TOKYO (AP)—Japan's young emperor is enjoying excellent health despite increasing occupation-with-administrative-and-military affairs, according to a report from the Imperial household.

Speaking at a dinner given for the Imperial household, Household Minister Tezuo Matsuudaira recounted recent happenings at the Imperial palace, the most inaccessible spot in all Japan.

The political chaos following the Feb. 25 incident caused the Emperor much worry. Matsuudaira told the government. "At that time the Emperor was constantly hearing reports on the situation, keeping late hours and causing worry as to his health. The Emperor's health, however, was not disturbed to the slightest extent."

Worships Regularly
The minister said that the Emperor attended all small and large religious services and worshipped regularly at the three shrines at the palace.

Matsuudaira reported that the Emperor and the Empress Dowager also were in good health.

CATHOLICS GAIN IN DUTCH INDIES

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Statistics of the ever-growing number of native converts in the colonial possessions of Holland in the east have been received at the Vatican from the bureau of Catholic missions at Batavia, capital of the Dutch East Indies.

The reports reveal that Catholic converts in Java, Sumatra and other colonies of the Dutch East Indies increased from 417,787 to 439,209 during the 12 month period preceding June 30, 1935. If the pace at which the church has been advancing since 1933 is maintained, there will be a half million Catholics in those colonies within the next three years.

RUSS IRRIGATION LOWERS CASPIAN

Increased Use of Water and Dam-Building Threaten Fish Navigation

MOSCOW (AP)—Rapid construction of dams, with increase of cultivated areas and intensive use of water in Russia, Volga and other rivers for irrigation threatens the livelihood of the Caspian Sea, according to Prof. H. Apollon, prominent geologist.

Calculations show that the sea level 7,000 square miles of area since 1920, Apollon urged that measures be taken to discharge into the Caspian a portion of the waters of southern rivers and the Don, to protect valuable fisheries and Caspian navigation for future generations.

During the course of the last 300 years the level of the Caspian rose and fell alternately, but in 1924 fell sharply 24 inches below the average level according to the records of the Caspian Sea level in 1920, a total decrease in area of 4,450 square miles, or 20 percent of the surface of the Kara-Bugaz basin.

As a result in the Gulf of Baku the towers of the ancient fortress of Sakhir, built in the 12th century, which was submerged by a volcanic disturbance, were exposed from the water. In fine weather the towers look leading to the fortress can be seen from the bottom of the gulf.

Islands Being Linked
The island of Cheken gradually is being connected with the Turkish coast and is becoming a peninsula.

Investigation of the condition of the Caspian basin, precipitation and evaporation show no essential change in climatic conditions, according to Apollon, who therefore concluded that construction of dams, growth of bottom plantations in Transcaucasia, utilization of water for irrigation on a large scale and development of intensive dairy raising, keeping the snow on cultivated lands to the last minute possible, was responsible.

With plans for further utilization of the waters of the Volga, Kara and other rivers already developed, Apollon became alarmed for the future and suggested remedial measures to the government.

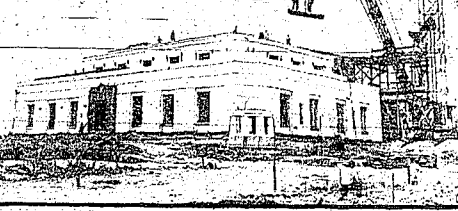
Rattler on Cactus

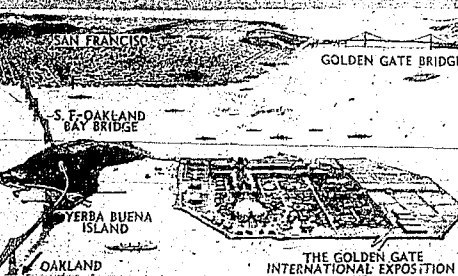


UNCLE SAM'S NEW 'SAFE' SOON GUARDS BILLIONS
