

RECORDS LOOM AS DRIVERS START SPEEDWAY TESTS

AUTOMOBILES OPEN QUALIFYING ROUNDS

Average of 120 M. P. H. Seen Necessary to Win Polo in Motor Classic

By WINTHROP LYMAN INDIANAPOLIS, May 18 (AP) - New record scores for two-man cars were promised today as qualifying trials for the 23rd annual 500-mile Memorial day race opened at the Indianapolis motor speedway.

The present qualifying record of 110 miles an hour was established by Kelly Petty of Los Angeles in winning the pole position in last year's race. He established the record in the first round of all-qualifying trials on May 17, averaging 122 miles an hour for one of his 10 qualifying laps.

Predict 120 M. P. H. Pettilo and at least three other drivers are expected to try for the No. 1 spot in the starting lineup this year. To win the honor an average of 120 miles an hour will be necessary, it is predicted. The race is expected to start on Sunday. Drivers include "Wild Bill" Cummings of Indianapolis, last year's race winner, Lou Meyer, of Huntington Park, Calif., winner in 1928 and 1930; Mauri Ross, second year runner-up in 1934; Fred Frank of Los Angeles, winner in 1932, and Al Gordon and Red Dreyfus, two-time Pacific coast champions.

Four-Wheel-Drive - Ross is piloting the only four-wheel car in the race; Gordon, Mays and possibly Frank Dreyfus are expected to fight it out with Pettilo for the pole position. Frank is driving the car Pettilo used last year. The Milwaukee pilot had the four-wheel car in 1934, finishing in ninth place. Cummings, using the same front wheel drive Miller Four in 1934, is expected to contend himself with Ross for the pole position. He is the starting lineup rather than competitor for the pole position. He is expected to shatter records in the race twice in succession.

Others Will Try - Among the other drivers expected to qualify are Ralph Hepburn, Los Angeles, driving the car which won the 1934 race; Lou Meyer, Moore, Los Angeles; third place winner last year; Al Miller, Detroit; second runner-up; Bill Gates, Tony Gulotta, Kansas City, driving the car Rose used last year; Bill Gates, driving the car which won a Buick; H. W. Stubbliet, Los Angeles; driver of the 1934 Buick; John Johnson, St. Paul, Ind.; Chet Grier, Detroit; and Harris Instinger of Los Angeles.

George's ring of Detroit, one of 10 drivers assigned to the team of Ford V-8 car entered by Jimmy Miller, will attempt to qualify this weekend. Only two of the Ford cars, however, and the remainder being expected next week.

Must Average 100 - To qualify for the race each car must average 100 miles an hour in 10 laps of the one-half mile track. Gasoline consumption will be limited to three gallons and cars must be equipped with the same number of carburetors that will be used in the race.

The 23 cars making the fastest time in qualifying runs will be permitted to start the race.

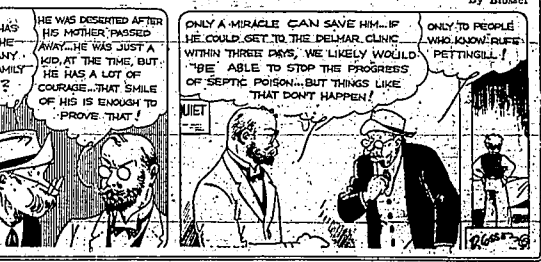
