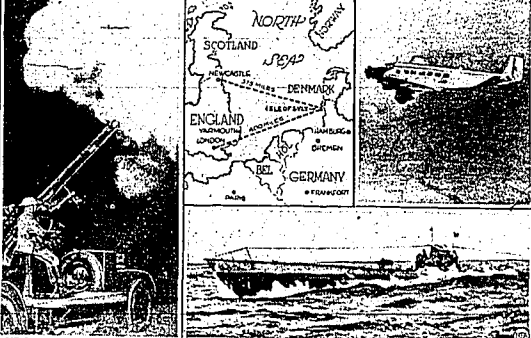

EXPLORERS SEEK NEW YUKON DATA
Expedition Delves Into "Last Unexplored Region" of North America.
By HILLEN RIEGHEBAUM
WASHINGTON (AP)—Six American explorers are "making their lives" in the blank space of the geography books in the last unexplored region in North America.

A BIG PROGRAM

The results of community cooperation were never better demonstrated than right here in Twin Falls where a variety of projects are commanding the attention of its civic groups.

The maintenance of a thriving city is no small responsibility for the welfare of thousands of its present and future citizens is at stake. A project undertaken here, a more stated there, may result in the investment of thousands, yes, millions of dollars, and provide employment for hundreds of local citizens.

And after all the basis for most of these new institutions, projects and events are dreams. Right now some of these visions are being realized, or are in the process of realization. These include the building of a community swimming pool, which will be free for the use of young and old. This week there were entertained in this city thousands of visitors at the State Music Festival, and the idea of bringing all those people here must have occurred in an off-hand moment to some individual, who must be credited with contributing greatly to the benefit of this city.

Two outstanding developments which have come because of the sheer resources of this section, but which were first dreams, are the new million-dollar power plant at the Twin Falls, adjacent to this city, and the announced re-opening of the Elkrore mines at Jarbridge, the benefits of which cannot now be calculated. This is true also of the large amount of building activity in the city, and the coming of new institutions like the Fidelity National bank—all of which are the result of visualizing the future of this community, taking into consideration, of course, its present resources.

But we do not stop with these things—we visualize a federal airport located near here, a Casper to Coeur d'Alene highway, the relocation of the great Bruneau project, to the west, in addition to the federal building, and the establishment of canning factories. The program is a large one but not beyond the realm of possibility. This tract, city and county even, are the result of the dreams of I. B. Perrine and his colleagues. This empire is the result of visualization of a future which has surpassed the fondest hopes of its builders.

There is reason then to believe in these contemplated developments and in lending full cooperation in their accomplishment. The civic-and-other-organizations which are taking the lead in this march of progress need support, cooperation and encouragement. That is all the majority of people need contribute toward the realization of the great future which lies in store for them.
