SENATE DEFEATS MOVE TO DELAY NRA RESOLUTION

Bans Effort to Saddle Bill With Amendment Likely To Mean Tieup

HUEY READY FOR FIGHT

Louisiana Prepares to Launch New Battle Against Blue Eagle Measure

WASHINGTON, June 12 (UP)—The Senate today defeated a move which would have added the resolution for continuation of the NRA with a controversial amendment deemed likely to complicate and delay the NRA extension project.

The Senate refused, 37 to 44, to approve the tabling of a motion for reconsideration of the bill, which it yesterday approved an amendment by Senator Huey P. Long, D., La., requiring Senate concurrence of all government employees earning \$4,000 or more per year.

The action's effect cleared the situation somewhat and made it possible for administration leaders to shift the bill to the House to plan to kill the Gore amendment on a reconsideration.

Although Acting Majority Leader Alben Barkley predicted early settlement of the NRA in the Senate, Huey P. Long, D., La., of the N.R.A., was in the chamber ready to continue his attack upon the Blue Eagle.

APPROVES RESOLUTION

WASHINGTON, June 12 (UP)—The House today passed the resolution extending the operation of the federal transportation control act.

The House passed the resolution on June 12, 1935, to permit continuation of pending surveys and studies of railroad lines.

A similar bill has passed the Senate. The House committee, however, struck out provisions in the resolution which would require the railroad to pay an assessment of \$2 per mile for expenses of the coordinator's office.

Stomach Ulcer Cure Reported Before Medics

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., June 12 (UP)—A disease generally blamed on the fast tempo and high tension of modern life has been cured by a successful treatment.

Dr. Winkelnstein, chief of the hospital's gastro-intestinal clinic, has cured over 100 patients with stomach ulcers by the new method during the last four years.

The new treatment devised by Dr. Winkelnstein is known as the "continuous milk drip treatment." The patient receives a rubber tube about one-eighth of an inch in diameter.

The trouble with past treatments, Dr. Winkelnstein said, was that they were given to the patient only during his waking hours.

GANGSTERS FOILED IN WEST

Results to date in the drive for the apprehension of the Weyerhaeuser kidnapers meet with universal approval, and especially commendable is the cooperation exhibited by law enforcement agencies.

Too often in such cases is there rivalry, jealousy and antagonism, but in this instance there seems to have been a full measure of cooperation as is indicated by the fact that the first arrest in the case was made by a Salt Lake City police officer, and the spotter of the gangster, Mahan, at Butte, was made by a municipal detective.

The famed work of the G-men has not been diminished in the least in this experience—rather respect for their ability has only been increased, but there is no discounting the large amount of effort put forth successfully by other agencies.

Twin Falls finds itself right in the center of the stirring kidnap episode for the story has "broken" comparatively close. For this reason the Evening Times, on account of its splendid United Press connections, has been able to bring the latest developments with amazing speed. On the same press circuit as this newspaper is Salt Lake City, where the first arrest was made, Butte, where the first large amount of ransom money was recovered, and Boise, where both Mahan and Waley were former prisoners.

Proximity of the final stages of the crime has lent increasing local interest to this latest crime of major proportions and has given residents of this section a touch of spectacular incidents in the type of crime which heretofore has been confined mostly to the east and middlewest.

It is a tribute to the spirit of western officers that in unraveling this case they have measured up to their responsibilities in comparison to the officers of the more metropolitan centers, and because of this there should be a definite deterrent to the staging of any more similar crimes in this section.

PARTY REALIGNMENT

Ever since the 1932 election the political seers and soothsayers have been scanning the skies for portents of that long-awaited realignment of political parties.

Just now the signs seem to be multiplying. In New York, the Daily News reports that Mayor Fiorelli LaGuardia will run for re-election in 1937 as a Democrat, with full New Deal support—and, apparently, with the result that Tammany Hall may find itself, to the vast surprise of the boys in the ward clubs, a Republican outfit.

While all of this goes on, there are repeated reports of an attempt to establish an anti-Democratic party. How much of this there may be back of all this smog is far from clear, but the rumors have even gone to the length of saying that Al Smith and Herbert Hoover will find themselves under the same banner in another year.

A political party ought to be as nearly a homogeneous group as possible. Its major policies should command almost complete support from its members; its name should stand for a definite program, so that when a man uses the label the public would be able to classify him.

That doesn't begin to be true today. Senator Glass and President Roosevelt, are both Democrats, as are Al Smith and Huey Long. Can anyone, without stretching the facts beyond recognition, say that these four constitute a like-minded group? And are Senator Norris, Ogden Mills, Senator LaFollette and Herbert Hoover members of the same party in anything but name?

During the next few years the American people must make fundamental decisions about their government and their social organization. It will not be easy to make those decisions; it will almost impossible if political parties remain formless and disjointed, as they are today.

A regrouping, which would make one party definitely representative of the opposing school, would make the task of charting a course for the coming generation infinitely simpler.

It is a known fact that a little paint can go a long ways—most women can attest to this—and also, it is true that when a neighbor starts improving his premises others readily fall in line.

The bright orange of the street markings and the brilliant red-hue of the fire plugs should encourage others to brighten up their properties and bring the distinctive note which is possible only by new paint. The lead taken by the city is to be commended.

ROOTS
WASHINGTON.—The best guide to what effect the dismantling of the NRA will have on business is a confidential study prepared by New Deal economists for circulation of officials. It indicates that a lot of people are jumping to hasty conclusions that many recent public notions are exaggerations.

The economists did not concern themselves with imagining future business psychology or calculating horoscope sentiment. They set out to find what could be reasonably expected in each major industry from scrapping the code of that industry, particularly as to prices, hours, wages, earnings.

ANALYSIS
The overlooked fact discovered by the economists was that the dismantling of NRA will probably benefit each industry in a mild and different way because the NRA itself held a mild and different policy in each industry.

For instance, the price-fixing features were not included in most codes, now being dropped recently or have not been entered. This is especially true of manufacturers of lumber, food products, household products, machinery, paper, etc.

BALANCE
The few industries which may be adversely affected are those whose beneficial relationships with NRA have developed recently widely; namely, cotton textiles, bituminous coal, liquor, fertilizer, copper, glass containers. These are the ones which were previously suffering from sharp cut-throat competition, were weakly organized.

COMPLIANCE
From these facts, the conclusion is obvious that not only have the codes varied for each industry, but compliance has varied widely. There are 537 codes signed, 200 of which are in force.






