times and in bad, in Democratic years and Republican years, keeping aloft the vision and ideals of Thomas Jefferson and inculcating Democratic principles in the hearts of its members and others who attend the meetings.

CONGRESSMEN STRIKE BACK

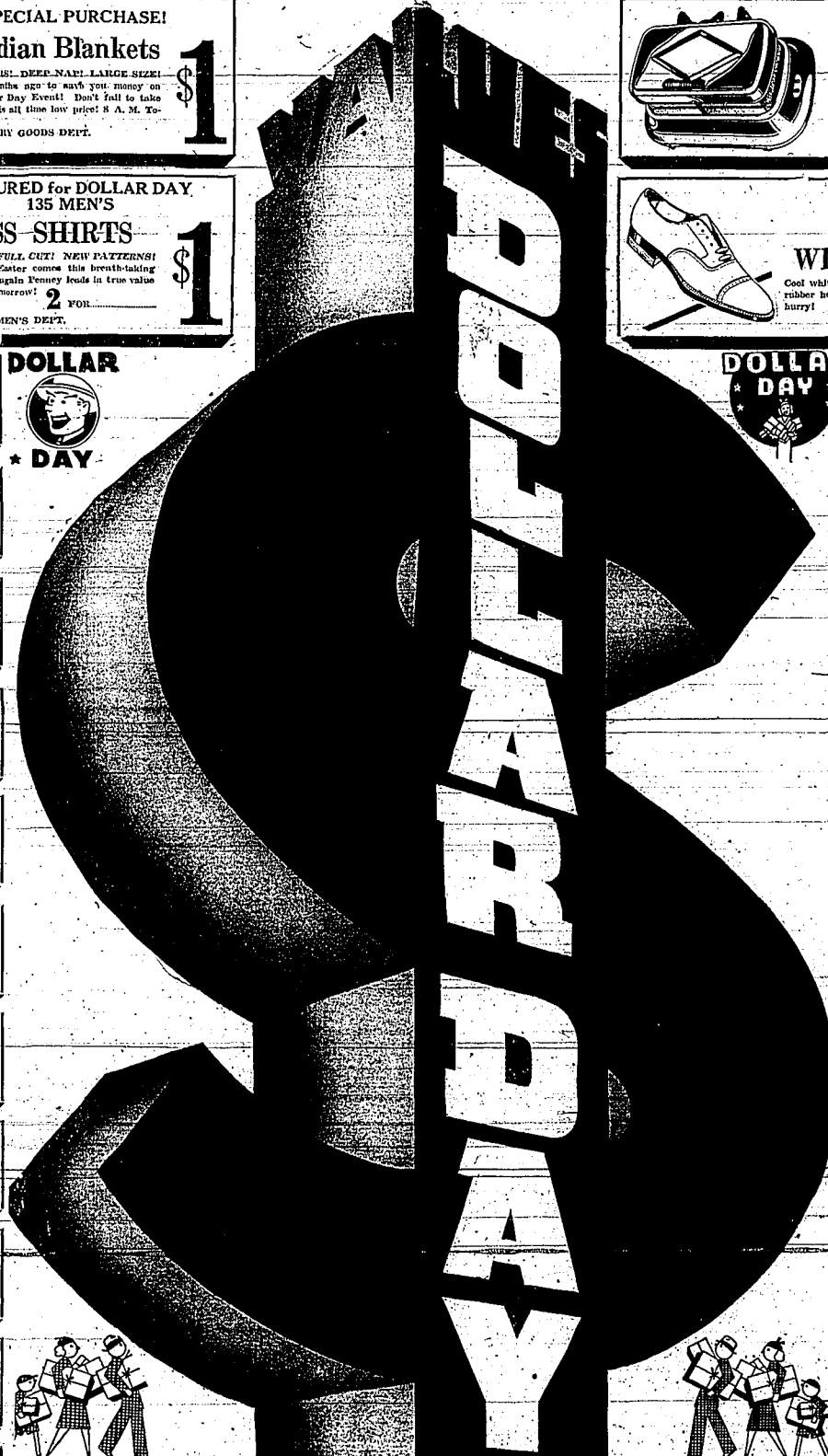
