Advices Leaders to Speed Up Proceedings as Aid for Recovery Drive

HOUSE READY TO HASTEN Lower Chamber Directors See "Must" Bills Completed

By EDWARD W. LEWIS (Copyright, 1935, United Press) WASHINGTON, April 25 (UP)—President Roosevelt has informed congress he wants adjournment by July 4. His construction program plans can go ahead under a "mid-summer" drive of monuments and proportions. It was reported today.

The house, at least, has cleared the way for the construction program. Under the President's program, it was understood by administration leaders. Under their tentative idea the "must" legislative program will have cleared the house by June 1.

All possible pressure was applied to expedite the rest of the must list through the house. The omnibus banking bill, the NRA extension legislation, utilities regulation and tax extension measures pass, the congress will be out of here by adjournment.

The house expects to pass this week the \$400,000,000 navy department appropriation bill, which was introduced in the house.

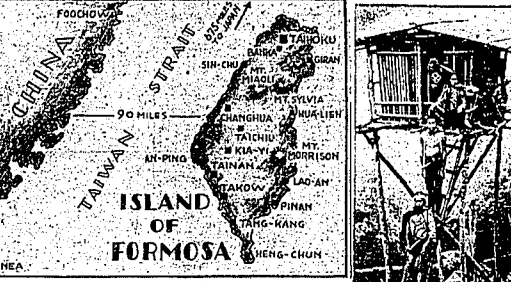

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DUST ILLS WILL GET DISCUSSION

Doctors Plan Detailed Study Of Effects Produced By Storms

PHILADELPHIA, April 23—Chronic disease of the lungs which may result from dust storms such as result through western states in March, will be thoroughly discussed when the American College of Physicians convenes here April 23 to May 2.

Medical practitioners, teachers and distinguished guests will be listed in the registration, which is expected to number between 2,000 and 3,000.

Practical phases of general sessions of the college will deal with practical phases of

medicine and trends of investigation. Papers and addresses on diseases will be read with particular reference to diseases of the blood vessels.

Other subjects include treatment of pneumonia, nasal sinuses, relation of vitamins to arthritis, dizziness, clinical meetings will be held in 11 hospitals and in the medical schools here.

One of the new features of the 1935 program will be morning lectures, at which diseases of the nerves and joints, disorders of the nervous system, affections of the lungs and disease of the glands of internal secretion are scheduled to be discussed.
