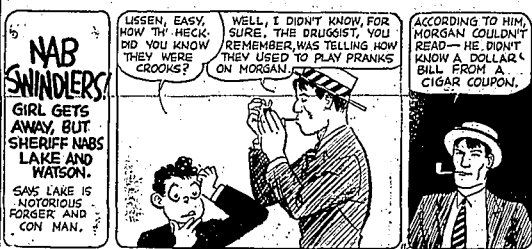

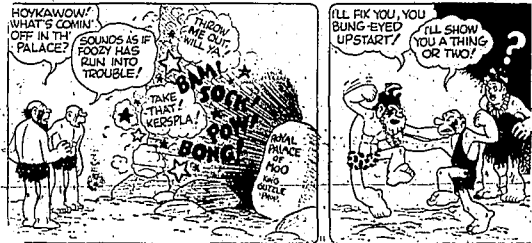

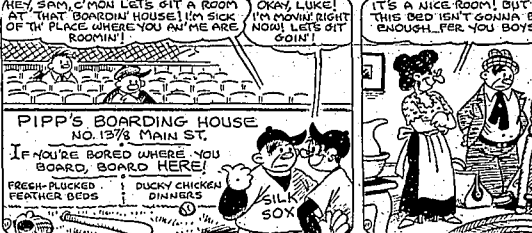

BARRIERS CHECK WORKS PROGRAM
No Money Actually Disbursed Yet as Officials Seek Best Projects

The official score of the New Deal's \$1,000,000,000 highway and bridge program today stood:—Depression, 3,500,000 unemployed families; relief rolls, New Deal, none put to work.

President Roosevelt made the fund available more than two months ago, on April 8. The New Deal has made no definite progress in that time toward ending the dole by July 1, 1935, by creating 3,500,000 jobs.

The exact status of the program is: 1. The division of applications and information has received 1,400,432,188. D. A. I. has tentatively approved 447 applications amounting to \$688,720,020.

2. The advisory allotment board has recommended to President Roosevelt allocation of \$1,103,000,000, including \$200,000,000 for distribution to states for highway construction and grade-crossing elimination.

3. Mr. Roosevelt has allotted \$314,213,000 including the highway and grade-crossing money, \$116,000,000 to the federal emergency relief administration for direct relief and \$198,213,000 to the U. S. army engineering corps, most of it for rivers and harbors improvement.

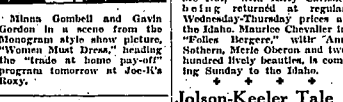

BANK CHIEF HITS CENTRAL EFFORT

Hecht Denounces Morgenthau Proposal for U. S.-Owned Institution

OMAHA, Neb., June 11 (AP)—Government owned and controlled central banks, such as proposed by Secretary of Treasury Morgenthau, were denounced today by R. S. Hecht, New Orleans, president of the American Bankers Association, in an interview here today.

"The very real and diversified of our nation tends to make a central bank impractical," Hecht said. "The American people are not interested in the national bank or government-owned and controlled bank."

"The central banks of Europe, such as England, France and Germany, cover areas not as large as some of the single states in this country," Hecht said. "The central bank here would be called upon to administer the financial policies of an area far larger and more diversified than all of Europe."

"The banker's future in America will not be a promising one if we turn back 100 years and expect to repeat a third time with a central bank."

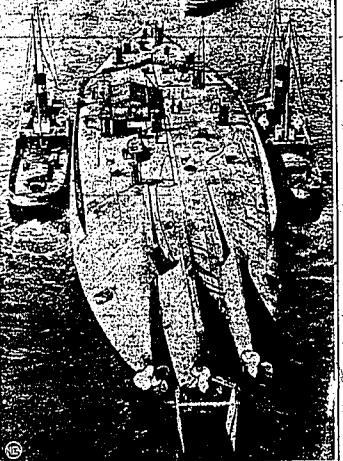
"History teaches us nothing," Hecht said. "It is almost certain that a central bank owned by the government will be conducted to serve the requirements of politics in the interest of the party in power, rather than the commercial needs of the nation."

Hecht predicted defeat for radical banking legislation. "I am not pessimistic enough to believe," Hecht said, "that these revolutionary ideas will prevail and that the banker's future will be reduced to nothing more than high class clerical positions under the civil service regulations of the government."

"I am firmly convinced the future holds better promise than ever in the form of opportunity for rendering wide and efficient public service and in helping mould proper legislation."

RAILWAYS STUDY NEW FARE PLANS

Rejection "Forecast" for Move Toward "Postage Stamp" Rate Idea

CHICAGO, June 11 (AP)—American railroads prepared today to make a study of a "postage stamp" proposal for standard passenger fares which would enable travelers to go 60 or 800 miles for \$3.

Representatives of the Santa Fe, the Milwaukee and the Southern Pacific railroads will serve on a committee to investigate the plan. The suggestion, originally made to Reamster by J. A. Hastings, former New York state senator, was received by railroad leaders with a mixture of concern and incredulity.

It was indicated that the committee will report unfavorably. Hastings' proposal would apply to railroad passengers the same flat rate theory of which the postoffice department operates in handling letters.

It would go even farther, and establish a national corporation to guarantee against possible losses by the railroad.

The same principle would apply to freight, each railroad charging a single rate of \$1 per ton regardless of distance.

Sponsors of the plan contended that it would provide of inestimable benefit to the country by stimulating travel and expediting shipment of goods over long distances.
