

DEADMAN'S CURVE Most every day we read of a person or two in the intermountain country, being killed because a car, misnamed a 'curve,' failed to round a corner, or careened off the road.

In many of these cases the principal fault is with the road itself. Drivers inexperienced with the peculiarities of the roadways find themselves victims of death or accident because they have relied too much upon road engineers. No more worthy or needed construction activity could be undertaken than the correction of these death traps.

As first as is the program to eliminate railway crossings with overhead passers, there never has been, in this section, the real danger from trains as are permitted to exist on haphazard highway corners.

One such, which constitutes an outstanding example of official contempt for the safety of highway travelers is 'deadman's corner' north of Filer on the state highway. Of the thousands of turns in the road between here and the coast, none is quite so sharp, so dangerous, so deadly as this one, as has been proved.

Numerous wrecks there, with at least a score of persons sent to hospitals on different occasions, and at least three deaths, one of which occurred this year, have failed to bring official recognition of the inherent danger to every motorist who passes that way.

Every civic organization in the country should join in a united campaign, to correct this persisting evil. If enough pressure is brought to bear the corner can be changed so as to correct it into a safe, rounded curve.

This newspaper intends to keep hammering on this matter until 'deadman's curve,' and any other such hazardous corners in this area, do indeed exist.

BUSINESS HAS CONQUERED DEPRESSION Several years ago, when the picket fires of our economy seemed to be flickering out against the approaching night, someone asked an economist when the depression was going to end.

"It will end," he remarked drily, "about six months before we realize that it has ended."

Looking over this broad land today, one is forced to wonder if it isn't about time for us to wake up and realize that something happened to us some six months ago.

For the America of 1936's midsummer does not have the look of a land that has crawled down under the weight of calamity. Which are turning as they have not turned in years, factory chimneys are contributing their agreeable mugginess to the city air, and people are busier once more and act as if they were going to be even busier.

Let us, as some statesmen or other used to say, have a look at the record. The Federal Reserve board's index of industrial production reached 100 in April and has gone higher since then—the '200' being the level of 1923-25 activity.

Index numbers of the department of commerce, using those same pre-depression years as a base, show automobiles at 130, electric power at 121, petroleum at 142, and steel ingot production at 91.

Building contract figures are up. Production of copper and bituminous coal is far ahead of the same level last year. Steel has gone close to 1929 levels.

The 'summer slump' has failed to materialize. Freight car loadings have risen. The Johns-Manville company, which produced building materials, foresees a full decade of rising construction and activity.
