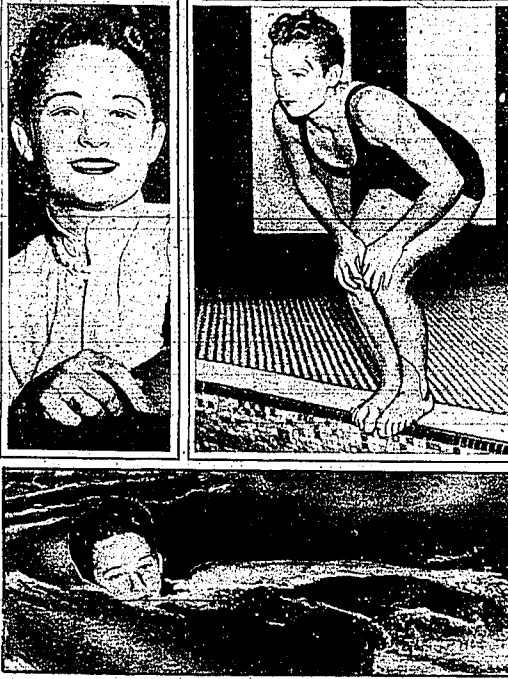
County Superintendents Will Attend Annual Session June 11-22

MOSCOW, (Special) — Knotty educational problems in Idaho, particularly those of rural schools, will wrinkle the brows of county superintendents of the state during their annual short course at the University of Idaho, June 11 to 22.

Idaho's short course for county superintendents, inaugurated as a summer school feature three years ago, is nationally known in educational circles. Thirty-five out of Idaho's 44 county superintendents attended last year, and 34 the year before. Of them, and other school people as well, are expected that the short course has earned its name, chiefly through studying educational affairs in the state.

John W. Condit, state superintendent of public instruction, will be in charge of the course. STAND
The energy and scope of the New Deal defense campaign indicates the general program is not going to be curtailed much without a struggle. The Wallace crowd decided to stand by in all the cabinet speeches there was not a word to link it to the same retreat in any important particular.

GHOST LAYING
The purpose of the Morgenthau side issue was not apparent unless you read between the lines. The main hidden reason he made was to point out officially for the first time that expenditures for the administration to conduct the war were not to be paid for by the Treasury. His secondary purpose was to show there was no real change in the administration to conform with a new tax plan this session. This should lay a couple of ghosts.

GIVE
The New Dealers are grieving privately about the loss of the Federal Reserve Bank. The Federal Reserve Bank will play with his fight for the elimination of that controversial section (Title 2) and that other section will be adopted. This advance grip was to be a little preliminary to what he has some of the appearance of being planned. The argument is not over yet by a long shot.

REGISTER AND VOTE

Twin Falls voters can cinch the results of the election April 2 by going to the polls Tuesday and making endorsement of the present administration unanimous in the elevation of office of W. E. Taylor.

He stands for an aggressive and progressive city government, he declares, and is seeking the votes of Twin Falls residents as an advocate and supporter of the kind of an administration which has been provided the past two years.

In the first election he lacked only a few votes of a majority and election, leading in the number of ballots received, the four candidates who sought the position made vacant by expiration of the term of Commissioner J. E. White.

Not only is Mr. Taylor entitled to the consistent support of voters for this reason, but as a candidate he possesses the qualifications necessary to fulfill the duties of the office.

Those who have not yet registered, have until 9 p. m. Saturday to do so. (The election is Tuesday and because of the importance of the office and its length of term, voters should be as diligent in expressing their preference as was the case in the general election three weeks ago.)

END OF LONG DISPUTE

Sale by the Soviet government of the historic Chinese Eastern railway to the government of Manchukuo removes one of the most patent sources of international friction in the Far East. When the Soviet ambassador accepted a check for 23,000,000 yen (slightly more than \$6,000,000) for Russia's interest in the road, he brought to an end a dangerous quarrel 40 years old.

Construction of this railway marked the beginning of Russia's great drive to the Pacific. It helped to bring on the great Russian-Japanese war of 30 years ago; in recent years disputes over its ownership kept Russian-Japanese antagonism alive.

There was always the danger that one of these disputes might boil over into a new war.

The sale probably marks the end of Russia's efforts to dominate the Manchurian plain. The number of reasons for trouble in that harassed region has been reduced by one.

THE PROBLEM OF CLARK

Recently the Pocatello Tribune called attention to conditions in Clark county as a striking exhibit of the craze for new counties that swept the state a few years ago. Clark, according to the federal census of 1930, had a population of 1122 souls. Of these, only 720 were on the farms. The others were in Pocatello—the county seat—that recently defaulted on a bond issue. The farm census, recently completed, shows that conditions in the county have grown worse.

This small band of men, women and children, in addition to fighting for existence in these trying times, are called upon to maintain a county government with the usual list of officers.

"It is a serious situation," but what is to be done about it? It is safe to say that if any resident of Clark county suggested abandonment of the county government, he would be horse whipped, and certainly no suggestion from outside would be welcome.—Halley Times.

THE DUTY OF THE VICTORS

Alfred A. Stacey, national commander of the Grand Army of the Republic, believes that the federal government should pay Civil War pensions to veterans of the Confederate armies as well as to Union men.

This, says Commander Stacey, would not only be a humanitarian act, it would help to remove the last vestiges of bitterness, and it would seal the harmony that now exists between one-time enemies. Such a move, he says, is "the duty of the victors."

Precisely 70 years have passed since the men in blue and gray laid down their arms. The hatred and suspicion of war days are almost dead, by now.

What more fitting way would there be for the country to symbolize this fact than to do as this old soldier suggests and put the Confederate veterans on the pension rolls?

CROWD OF 1,500 SEES MAN HANG

Condemned Prisoner Carries On Dramatic Ocollogy With Accuser

SMITHLAND, Ky., April 19 (AP)—In the presence of a holiday crowd of 1,500 citizens, William Thomas Deboe, a white man, was hanged today for rape. He went to his death smiling, and surrounded by his accusers.

In the crowd that saw his body dropped from the gallows, was Mrs. Marjorie Johnson, a storekeeper's wife whom he was accused of assaulting before the trap was sprung on the condemned man and the victim of his crime engaged in a dramatic colloquy.

Talks to Crowd Led to the scaffold in the bright dawn, Deboe "talked" rapidly, for most inaudibly at first, for 40 minutes. The great crowd watched him, restless but silent, while the executioners prepared the drop.

All of the principals in this Kentucky drama were grouped around the gallows during the final act. In the crowd, near the scaffold where the prisoner was led, was Mrs. Johnson. By the scaffold stood another woman, his father, and nearly was his 10-year-old sister.

Tried Aggravated Accuser "I tell you I was a robber—not a rapist," Deboe began. His eyes rested on Mrs. Johnson, who was silent, and he continued on his trial against her, against the state, against the witnesses who sent him to death.

He stretched out a manacled hand towards the woman. "If I had had any sense to give her, she would not have made the charge," he said. "I am sorry. I am sorry. For the first time, stirred by his charges, Mrs. Johnson's lips moved. "What for—thousand dollars," she shouted back.

Head Muffled Reply The executioners muffled his reply with the black hood and muffled the noise. A moment later Sheriff George H. Heater swung the trap and the crowd saw the desperate orator's body plunge downward. Sixteen minutes later, the execution physician declared him dead.

To prevent a scandalous hitch in the Good Friday hanging, the first execution of a white man for rape in recorded Kentucky history at Falls, Ill., of Illinois professional hangman, was brought in to supervise the business. But he didn't spring the trap.

While his legs and arms were being strapped, Deboe looked cool and smiled at acquaintances. He was given permission to speak.

Didn't Get Justice "I haven't got justice," he opened. "I don't see that woman around here. Where is she at?" Mrs. Johnson in the crowd?

He asked again and again until some one shouted "Yes." "Oh, there she is," Deboe said. "Well, how do you feel about it, woman? Is this going to satisfy you? You see, folks she don't speak."

Deboe was convicted of rape of Mrs. Johnson, 32, Tulsa, Ky., during a robbery of her husband's store, Ezra Davenport, 20, Okemah, Okla., who charged of being an accessory to the robbery and was sentenced to 10 years in prison when he was the third attack charged to Deboe.

MIDWEST G. O. P. CHARTING PLANS

Informal Parleys at Capital Promote Regional Rally Projects

By LYLE C. WILSON
WASHINGTON, April 19.—Farm belt Republicans will promote the regional rally plan of party revival, as gathering in the capital for informal parleys.

William Allen White, who uses his knowledge of the pep meeting plan but thinks there should be several of them, got to yesterday Harrison Springer, Iowa national committeeman and a co-chairman-in-chief of the mid-western rally movement, is requested en route.

Meeting Saturday Republican leaders ranging from rugged individuals to what he thinks will meet Saturday at a luncheon which started out to be merely a gathering of "housewives" and "green" White.

Publicly given, the luncheon plan brought invitations to Chairman Henry T. Fletcher of the Republican National Committee and to former Vice President Charles Curtis.

Strong mid-west sentiment for the pep meeting plan, also favored by former President Hoover, is reported by visitors from the farm belt. White has been mentioned as probable chairman and key speaker of the mid-west rally although the meeting has not been called and it is even possible that it may not take place.

Fear individual boom to year that someone will try to steal the show by launching an individual presidential boom or one of several potential nominees. Inquiries about the mid-west rally are uniformly referred to Springer who is working out an idea of "discussing the Judiciary" by Arthur M. Hyde and Patrick J. Hurley.

Hoover cabinet members, John D. Hamilton, Kansas national committeeman, and Frank Kane, publisher of the Chicago Daily News. Knox is among those who counseled against making the mid-west rally a springboard for individual candidacies.

If the meeting takes place it probably will be called by the national committeemen of participating states. After Mr. Hoover's resignation, this morning, it was suggested that several regional meetings be promoted. White approves of that plan but he is not sold on Mr. Hoover as a 1936 candidate. This is what he told the American Society of Newspaper Editors: Destiny Unsure.

"Nothing Mr. Hoover can do will affect my destiny. Either he will remain impossible or become the viable. The Hoover curve may be upward, it could not be downward. It may be a straight line."

To reporters, White said regional meetings in the mid-west, New England, the south and far west would be good for the party.

"No one will pretend," he said, "that these revolutionists, plasters, hairments, massages and psychic shots in the arm are basic cures of a disease which has not been diagnosed."

"Here is a new day with new issues. We are confronted with a debacle of a mechanistic civilization, perhaps debacle is too strong, but this mechanistic civilization is no longer a going concern."

The response of Republicans to this suggestion of regional meetings indicates how deeply the people are feeling about this whole business. The regional meetings should develop some real thinking

on the subject. Add this to dead sure—when any thinking is done publicly in this country, the Republicans will do it."
