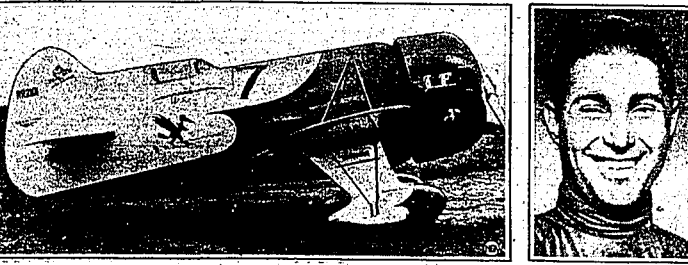

# FRISCO PRESSES CITY'S OWN NRA

### Fair Play League Attempting To Perpetrate Ideals of Blue Eagle

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27 (AP)—San Francisco sought today to perpetuate the Blue Eagle of the NRA through the voluntary cooperation of 7,000 employers of 40,000 workers in the incorporated "San Francisco Fair Play League."

The league had its genesis in a movement started by trade associations immediately after the "civic children" clipped the wings of the New Deal's eagle in the supreme court decision which nullified the recovery act and its code provisions.

Like the NRA's campaign managers, promoters of the Fair Play League will use emblem which will be displayed by employers affiliating with the movement. Leaders reported that already several hundred employers have signed the pledge of the organization. The deadline is July 5.

Each signer agrees to the following pledge: "I pledge my word, without mental reservation, to support this movement... with the utmost desire of making San Francisco in the place to work in and to make it in my desire to play fair with my employer, my customers and my fellow mechanics."

The pledge outlines the five major aims of the league, they are: 1. Employees not to work longer than they were working at the start of 1935. 2. Standardization of wages prevailing at the beginning of 1935 to be maintained.

3. Rules on child labor and rights of employees prevailing at beginning of 1935 to be maintained. 4. Advertising to be truthful and in the spirit of fair play to customers and other merchants. 5. An agreement not to sell, as a loss leader, merchandise at a low cost, except to meet a price set by a competitor.

Public cooperation to patronize merchants displaying the league emblem will be sought in a new paper advertising and publicity campaign.

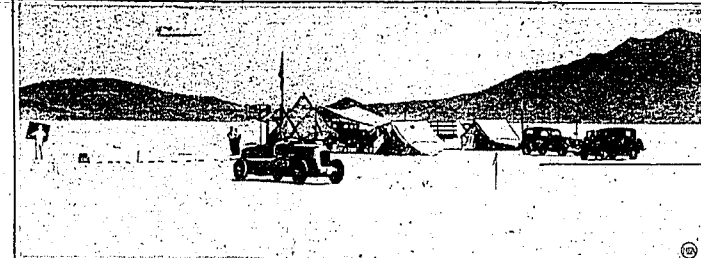

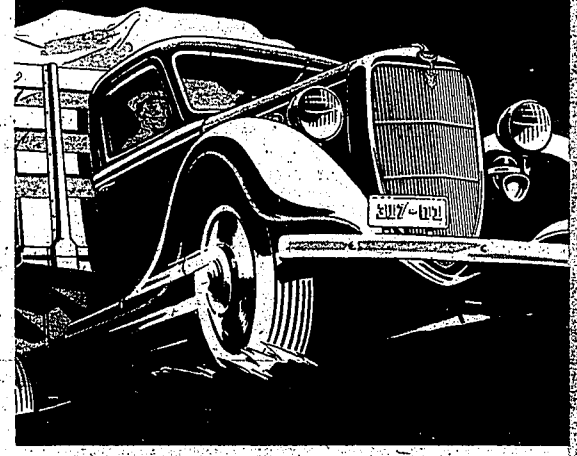

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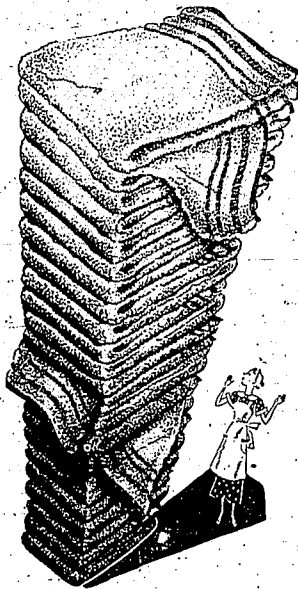
