### ROSS ENDORSES SAFETY EFFORT

#### Governor Supports Campaign To Reduce Motor Toll In Idaho

BOISE (Special) — Governor C. Ben Ross today has endorsed a traffic safety and accident prevention campaign for which the Idaho State Automobile association has suggested the slogan, "Live and Let Live."

Recognizing the fact that sales of automobiles have increased in Idaho more than the average for the United States but that traffic accidents have increased in even greater proportion, the governor expressed the hope that the press, civic bodies, traffic and police officers, schools and citizens embrace the opportunity to develop a universal safety consciousness. He specially spoke of the timeliness of the drivers' license law, and urged all to become familiar with its provisions.

Text of the governor's statement follows:

"Alarming Increase. — A sign of changing times is a notable increase in the number of motor vehicles, but with them has come an alarming increase in traffic accidents. The number of fatal and non-fatal fatalities in 1934 was greater than ever before.

President of the United States has emphasized the importance of efforts to reduce them.

"It is my understanding that the Idaho State Automobile association has suggested a campaign for the reduction of tolls on the highways during this spring for citizens of the state to give special thought to safer driving and to pose the motto, "Live and Let Live" as appropriate to the time and purpose.

"I heartily welcome this suggestion, and urge its adoption. I hope the press will carry this idea through the state and that motorists will lend their aid by discussion; that schools will take more interest in their teaching; that parents will become familiar with the requirements of the drivers' license law before its effective date, July 1; that police and traffic officers throughout the state will be more than ordinarily watchful and helpful; and that every person who drives will take pride in attaining more skill, more care and more courtesy to the end that accidental deaths and injuries may speedily diminish."

**TREASURE HUNT NEARING FINAL UNDERSEAS TRY**

SALAMOGSA, Fla., April 24 (Special) — Quest for \$200,000 in buried pirate gold and diamonds approached its final stages today as it was a "business" undertaking of long standing rather than an adventurous search.

The supposed treasure lies off Florida's coast in comparatively shallow water and only the chance discovery of the wreck of a ship by holiday fishermen kept the work from continuing secretly. A 300-foot wooden derrick has been built from the island at the place where the treasure is believed to be buried.

**Nationally Known**

A graduate of men described as "national reputation" is the direction of Capt. Clarence Roberts of Sarasota. He has been trying to recover the treasure since 1920. Work under the syndicate has been going on quietly for more than a year.

Shifting sands and a changing coast line have been the biggest factors in the past year, but the present undertaking has proceeded by a series of failures.

A steel cutter dam has been sunk around the spot where the treasure is believed to lie. Tank houses have been erected and a construction gang expected to move treacherous machinery to the dock this week. Actual search then can be started.

Roberts described in a statement the way the 300 feet of the treasure hoards "is made up," he said, "of a great deal of gold, jewelry and money and a smaller consignment of diamonds. The treasure came from Fern and was signed to the king of Spain. It was captured by the British and brought to the Point of Rocks (an outstanding promontory on the coast between Sarasota and Venice) and buried."

Roberts, however, candidly admitted he was not telling all he knew. He explained that if this first information telling him had been as complete as that he possessed now the discovery would have been made years ago.

### YUKON MOUNTAIN RANGE IS FOUND

#### Plano Party Sees Uncharted Peaks in Northern Area of Territory

SEATTLE (UD) — An "American Tibet" — a range of mountains at no point lower than 10,000 feet high, was discovered in Northern Yukon territory by a National Geographic Society airplane expedition. One Dabner, member of the party, has reported here.

### MINING STUDENTS IN HIGH DEMAND

#### University Unable to Supply Calls as Industry Booms, Dean Says

MOSCOW (Special) — Inability to supply enough trained mining men to meet recent demands in the pleasant predicament confronting W. Fahrwald, dean of the University of Idaho school of substantial improvement in the mining industry have been reflected in the number of calls coming to the school of mines this year for trained mining engineers, metallurgists and geologists. Particularly is this true of gold and silver mining, Dean Fahrwald explained, as for majority of requests for men have been from gold and silver operators in the northwest.

**Get Foreign Calls**

Happier days in the mining industry are not confined to the northwest by any means, Dean Fahrwald added. Idaho graduates have been placed in positions in other mining districts this year, seven in South America.

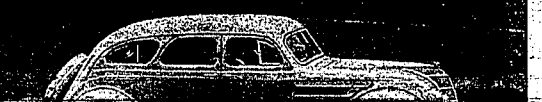
