THE FUTURE OF THE NRA

There is no discounting the serious blow delivered to the National Recovery Act by the supreme court decision of Monday. In addition the preponderance of the vote removes opportunity for discrediting the weight of the decision.

The alternative to abandoning the recovery measure appears to rest with the Congress in shaping a new act which above all is constitutional.

On the other hand, there is a wave of approval for the decision of the supreme court, it is proof that the act lacks the public support without which no such innovation can be expected to succeed satisfactorily.

The reaction in the present instance is certain to be varied, for admittedly there is universal approval for many of the benefits accruing from the measure, notably that which checks child labor.


