HOUSE MAY ACT TUESDAY

Upper Chamber Holds Foresee Victory Despite Outlook For Split Fight

By EDWARD W. LEWIS WASHINGTON, May 27 (UP)—Administration pressure has been reported today to have opened the way for early passage by congress of President's new point, NRA, extension program.

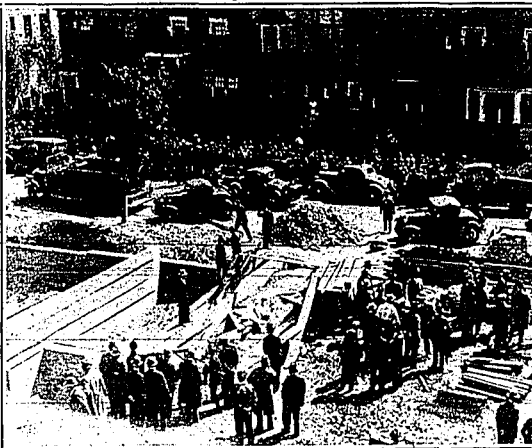

U. S. DRAFTS NEW WHEAT PROGRAM

Wallace Terms A-aa Victory In Vote as Mandate for Four More Years

WASHINGTON, May 27 (AP)—Department of agriculture officials today began drafting a new four-year contract with wheat growers who voted 6 to 1 last year for continuation of the A-aa crop control program.

The new contract will replace the present one which was adopted in 1923 and expire this year. A-aa officials said the four-year contract will be the longest term for which farmers have been asked to sign up.

The contract provides the A-aa crop will be a farmer to curtail his wheat crop by more than 30 percent in any one year.
