WASHINGTON, July 7 (UP)—The avowal of support for Borah, Rep., Idaho, that he will not bolt his party during the coming election was taken by the public leaders today to indicate that the reborn Borah will not take part in behalf of the candidacy of Gov. Alf Landon.

His announcement, still leaving in doubt his own candidacy for reelection, will mean to the effect he might join other Progressives in supporting President Roosevelt, or might campaign on behalf of Rep. William Lemke.

To Republicans, word of Borah's decision was welcome news. The threat that he might not come into the race was regarded by them as a serious blow to the party, particularly by many as essential to party victory.

Your Baby's Health

The mother begins to secrete her milk soon after her baby is born. Occasionally a few drops may come from the breast even before the child's birth.

This milk is scanty during the first two or three days, but becomes profuse, in most cases, by the third or fourth day. Occasionally, the milk flow may be delayed until the 10th or 12th day.

If the supply of milk seems insufficient during the first 10 to 15 days, it should be stimulated by artificial pumping, or in some cases by massage.

The average mother will secrete from 10 to 18 ounces, or about a pint, of milk by the end of the first week. The amount gradually increases, so that by the sixth month she may be secreting a quart daily.

The amount of milk usually parallels demands of the baby. Complete emptying of the breasts helps to encourage the milk supply.

Milk from the mother's breast provides 20 calories for each ounce. During the early days immediately after the birth of the child, the thin fluid which is secreted is called colostrum. This differs from the milk which comes later. It contains more protein than does the later milk, and also

is richer in minerals; but provides less sugar and less fat.

It has been calculated that the colostrum of the cow contains substances which protect calves from certain infections. It is not known whether these substances exist in human colostrum, but the latter does contain a high percentage of substances with antibioid, affecting disease which concern human beings, are usually associated.

Doctors, therefore, insist today that babies should have colostrum, if it is at all possible for their mothers to provide them with it.

Infant milk which is secreted by the mother, after the first week, is about 87.5 per cent water, 1.25 per cent protein, 7.5 per cent sugar, and 3.5 per cent fat. The amounts of these constituents vary in different specimens, most variable being the fat, which may be anywhere from 2 to 6 per cent.

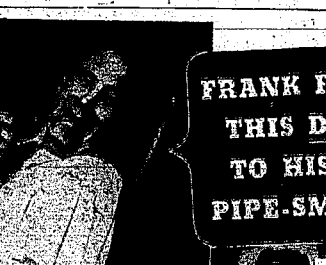

Re-education of White Collar Workers Believed Solution To Job Problem

The re-education of white collar workers into skilled or semi-skilled workers is the only solution of one of the vital problems of the national unemployment situation, according to Herbert C. Legg, chairman of the Los Angeles county board of supervisors.

Since the beginning of the depression, Los Angeles has been endeavoring to handle a greater number of destitute workers than any other city in the United States, with the exception of New York City. Here, an elevator has developed that is the final phase of the problem to solve is that of the white collar worker.

Here's a plan. In the plan which Legg is now promoting, the educator that large numbers of those who come in the so-called phantasmagoria of the unemployment problem are given the necessary training to get them out of the white-collar class into skilled groups of as much as economic authorities have found, to find employment for the last three in strictly white collar jobs.

Solution Not In Relief

Legg declares that the payment of a dole or even employment on work relief projects does nothing toward a permanent solution for white collar workers who are out of a job.

Breaders endeavoring to solve the problem by re-education of the white collar workers now idle, he insists, the future should be guided by a closer co-operation between schools, industry and labor.

Legg declares industry especially should keep the schools informed as to the trends of labor demands and that in turn instruction should be given to the students to take those lines of vocational training where they are most likely to find employment.

Out of Realm of Theory
In vocational education, we are confronted with a matter of fact situation. It is not a matter of theory, Legg insists. "It is a matter of fact, and it is not a matter of theory."

Society in the final analysis benefits by technological changes and so it should be willing to accept the consequent burden of unemployment.

Not only is the dispossessed worker entitled to vocational re-education, but the type of training should meet the requirements of changing industrial conditions. Such a procedure is necessary if our economic system is to be maintained with any degree of stability," Legg's final sentence.

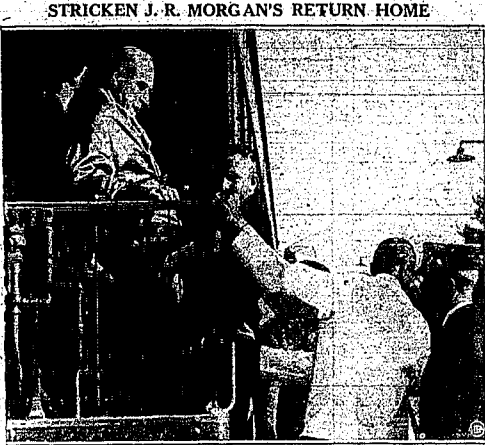

LOAN GROUP HAS VOLUME GROWTH

One Hundred Per Cent Increase Reported by Associations in Gen. State

WASHINGTON, July 7 (Special)—Idaho savings, building and loan associations report an increase of more than 100 per cent in the volume of their home mortgage accepted for insurance by the federal housing administration in May over April. It was announced here today by George T. Palmer, special assistant to the administrator, in charge of savings and loan activities.

"The Idaho associations' mortgage accepted for insurance in May total \$25,850 as against \$24,700 in April," said Mr. Palmer. The largest volume of mortgage business done in cooperation with the federal housing administration by these associations was in January when mortgages totaling \$22,500 were accepted for insurance. This brings their cumulative total as of June 1 up to \$307,815, represented by 133 mortgages. This is 42.15 per cent of all mortgages insured by the federal housing administration in cooperation with all active lending institutions that state. The percentage places the Idaho associations in sixth place in comparison with the associations in all other states.

PRECIPITATION IS AT 10-YEAR HIGH

Precipitation for the first half of 1936 totaled 7.76 inches, the highest for all corresponding periods since 1918 and within two inches of the average 12-month fall of 8.76 inches, according to statistics compiled by F. R. Douglas, U. S. bureau of entomology and cooperative weather observer.

Average maximum temperature for June were above average for the past 41 years, but were below in 1923 and 1934. Average high temperature for the month was 82.3 degrees, and the low average was 48.2 degrees. In 1920 the high figure was 88.4, with the thermometer rising once to 104, and in 1923 the high figure was 86.6, with a high of 102.

The only times within a decade that the temperature has risen above the 100 mark.

Precipitation in June was 1.61 inches, and the highest since 1932.
