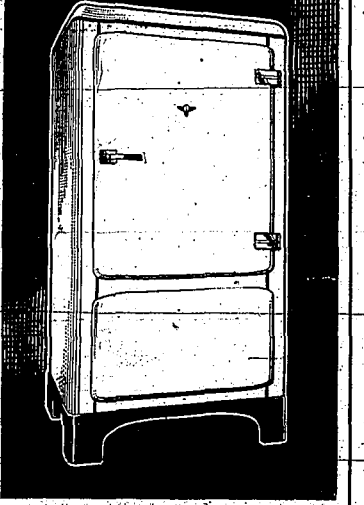
THRONG HEARS PENSION TALK
