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# NRA FIGHT RESTS ON LONE PHRASE

### New Dealers Confronted With High Court Switch Back To "Narrow" Stand

 WASHINGTON, May 29 (AP)—The dispute over congressional authority to regulate labor's hours and wages as provided in NIRA codes centers around a single sentence in the United States constitution.

Section eight of the constitution affirms the powers of congress and its delegates to regulate interstate commerce.

"Regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states and with the Indian tribes."

Still Not Settled  
 That is all. All powers not expressly assigned to the federal government are reserved to the states. Years of legal argument and decisions have not established an interpretation of that commerce clause which is acceptable without further argument.

The supreme court has rendered decisions sometimes giving paragraph three a wide interpretation and at other times narrowing its scope. A famous "narrow" decision was rendered in 1917 when the child labor act unconstitutional. It was enacted in 1916 to prohibit the interstate shipment of child-made goods. Congress purpose, obviously, was to forbid factories to employ children under 14 years and reported to the commerce clause of the constitution to effect it. The act was held to "permit employment of two children."

Chief Justice Powers  
 A majority of the court in a 5-to-4 decision held: "The act in its effect does not regulate transportation among the states but aims to standardize the ages at which children may be employed in mining and manufacturing within the states. The goods shipped are of themselves harmless. In interpreting the constitution it must never be forgotten that the nation is made up of states to which are entrusted the powers of local government." The majority held in 1921—that the court held unanimously this week—that to permit such an invasion of state rights would establish a centralized and almost unlimited federal government for the system of sovereign states created by the constitution.

Broadener View  
 New Dealers were familiar with that famous case. But since 1932 the court has rendered broader interpretations of the commerce clause. One of these upheld the power of the interstate commerce commission to forbid excessive low intrastate rates because of their evil effect on interstate commerce.

Another decision which led New Dealers to believe that the court was in the 1932 Appalachian coal case. Coal companies were depressed by depression and wanted to step out threat competition and regulate production. The government was sympathetic but felt obliged to prosecute under the anti-trust laws.

Uplifted Combine  
 A lower federal court ordered the combine dissolved. But the supreme court took into consideration the existence of depression conditions and sustained the coal organization on the grounds that it was essential to the welfare of commerce generally.

This decision has been construed as meaning the court was ready to give liberal emergency interpretation to the constitution. Bolstering that belief were the Minnesota mortgage moratorium case, the New York state milk control act and the gold standard case.

But the New Deal is on notice now that its "recuperative" efforts must not transgress the limits of strict constitutional interpretation.

MEMORIAL DAY

New significance has been lent the Memorial day observance with the passing of time since the close of the last war.

One day the occasion honored the heroes of the Civil war and the great tradition of the day grew up around those veterans.

As the living veterans of both these wars decreased in numbers the World war came with America's participation, and so it is that for years to come there will be swelling numbers of heroic dead.

This day does not seek to glorify war, but only to pay a nation's tribute to those who have fallen while in the services of their country, or who bore arms while offering their lives for the flag they love.

The day is set apart for them—but all the dead are paid tribute on such occasions, for the bravery of those in uniform has only been equalled by many others who would have served had the occasion demanded, or had they lived when such a sacrifice was called for.

Memorial day, then, becomes a time for honoring all our beloved dead, with emphasis on those whose lives were marked by patriotic service. And the day will never die, even if there are no more wars to add new names to rolls of illustrious heroes, for those who have gone before have stirred pride, and love and exalted patriotism in the hearts of their fellowmen who strive on days like these to pay fitting, if feeble, tribute to those for whom they have increased devotion.

That is the peaceful significance of Memorial day.

PHILIPPINE TANGLE Something that deserves that over-worked title, "epoch-making" seems to be happening on the other side of the Pacific ocean these days, and we are not giving it quite as much thought as it deserves.

The 10-year independence plan seems to have won Philippine approval by an overwhelming vote. There remains, then, only the task of getting through the transition period as well as possible.

For the 10 years of the transition period, the United States still remains responsible for protection of the islands. Congress recently passed a law authorizing appointment of an American military mission to the Philippines. America will retain the right to intervene in island affairs until the decade is up.

Now there is no sense in denying that our relations with Japan are somewhat strained. There is also no sense in denying that there are some Japanese who would like to see the Philippines pass under Japanese domination. It is perfectly possible that a combination of these things might lead us into an extremely difficult situation, even after we have formally begun the task of getting out of the islands.

Raymond Leslie Buell, discussing the situation for the Foreign Policy association, suggests that there are four things the United States can do to ease this situation.

He suggests the granting of independence now, instead of 10 years hence, to avoid the difficult transitional period; signing of a reciprocity agreement between the United States and the Philippines, to save the islanders from economic collapse; employment by the new Philippine republic of expert advisers nominated by some such body as the League of Nations; and an international agreement among Pacific powers to guarantee neutralization of the islands.

In granting the Philippines their freedom, we are trying to do two things: do justice to the islanders, and find ourselves of a potentially embarrassing engagement. It may be that a program such as Mr. Buell suggests would do the job better than the one now being followed.

It would be an ironic stroke of fate if the "Philippine question" should involve us in trouble after we had formally started to withdraw.
