By FRIEDRICH C. OCHSNER (Copyright, 1935, United Press) BERLIN, May 22 (UP)—Hitler believes that Adolf Hitler has laid before European statesmen a workable plan for solving Europe's problems.

They expressed profound conviction today from leaders to military citizens, that in addressing the Reichstag, that night, the Reich Chancellor made the greatest speech of his career and, in fact, the strongest plea for peace by any European statesman since the World War.

He offered Europe: Offers Arms Limitation of arms to a point on which the "great powers" might agree. Absolute fulfillment of the Locarno treaty which binds Germany, Belgium, France, Italy and Great Britain to attack any of the five signatory nations which attacks another.

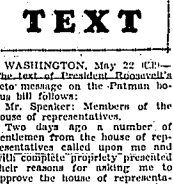

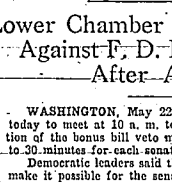
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NEBRASKA PLAN HOLDS S. EYE

Country Will Watch Pioneer Movement for Unimpaired Legislature

By WALT HUNDEB LINGCOLN, Neb., May 22 (AP)—Nebraska will pioneer an experiment in state government in 1937. Floating tradition voters at the state will elect but 43 legislators in November, 1930, all to be members of one teaming body which will replace the present legislature of 100 representatives and 33 senators.

As a further break with established procedure, Nebraska will elect its next lawmakers on a non-partisan basis.

U. S. Will Watch Eyes of many states will be turned to Nebraska when this state's first unicameral assembly is called to order on January 1, 1937. Several states are seriously considering constitutional amendments similar to Nebraska's.

Under terms of the constitutional amendment and legislation enacted by the 101st session of the unicameral legislature will be organized as follows: Forty-three members to be elected on a non-partisan ballot for terms of two years.

NEED FOR SOUND JUDGMENT

Widespread interest is exhibited in the Rayburn public utility bill now before congress and there is a division of sentiment as to its merit.

It is now opposed by practically every major business organization of the country, and unless it is adequately modified before prospective adoption, it threatens to become an onerous piece of legislation.

hat of them remained within our borders on the continental front. The other half served overseas; and of these the million, four hundred thousand saw service in actual combat.

These people and the government of the United States have shown a proper and generous regard for the sacrifices and patriotism of the four and three-quarter million men who were in uniform no matter where they were.

At the outbreak of the war, the president and the congress established an entirely new policy in order to guide the handling of financial affairs of soldiers and sailors. Remembering the unfortunate results that came from the application of the policy after the Civil war, they determined that a prudent and sound principle should be followed to supplement the uncertainties and to supply the direct sources of the same. It was the policy of the most complete care for those who had suffered disabilities in service. With respect to the grants made within limits of the national policy, the president and the congress have fully recognized that those who served in uniform should be given the same treatment as those who were in uniform.

Many Benefits
In line with this sound and fair policy, many benefits have been provided for veterans. During the war itself provision was made for government employment for the families and other dependents of the soldiers and sailors. Disability and death compensation was provided for casualties in line of duty.

The original provisions for these benefits have been amended many times by the congress. Later general assumptions for the families of those who were in uniform were written into the statute to provide for their claims for disability. As a result of this liberal legislation, one million, one hundred and forty thousand men and women have been benefited.

During the war the government maintained a system of life insurance at peace-time rates for men and women in service.

Generous provisions have been made for hospitalization, medical treatment and rehabilitation of veterans. You are familiar with the various benefits given to the sick and disabled.

In addition to these direct benefits, the government has provided for the interest and welfare of veterans through employment measures in the United States civil service. The government has provided for the welfare of veterans through the establishment of the department of labor, and through provision of favorable conditions in the civilian construction camps. Many states have likewise given special benefits to veterans' preferences in state and local public employment.

Vets Get Jobs
Furthermore, unemployed veterans as a group have been more largely than any other group from the expenditures of the great public works program of three billion three hundred million dollars made by the congress in 1933, and under which the new four billion dollar public works act is giving employment to practically every veteran who is available.
