Thousands Stream Into Topeka for Acceptance

TOPEKA, Kan., July 23 (UP)—Republicans from the prairie states doaned the buckskin and homespun of their pioneer fathers today to parade before America's party's endorsement for Alf M. Landon.

A prairie sun as warm as the welcome of Kansas bent against the gay pattern of flapping flags and banners under which paraders gathered to swell for 100,000 visitors a living tapestry of the pioneer west.

Visitors from every state streamed into the capital on special trains, by plane and automobile to find Topeka proudly ready to make the day memorable in its 100-year history.

Along the streets straggled legion companies from the ancient hunting grounds of the southwest, from the mountains of Nevada, Utah, and Arizona, and from the blue overalls of the wheat fields of the West. The parade was a spontaneous in olive drab and white-topped hats reminiscent of the frontier scout.

Milking across the sun-drenched capital grounds were visiting farmers wearing carrying parols in the shape of huge banners. The women of the parade, in their white dresses, talked politics on the street corners and watched the marching of the parade with the same interest as the men.

Most of the distinguished visitors and party leaders arrived before 10 o'clock. The parade was held at 11 o'clock.

HEAT BRINGS ON WARMER NIGHTS

Sleeping Hours Show Steadily Higher Temperatures Under Current Heat Wave

Progressively warmer nights in this region reached a climax this morning when the thermometer failed to go lower than 68 degrees, the highest temperature of the season, according to the U. S. bureau of entomology report.

For 19 days the mercury has held above the 64-degree mark, the coldest temperature for the night which ordinarily falls in this section.

Warmer Nights

Since conditions have lessened, temperature was 69 degrees today morning. On Monday the temperature was 68 degrees, yesterday it was 66 degrees.

Last week started off with 66 degrees on Monday, but was followed by 64 on Tuesday, 63 on Wednesday, 62 on Thursday, 61 on Friday, 60 on Saturday, and 59 on Sunday.

17 FIRES RAGING IN IDAHO FOREST

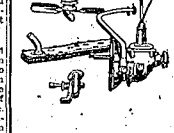

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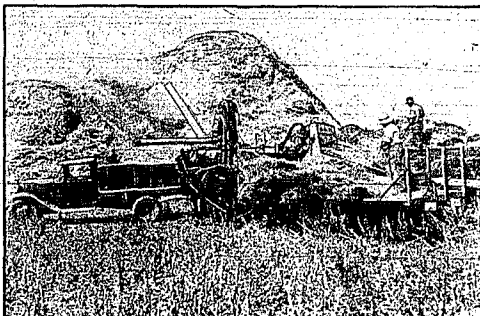
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BUMPER CROP OF JOY FOR KANSANS

GRADE CROSSING DEATHS DECLINE

Total for March Took Drop As Compared With Figure One Year Ago

WASHINGTON (AP)—Accidents and fatalities at highway-railroad grade crossings declined during March as compared with the same month of 1932, according to the safety section of the Association of American Railroads.

During March, grade crossing accidents totaled 238, compared with 252 fatalities for the same month last year. The number of persons injured in this type of accident, however, increased from 349 in March 1932, to 356 for the same month in 1933.

Grade crossing accidents and deaths during the first three months of 1933 were 1,119 and 200, respectively, compared to 1,022 and 304 for the corresponding period last year. Reports showed that 1,322 persons were injured in the three-month period of 1933 compared with 1,292 for the corresponding period of 1932.

Smaller Crops in America Are Likely to Mean Need For Imports

By GALE D. WALLACE
BUENOS AIRES (RE)—Argentina, one of the world's granary, may be in a favorable position to supply the United States with wheat and other grains when the result of the 1933 drouth in that country is known. Argentine wheat exports to the United States, according to government reports, will depend to a large extent on whether the world price at that time equals the market price set by the Argentine government.

The 1933 Argentine crop will be harvested in December and during the early part of 1934. It is estimated that 2,800,000 tons of wheat will be harvested, according to official sources, slightly under the 10-year average of 3,650,000 tons.

It is anticipated here that the United States first will turn to Canada to replace its wheat supply before importing from Argentina. Then from Argentina the world price equals the Argentine price, either through an increase in the world price or through a fall in the Argentine price.

ANGLO-JAPANESE TREATY ADVISED

Tokyo Commentator Cites Need For Pact to Influence World Peace

TOKYO (UPI)—An Anglo-Japanese alliance would be the greatest possible influence toward world peace, it is asserted in a pamphlet issued by the Nippon Kaigi, a foreign-affairs organization.

W. H. P. commentator on foreign affairs declares: "The aim of all nations from the League of Nations, Japan has been internationally isolated. It is however, with the purpose of strengthening the peace and order of Manchukuo, Japan is entering against China that Japan has helped Manchukuo's national construction."

At Height "Japan's International unearliness has reached its height. It is engaged in bringing about friendly relations with China, far from coming into friendly relations with Japan, has tried to gain the advantage of foreign powers. It is true, however, that China's military power, British and the United States have controlled Japan in economic affairs. By taking advantage of this situation, Soviet Russia is ready to make the most advanced of any moment."

"The most remarkable situation Japan has made and will be regarded to make efforts to strengthen relations with the result that it is worried over economic aspects of the world. What is worse, it is expected that, in case of emergency, Japan will be limited from the United States. Even if the Japanese patriotism and nationalism are strong enough to meet the worst possible case, we should avoid it if possible."

"Should Cut Burden "And it should be desirable to reduce the burden of munitions manufacturing and to bring about an agreement on the reduction of armaments among other nations. We should say that in present-day Japan, the leaders are leading the diplomacy. This is, however, a very abnormal condition to be in the line of emergency. We, therefore, should try every possible way to restore it to the military status."

"One of the reasons why Japan has experienced the present unbusiness should be attributed to the 'negotiation of the alliance' at the end of 1902 that the alliance was concluded because of the two nations. It was because Britain, who was weary after the South Africa War, wished to protect its rights in China through obtaining Japan's support. Through this alliance, however, not only Britain but also Japan enjoyed a considerable advantage that it may check Russia's southward advance."

"After the Russo-Japanese war, it has been extended to an offensive and defensive alliance with a view to securing a peace in both China and India. In 1911, however, the fact that the United States seemed to collide with Japan in regard to the China question, Britain proposed and succeeded in reviving the alliance. In 1917, when the World War broke out, Japan attacked Germany because it placed high value upon the Anglo-Japanese Alliance. Despite this fact, dissatisfied with Japan's role in the situation in China after the war, Britain abrogated the alliance with Japan with a view to the retreat. Japan through the influence of the United States."

"LONDON (UPI)—Creation of 'Boy Battalions' designed to ensure a proper flow of recruits for the army has been proposed in the House of Commons.

The secretary of war, Duff Cooper, was asked in view of the wide-spread unemployment and the shortage of military recruits. He would consider this suggestion. He replied that a scheme for absorbing more boys into the army was now being considered, and that he would bring the scheme to mind.

Need 35,000 "Thirty-five thousand recruits are required in the present year, and the army cannot get them, all sorts of schemes are being considered to make army life more attractive. And it is pointed out, would volunteers for three or four years be considered as a contract for seven years. To change the seven-year enlistment period, however, would strain at the root of the army's system of overseas training."

It takes months to train a recruit and as the drafting season is from the autumn to the spring, a man who joined in this period probably would have to be drafted a year before he could leave for overseas service. "To obtain any value from shortening the enlistment period, the drafting season would have to be extended over the whole year and drafts would have to be made overseas and brought back every six weeks, a plan which is regarded as impracticable."

However, active consideration is being given to the possibility of boys not being drafted in the usual way, but being recruited in special proposals.

According to reports from government sources, Japan will undertake to send 5,000 Japanese families to Manchukuo next year. Previous efforts at settlement in Manchukuo are said to have been satisfactory, although the Japanese traditionally are a home-loving people and not enthusiastic over colonization or emigration. The home situation is causing concern, particularly because of inflation.

SAVANTS TRYING TO SPLIT ATOMS

Yale Scientists Attack Mystery in Effort to Find Basis of Composition

By H. H. SHERBURN

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP)—In an effort to solve one of the most mysterious of science, two Yale university research assistants in the physics department, have been bombarding atoms for the past year. They are attempting to discover the basic composition of matter by means of complicated apparatus, lighting special and chemical compounds.

The young men, both of whom received the Ph.D. degree in physics at last month's commencement, are studying different aspects of the activity of matter that is moving often as fast as 18,000 miles a second.

Studies "in track" of activity, O. has been observing the tracks of radioactive materials with the aid of 10,000 automatic photographs taken with an "atom tracking" device in the physics laboratory. He rigged up a complicated "cloud chamber" similar in design to the formerly used in study of cloud condensation and lightning spectra and chemical compounds.

Directly beneath the cloud chamber is a magnet and drive shaft. Immediately above the magnet is a stereoscopic camera with the film divided into two identical photographic automata.

Operation is automatic. A chemical compound containing hydrogen and sulphur is placed in the small cloud chamber and compressed. A large valve in the compressed air compartment below is opened by an electric magnet, the compressed air is shot in there and below the magnet there is a sudden expansion and cooling of the gas in the cloud chamber. The chamber stretches down like an accordion suddenly and particles are shot through the gas at a tremendous speed of 12,000 miles an hour. The sulphur atoms are bombarded by the speed alpha particles, almost to the point of disintegration. The particles are atoms of helium gas, minus two electrons, which are used to atom along the path.

Anthony points out that if atoms are developed to a sufficiently high point there is always the possibility that unknown elements may be transferred into different forms of matter. It is conceivable, for instance, that mercury might be turned to gold.

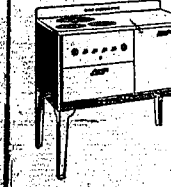

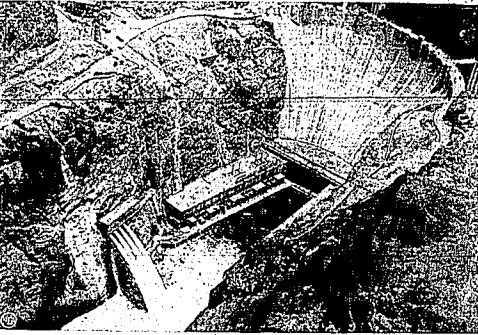

SOVIET PLANNING HELIUM OUTPUT

Scientist With New Method to Give Unlimited Backing—By Government

MORROW (AP)—Prof. P. L. Kapitza, Soviet citizen who developed a new method of producing helium during 14 years at Cambridge university, England, is preparing to extend his experiments in the laboratory of the Soviet Academy of Science, with almost unlimited backing from the government.

Visiting Russia a year ago, Kapitza mentioned in the Soviet Union under promise that his work would receive full departmental and his Cambridge laboratory is moving to Russia. Some of his most valuable assistants were employed to assist him here, a house was built for him and he was honored as a Soviet scientist.

He is head of the Institute of Physical Problems, construction of which has been completed by the Academy and in the building of which his Cambridge equipment has been installed.

With the discovery of an important supply of natural gas, suitable for production helium, in the Caucasus and Middle Volga regions, the Soviet Union expects to wrest from the United States the position of leading producer of helium in the liquid form.
