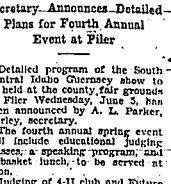

THE KIDNAP MENACE

The Weyerhaeuser kidnaping case at Tacoma again has the country aroused over the gangster methods which have terrorized the east.

This latest incident strikes close to home, having originated in a neighboring state, and involving as it does a prominent family connected with such a well-known Idaho institution as the Boise-Payette lumber company.

The methods smack very much the same as those which were used in the other famous kidnaping cases of late years and the case has all the elements of crime at its worst.

There is satisfaction in knowing that the government is better prepared than ever to cope with the situation. Experiences in the past, and success in running down the criminals involved gives encouragement in the Washington incident.

The public asks no more for those involved in such an offense for their methods strike at the very foundations of a peaceable society. They are entitled to no quarter and deserve no pity. They gamble with the lives of little children for so much money, bring fear to mothers' hearts, jeopardize the lives of all with whom they come in contact and set examples for crime without end.

This challenge set up by Public Enemies demands the full force of the government as an answer. An aroused public demands that nothing be left undone to spot kidnapers any place, anywhere and at any time.

LIKE GOOD OLD DAYS

Studying the news from Europe, one is almost persuaded sometimes that a grim and implacable fate it, at work, compelling men to duplicate the costly errors of former days.

One of the most recent dispatches from overseas told how Great Britain has at last begun a race to catch Germany's expansion of her air force. Production has been speeded up, plane and engine manufacturers have been forbidden to accept foreign orders, and a new defense program is to be presented to the House of Commons.

Given the present state of international politics, it is hard to see what else the British can do; and yet it is not the whole thing horribly like the Anglo-German naval race of pre-war days?

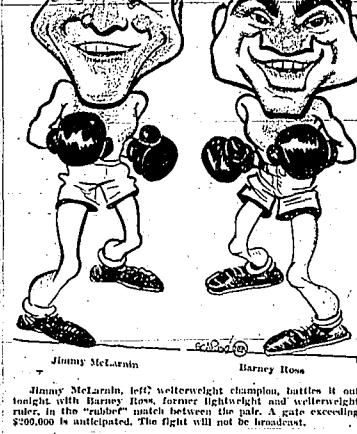
