Borah Asserts Farm Prosperity Depends On Regulated Money

Claims Congress Must Re-Assume Its Powers

NAMPÁ, Idaho, July 9 (UP)—Senator William E. Borah, in the first speech he has made since announcing his candidacy for re-election, revealed the tenor of his coming campaign today when he attacked monopolistic powers, showed the danger of currency controlled by banking interests and warned against foreign alliances.

Idaho's senior senator also discussed the farm problem in addressing 600 members of the state Grange.

"You can cure all the emergency schemes in the world and you'll never solve the farm problem until you restore purchasing power and institute a monetary system which protects the needs of the people as much as it does the huge banking interests.

"The congress assumes its power to regulate money, there will be no prosperity for the American farmer."

Borah said any successful farm program must be based on the fact that the American market belongs exclusively to the American farmer.

All recently tried solutions to the farm problem, he said, have been in good faith. Borah told the farmers, "We can't judge the faith of the programs from their results however.

"The present farm imports program is no indication of the products so long as the American farmer is able to fill the demand. Speaking on monopoly, Borah said: "Both the old parties favor destroying money, but they don't destroy it after the fact. The money they still hold that view must expect relief from the government."

Borah said monopoly could be curbed simply.

"Monopolies must have charters granted by federal or state government. Just revoke the charters."

Farmers desire peace, he said, "but they don't want a peace which is not a farmer's peace."

JAPAN'S TROOPS AT ENTRANCE TO FORBIDDEN CITY

CHINESE WORRY REVIVES Soldiers Manhandling U. S. Press Correspondent at Peking; Complaint Filed

Encampment Outside One-Third Imperial Palace Arcades
Fear of Coup

PEIPING, China, July 9 (UP)—Japanese troops camped today at the main entrance to Peking's forbidden city, the former imperial palace, hours after the dragon throne of the Manchu dynasty.

The action, anger panic among the populace and revived Chinese fears that the Japanese are contemplating a coup de force under which Emperor Kang Teh of Manchukuo might be returned to the throne of his fathers.

The Japanese moved in the forbidden city without warning.

The forbidden city is located in the center of Peking and the quarter in which foreign embassies are situated. Troops at the Japanese embassy were heavily re-enforced yesterday by detachments which staged an impressive military demonstration in the legation quarter.

Trucks Rumble In

The military trucks and tanks which transported the Japanese soldiers from Peking to the forbidden city later rumbled down the Tung Chang An Chieh, the main thoroughfare between the imperial city and the legation quarter, and into Hatanan, a suburb of the chief business district.

M. E. Fisher, United Press correspondent, was manhandled by two Japanese soldiers who seized his camera and attempted to photograph the display of Japanese armaments. He escaped Fisher violently and contacted his office without warning.

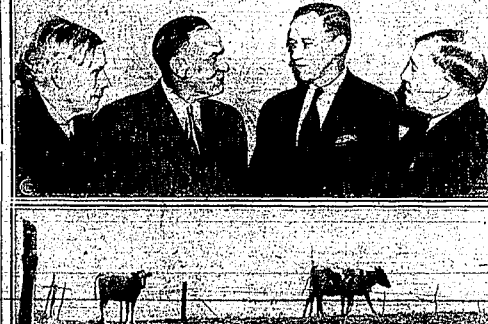
The commander of the Japanese column, who refused to give his name, ordered the Japanese to "The gentlemanly will give you a new film."

ITALY PURCHASES U. S. WAR GOODS

Rome, With Embargo Lifted, Steps In Munitions Mart

WASHINGTON, July 9 (UP)—Italy, freed of the embargo and freed by the United States during the conquest of Ethiopia, stepped into the American munitions market and bought \$140,000,000 worth of war materials in the last 10 days of June.

The statistics compiled today by the State Department revealed by the state department allowing the purchase of export licenses for arms, ammunition and airplanes issued last month. In all, \$1,507,743,000 worth of fighting equipment was supplied to the rest of the world by American manufacturers.

Buys Airplane Parts

Italian purchases largely consist of airplane parts, wings and engines.

The summary of exports was a long list of military equipment throughout the world. China, Britain, Canada, and perhaps preparing for further Japanese incursions in the north.

Italy is the largest individual purchaser, taking \$299,200,000 worth of goods.

These included machine guns, aerial gun mounts and airplanes.

The monthly purchases were less, however, than in some months. It has been buying at the rate of around \$1,000,000 per month.

Japan Buys Little

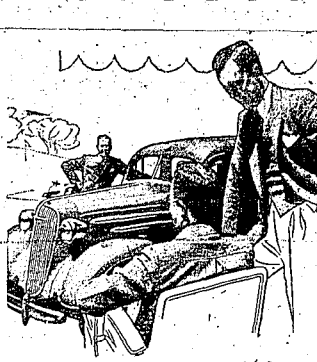

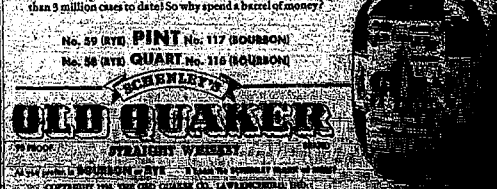
