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RADIO CHAIN FOR INDIA EXPECTED

Construction of Nine Stations Recommended by British Research Agent

DELHI (U.S.)—Immediate construction of a radio chain of nine new transmitting stations, located in various parts of India, is recommended in a report made by M. L. Kirkie, director of the British Broadcasting Company's research department.

Construction of an elaborate radio system, in keeping with Viceroy Lord Linlithgow's announced policy to make the fullest possible use of radio, this medium will be used extensively in India's new campaign of rural reconstruction.

Kirkie has just completed an intensive study of broadcasting problems in this country.

It is estimated that the first consideration must be distribution.

Scattered locations To carry out this program he reports, medium wave transmitting stations should be established in various parts of India.

These stations should carry in language and program material for the province in which they are located.

His report indicated India offers a large field to the manufacturer who can produce cheap, simple receiving and transmitting sets that are not only secure but also are easily made from Delhi, Calcutta and Bombay.

"Simple short-wave programs are required for English listeners."

He said the research work to be undertaken immediately to enable maximum benefit from large sums of money the government plans to spend on radio broadcasting.

Indian universities and three scientific institutes already have started work on various radio and broadcasting problems.

GEN. COXEY GETS BID FROM CIRCUS

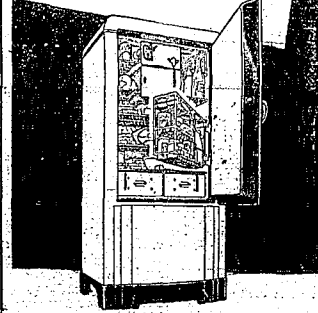

D. A. V. DEMANDS JOB "FAIR DEAL"

Convention at Milwaukee Will Ask Preference for Vets Wounded in War

MILWAUKEE, July 17 (UP)—Two thousand men who were wounded in the World war will assemble here July 18 at the national convention of Disabled American Veterans to prepare demands for a "fair deal" in obtaining jobs.

Marvin H. Hurdin, El Paso, Tex., national commander, predicted the convention would adopt a resolution urging congress to enact legislation giving disabled veterans preference on government jobs.

"One of the greatest handicaps facing us is to find employment for the partially disabled," Hurdin said. "As these disabled veterans grow older their opportunity for employment lessens. Their disability prevents them from competing in the open labor market."

Reason Disapproval was given by Virginia, Cincinnati, O., national industrial director, predicted the convention would go on record opposing a general veterans pension law.

"The government should provide for its disabled war veterans first," he said.

Other resolutions the delegates will present to the convention, Hurdin said, would improve hospital care, rehabilitate disabled veterans, dependency claims, national credit and subsidies.

Franklin D. Speck, national director, said the convention will bear present-day speakers discuss veterans' problems.

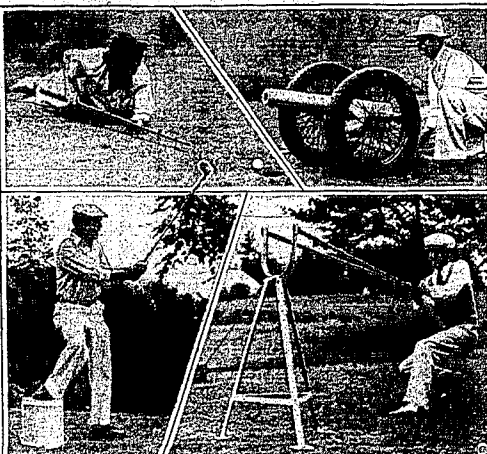

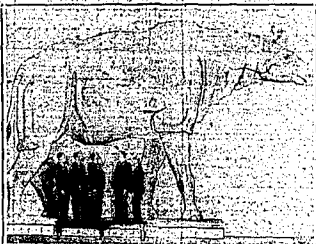
PRISONER WORKS ON NEW DEVICE

LONG-RANGE GUNS FOR WEST COAST

Thirty Mile Artillery Guards Golden Gate from Mass Naval Invasion

SAN FRANCISCO (U.P.)—The Pacific coast's defense now is to be augmented by the installation of four new 20-inch guns, according to announcement of Maj. General S. S. Simons, the commander of the 5th Corps Area. With a range of nearly 30 miles at sea, the new guns always will have the job—if they ever have it—of firing at invisible targets. Just as a matter of practice, it is expected that the gun crews will be given practice that apparently by shooting at invisible targets at that distance.

Super Protection

Installation of the massive pieces of ordnance will give San Francisco the ultimate in foreign protection from invasion by a foreign fleet.

Gunners, stationed beside the huge guns—called 16-inch rifles in army parlance—can bombard enemy ships with projectiles weighing more than a ton while the vessels are far beyond the range of vision of observers on the coast. The guns were built as part of the army's policy of expanding fighting units and improving coastal defenses, approved by the last congress.

Big Crews

While 60 or 90 men will be used to fire each gun, double that number is needed for range-finding and other details of firing at an unseen target. In time of war, army officials state, 200 men would be assigned to each gun.

The huge concrete and steel gun magazines or bases will be set up north and south of the Golden Gate. Two will be erected at Fort Point in Marin county, on the opposite side of the Golden Gate from San Francisco.

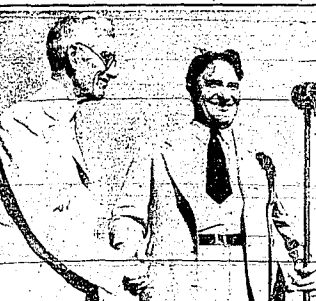

TOYOYO (U.P.)—The suicide problem has become so important in Japan, where love entanglements and the desire to join loved ones in death cause the self-destruction of some 20,000 persons annually, that a special clinic to curb the practice has been established.

Toyo police are combating a revival of the practice of committing suicide by leaping from the city's taller buildings. There were three such cases within a recent week.

Ryunsuke Kobayashi, known as a "suicide specialist," has been placed in charge of an office operated by the Japan Suicide Prevention society. He will seek to dissuade those bent on suicide from carrying out their plans.

Kobayashi, in his early 40s and with long experience in dealing with such problems, will interview persons who have come to believe that death is the only answer to their troubles.

He will specialize in warding off, an hour.

AIR TRANSLATOR BUSY IN FRANCE

Radio Listeners Given Expert Interpretation of Speeches From Abroad

PARIS (U.P.)—Probably the most difficult job of translation in the world affairs is carried off with the greatest ease by the air translator station of the French Radio Institute. In a speech from London, the translator is required to translate the speech into French, over the state network. The translator who follows interpreters in other languages and receives news by listening to the broadcast and in the microphone before him the speaker as he listens. The phrase by phrase the mouth he receives, he is listening to the speaker as he listens. If a person couldn't hear the words he would follow the speaker's lips, which would be whispering, becomes threatening, cajoling, humorous, serious as the man to whom he is listening changes tones.

Four Languages

Immediate translations (consecutive) are provided by the French radio forces from four languages—German, Spanish, English and Italian. Perhaps the hardest test the translators were put to came after the Himmler lecturing, when Hitler's speech was retransmitted in French simultaneously with his reception. For half an hour, three quarters of an hour, an hour without a breath, the translator was striving ever nerve, holding himself taut, order not to miss a single syllable, and putting on the air in French the German sentences whose verb, an adjective whose meaning, usually came last in the sentence, and though it were designed for no other purpose than to trip up the unwary translator.

Instant Original

And with the speeches went the imitations of the single voice of Hitler, with which he has seared over those hostile to his ideas by sheer force, however in French version when the German was announced, soft when it was soft, and rising in the climax to a pitch of force that made the preceding French for the moment to have the harsh pounding quality of German.

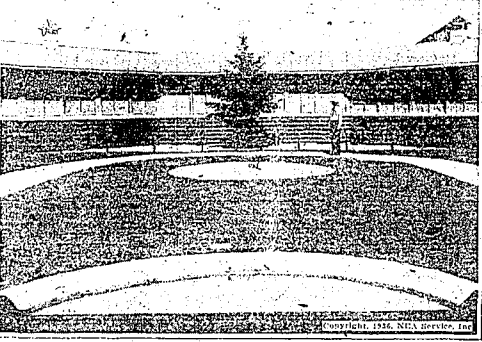

MILDEW PERILS WINE IN FRANCE

Unusual Weather Causes Big Drop in Production of Famous Beverages

FRUIT UP—The dreaded mildew menace again threatens French wine crops this year. Unusual weather conditions, ranging from premature warm weather to late cold snaps with continued rains in some sections of France, have played havoc with many of the crops, with the result that mildew already has attacked the vines in several regions.

It is expected that France's wine production for 1936 will be from 1,000,000,000 to 2,000,000,000 liters less than the average year.

Cold Caused Losses
The late cold wave caused complete losses in some restricted localities, but not over wide areas in many regions, notably the Haut Rhin, Chion and Sauerne districts, floods damaged vines situated in low sections, while those on the hillsides were untouched.

The grape vines were saved due to the care of the vineyard workers, who frequently stayed up many nights to guard the delicate vines from frost.





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

All desiring to be assigned to blister rust camps are requested to register at the U. S. re-employment service at 136 Second street east, Twin Falls, by noon Saturday as the bus for northern Idaho will leave Monday at 4 a. m. it is stated.

The wage is the hourly wage, \$44 to \$50 per month, with a deduction of 20 per cent for board. All men will be assigned by the U. S. employment service to the labor camps at \$44 per month, and the forest service will select the men from those for the better ratings. One man in each three will be selected as a crew leader or foreman at \$50. Timekeepers, checkers and all other responsible positions will pay \$53 and \$50 per month with a 20 per cent deduction for board.

Everything is furnished for the worker, including transportation and bedding. The only thing the worker must furnish is his own clothes. He must have heavy shoes, either hickory or canvas, it is stated.

Blister rust employment will last until October 15, and there will probably be subsequent assignments, officials stated.
