Patman Bonus Bill Sent To Roosevelt

President Labors On Message To Kill Measure

WASHINGTON, May 17 (UP)—The \$2,000,000,000 Patman bonus bill today was sent to President Roosevelt by the House of Representatives. The bill, which would give a 10 percent bonus to all military and naval personnel who served in the World War, is expected to be vetoed by the president.

Mr. Roosevelt arranged to devote most of the day to drafting his message.

F. D. Roosevelt said the bill would make the president not only a "military man" but also a "naval man" and that it would give him too much information to the president.

The message is expected to go to Congress Monday.

The house, it is agreed, will override the veto, probably with a two-thirds vote.

The showdown vote in the senate is probably in the neighborhood of the middle of next week.

Plane Sets 14 Records

Transport Craft Makes Five World, Nine U. S. Marks

In Cruelling Test

NEW YORK, May 17 (UP)—Fourteen air records for speed and load carrying were set by a Douglas transport plane today. It landed after flying 3,007 miles in 18 hours, 22 minutes, 40 seconds.

The plane, a Douglas DC-3, established over 2,000 and 4,000 kilometer records. The other nine were new American records, with and without pay loads.

D. W. Tomlinson and Joseph Dierker, the Douglas pilot, set the records in a flight from New York to Los Angeles, a distance of 2,727 miles.

The grueling test undergone by man and machine was evident in the Douglas' landing at the transcontinental airport of 11 hours, 3 minutes, rolled to a stop in 11 minutes, 10 seconds. The plane, which had been in the air for 18 hours, 22 minutes, 40 seconds, landed with a fuel gauge showing 100.000 miles.

The plane flew a closed, triangular course between Floyd Bennett field, New York, Washington and Wiloughby Sp. near Norfolk, Va. Five flights were made around the triangle, each one bringing new aviation honors to America.

Defense Ships Scout North Pacific for "Attackers"

ABOARD THE U. S. S. PENNYCUFF, MAY 17 (UP)—The mighty armada of the United States battle fleet played a gigantic game of hide-and-seek on the Pacific today.

According to the maneuvers program, the Hawaiian islands and the western coast of continental United States were in jeopardy. It was the task of the "white fleet," consisting of 81 ships commanded by Vice Admiral Henry Lanning, to save the American possessions from attack.

Somewhere out on the broad ocean were eleven other ships, the "black fleet," directed by Vice Admiral Arthur J. Hepburn.

It was the climactic period of the annual war games, the high point of the fleet's maneuvers. Wartime conditions prevailed. Ship radio was silenced, except for the command ship, the fleet commander's headquarters, and the ships of the attacking force. The fleet was divided into two main groups, the "white fleet" and the "black fleet." The "white fleet" was to attack the "black fleet" and vice versa.

Boise Man Can Recall Talking To Abe Lincoln

An eight-year-old boy, he met Abraham Lincoln and spoke with him in 1860 when his father was conducting his first campaign for president.

This is one of the treasured memories of Mr. L. L. Lamb, who is visiting his grandson, Guy W. Williams. Mr. Lamb is an honorary member of the Lincoln club, well known Republican organization, and is the only one of the group who has had the honor of meeting the man for whom the club conducts annual observances.

The conversation Mr. Lamb had with Lincoln was so strangely significant in the light of later events that the boy's hand in his, Lincoln asked if his mother was living. On receiving an affirmative answer, Lincoln said, "Be a good boy and mind what she says and you will grow up to be a good man." And then turning to Mr. Lamb's father he put his hand on the boy's head and said: "Here lies the salvation of the nation."

Souvenir Gold Piece

Among his Civil War relics Mr. Lamb has a \$20 gold piece cast in 1860 and given him by a witness of the battle between the Monitor and the Merrimack. At the time it was in the possession of Mrs. A. F. Lyon, who later presented it to Mr. Lamb. Since then Mr. Lamb has kept the piece with him.

TOWNSEND ACTS TO BATTLE FOES

Takes Offensive in Struggle For Control of Pension Organization

OAKLAND, Calif., May 17 (AP)—Dr. Francis E. Townsend, originator of the old age revolving pension plan, shifted the defensive to his opponents today in a struggle for control of the organization which grew unmanageable in support of his program.

Speaking directly at his critics in one of the centers of the opposition to his rule, the former Long Beach, Calif., playmaker threatened them to reveal the sources of the funds being used in the campaign to unseat him.

Simultaneously he revealed that his own books were open for inspection at any time. Federal representatives, he said, had gone over them and had found nothing of interest in the handling of the money sent in by enthusiasts all over the United States to support the plan.

To critics who are demanding a national convention of individual Townsend clubs, the sponsor of the \$200 monthly pension movement said that the organization was not ready for a national gathering.

BALTIMORE, May 17 (AP)—A "butter and egg man" as dictator is what America needs today, like it from Ed Howe, a man editor and home-super philosopher of Atchison, Kan.

He cited John D. Rockefeller and Henry Ford as the type of man he thought ought to be at the helm to teach this country "that honesty is the best policy in politics as in business and put the country on the real upgrade again."

IDAHO AAA CASH OVER 7 MILLIONS

Total Expended Through U. S. Reaches to \$942,018,990, Tidings Informed

MOSCOW (Special)—Total expenditures of the agriculture administration from date of organization, May 22, 1933, to March 31, 1935, were \$942,018,990, Dean E. J. Tidings, director of extension, in which Idaho is especially interested, officials today's share in this total was \$7,430,838.65. Other payments have been made since that date, and still further commitments on existing contracts will considerably swell the total.

Administrative costs amounting to \$45,204,822, expenditures for removal of surplus totaling \$216,303,247, and rental and benefit payments of \$678,630,920 make up the total—Wheat, corn, hog, and sugar adjustment, programs in which Idaho is especially interested, accounted for \$422,238,070 of the total and brought \$7,238,803 to this state, tidings finds.

Three Get \$500,000

Three Idaho counties, Nez Perce, Idaho and Latah, received over \$500,000 each. Beaver, Blaine counties, Lewis, Oneida, Bonnevill, Bannock, Power, Madison and Twin Falls, received from \$300,430 to \$430,820.

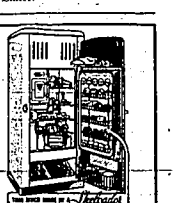
Burley Merchants Elect Directors

STATES INCREASE TAXPAYERS' LOAD Total in New Levies Passed Already Reaches Above \$120,000,000... CHICAGO (UPI)—Taxpayers of 30 states in which legislation has been passed since Jan. 1 will pay approximately \$120,000,000 in new taxes next year for one of the largest increases in American peacetime history.

PARTY MEN SPEAK Two significant campaign statements were issued this week. However, the country has not yet brought itself around to the point of listening much to Mr. Hoover. His long silence during the campaign days of the lack of constructive suggestion at that time, robs the value of his comments on the eve, so to speak, of another national election. It must not be forgotten that the next presidential election comes next year, and that 12 months hence, the Republican party will have pretty definitely settled the question of whether Mr. Hoover is to seek the presidency again. Indications are that at least he will not commit the fateful blunder of Coolidge in an "I do not choose to run" statement.

President Roosevelt must have been at his best when the delegation of farmers called upon him in the interests of the AAA program. He took advantage of the political opportunities of the gathering to launch a few jibes at those severe critics who have been charging crop and other foodstuff destruction, called upon his hearers for continued support and said "I think that you and I are agreed in seeking a continuance of a national policy, which, on the whole, is proving successful."

It is natural for the two men who are the titular heads of the major political parties to be thus engaged in virtual dispute. The pronouncements are but samples of many more which may be expected as the next campaign draws nearer.

PROOF OF SECURITY The great ocean flight of those four dozen vapour planes is a magnificent spectacle and a great demonstration of the long-range striking power of the modern air force; but it would be easy to go entirely too far in drawing lessons from the performance. As a proof that naval warfare has been transformed by addition of a new weapon of vast potentialities, the flight is without parallel. But it does not yet prove the truth of all those assertions that our secure isolation is ended and that we are within easy reach of the aerial fleets of foreign powers.

A flight of this kind in mid-ocean is a great achievement, to be sure. But a great battle fleet was on duty along the coast. There were no anti-aircraft defenses to leap over, no squadrons of hostile planes to brush aside, no obligation on the four dozen pilots to return to their starting point without a stop.

In other words, this flight does not prove that a European or Asiatic power would find it simple to send an air fleet over to bomb our cities. That may be possible some day, but it certainly is not the case today.

It is rather important to keep that fact in mind. We have a preparedness group in this country which is just about as militaristic as any similar group overseas; and this group can be expected to use this navy flight as the basis for a demand that we increase our aerial armaments until they are the equal of any other such armaments on earth. On the ground that we shall not be "secure" until we do so. A recent survey (published in the Aircraft Yearbook for 1935) shows that we rank fifth in battle planes, France, Russia, Great Britain, and Italy are ahead of us.

We have 2060 fighting planes, of which about 1000 are wholly up-to-date; and the Yearbook remarks that this is less than half the strength required to put us "on anything like an equal footing with other powers."

But the point to remember in all this is that we don't need to be on an equal footing with these other powers. The Atlantic and Pacific oceans have not yet shrunk to the dimensions of the Great Lakes.

Our air fleet may be outclassed by four others, but it would most certainly be able to overwhelm any hostile air fleet that could actually reach our shores.

That is all an advocate of national security can ask. We don't contemplate aggressive action overseas. We can be satisfied with security at home. And this Pacific flight is but short of proving that the airplane has been developed to the point where it destroys that security.

STOCK BOOM AND BARED AT PROBE

Aldrich Says Federal Reserve Under Hoover Attempted to Prolong Speculation

By LYLE C. WILSON (Copyright, 1935, United Press)

WASHINGTON, May 17.—Direct evidence of political pressure during the Coolidge and Hoover periods in the handling of the 1929 stock market boom has been presented to the senate banking and currency committee.

Winthrop W. Aldrich, chairman of the "Carter" National bank, burst in a 14,000 word condemnation of the Federal Reserve's handling of the 1929 stock market boom.

Aldrich testified before the senate committee. He complained of political control of banking and credit, and specifically that the plan would shift from the 12-year reserve requirement to the 12-year federal reserve board authority to change discount rates.

His Central Control. Referring to the new plan to permit a politically controlled reserve board in Washington, Aldrich said:

"This seems a strange solution, for on the whole the Federal Reserve banks have been better in the matter of rate changes than the Federal Reserve board."

"I do not especially to the long difference of opinion between certain of the reserve banks and the Federal Reserve board, but the proposed increase of discount rate in the first half of 1929 (that being Hoover's inauguration) is a means for curbing the rising tide of stock market speculation."

"The rate of the New York reserve board remained unchanged from July 13, 1929, until August 6, 1929, notwithstanding the fact that there in that period the directors of the New York reserve board were increasing their rates, and as consistently the Federal Reserve board failed to do so."

In other words, the reserve board was ex-officio chairman by virtue of his position as governor of the New York reserve bank, and as such he was able to increase rates, make money, and thereby curb speculation.

Vital Consequences. Aldrich continued, "had immediate consequences—both on the part of the public and on the extent of the collapse, and has had to be regarded as a most important factor in the Federal Reserve system since its inception."

Roy A. Young was governor of the Federal Reserve board during 1932. He was a Cooney and Cooney coming to Washington, in 1927 from governorship of the New York State Federal Reserve bank. Young now is governor of the Boston reserve board.

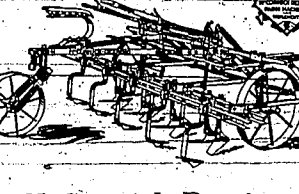

MINNEAPOLIS (UP)—Current political and economic questions being read by more than 100,000 library readers than any time in history, according to a survey of public library trends recently completed by the Northwestern National Life Insurance company.

Morgenthau Talk Offers Opening on Stabilization

By LYLE C. WILSON WASHINGTON, May 17 (UP)

The Morgenthau money speech gave foreign nations an opening to obtain as quickly as practicable and the common interest of the United States to nothing.

International significance of the speech must be judged in light of the President Roosevelt's first experience with world currency stabilization discussion in 1933.

First home reaction to the Morgenthau speech was a resolution offered by Senator Fuller. The President to call an international monetary conference.

On international currency, Mr. Roosevelt instructed the Americans to obtain agreement to the following propositions:

- 1. Stability in the international financial system should be maintained as quickly as possible in the interests of all concerned.
2. Gold should be established on the international measure of exchange values.
3. Gold should be used only for adjusting international balances of payments.

When Americans arrived in London the dollar already was depreciating in the foreign market. The foreign nations, notably France and Great Britain, were intensely alarmed.

France and Great Britain demanded temporary stabilization at least for a year. The conference, after which some permanent adjustment was foreseen.

U-P AGREES TO CONSOLIDATION

WASHINGTON, May 17 (U.P.)—The Union Pacific railroad today agreed to rules of the Interstate Commerce Commission under which it would accomplish a corporate consolidation expected to save about \$500,000 annually in accounting costs.

The regulations, laid down in an ICC decision of January, 1933, provided that the Union Pacific shall acquire as their commercial value the Laramie North Park and West and the Pacific and Idaho and Salt Lake, and the St. Joseph and Grand Island. The Union Pacific originally required to meet the ICC's technical requirements, but reversed itself after more than two years.
