BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 14 (UP)—Winner of the Democratic nomination for governor will be decided when the official canvass of Tuesday's Idaho primary is made Aug. 31, it was indicated today as Barzilla Clark, P. Mix and Bert H. Miller continued to run an intensely close race for the nomination.

A deadlock finish between the three leaders was predicted, and the official Democratic nominee will probably not be stridently determined until official returns are counted by the state canvassing board on Aug. 31.

Clark, Mix and Miller have indicated they will not be satisfied with the result of the official canvass and news was expected to demand a recount.

WARNING ISSUED TO POTATO MEN

Inspection Service Points Out Methods to Improve Crop Grading

Pointers to growers and others in the handling of potatoes were listed today in a statement to the Evening Times by the local office of the inspection service of the state department of agriculture.

The statement follows: "To those of us who have the opportunity to see the difference in conditions of potatoes caused through handling, it is surprising the vast percentage of potatoes that have to be graded down to the No. 2 grade and even to culls in some cases instead of grade No. 1, as they should be. The main reason is not that carelessness on the part of those handling the potatoes from the digger to the cull, but that they are not properly graded."

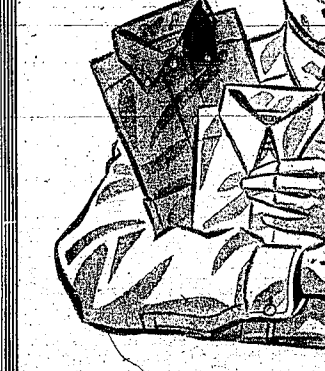
It is at times almost impossible to eliminate cuts caused by the digger, however, one of the biggest defects in potatoes is caused by bruises, which later develop into dry decay while in storage.

These defects are caused possibly by the digger and could possibly be eliminated with a little more care. Watch your digger and check the cause of the defect. In the case of the handling of the crop, especially in the case of commercial truckmen, insist on a step to use other than a sack of potatoes, where the car door is not high enough to load down to a level to necessitate a step of some kind. In most cases a sack of potatoes is used when a step could be built at a little cost by the truckman.

There are many factors in the handling of potatoes that if properly taken care of will help a great deal to put better Idaho potatoes on the market.

HEPBURN VISIONS NAVY LIMITATION

Reason Will Win Out in The End Declares Chief Of U. S. Fleet

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—Admiral Arthur Hays Hepburn, commander in chief of the U. S. fleet, today declared that the principle of naval limitation is on the map to stay. Here with 20 warships on his first cruise as the navy's top officer ashore, Hepburn declared his faith in the U. S. S. Pennsylvania, he did not believe chaos would follow expiration of the London and Washington treaties in December.

"A principle of reasonableness will win out," he said, "admitting that faith in reason is not a particularly lowebb, but a good deal more realistic than the theory that arms reduction is not an agreed fact." Hepburn emphasized his opinions were offered as a private citizen.

Asked if trouble impended in the Pacific, he replied "so far as I know Japan and the United States have nothing to fight about."

"See No U. S. B. H. Will — If there is anything in it I am going to give up or at any rate I don't care to fear, I certainly don't know about it."

Concerning expansion plans for Pearl Harbor, the navy's powerful mid-Pacific base, Hepburn said the navy will "make the best of what facilities we have here, but he denied there were any immediate intentions of a major increase in either personnel or equipment.

LONDON, Oct. 2.—A confused and contradictory writer of reports about the civil war in Spain which is leaving thousands of dead and maimed in its wake, two big centers of fact stand out.

Senior Largo Caballero, one of the Socialists' "big" leaders, warned the government that it had left in important commands and at strategic points too many "arrogant" men who were hostile to the regime and who would take their troops against it when they had the chance.

If the rebels win with men of an diverse mind as Mola, Franco, Mola, and March, there will soon be a lively scramble among themselves as to who is to wield the power and a bitter fight as to the form the government will take.

But one thing seems certain—the army will have the last word in the rebel camp.

In the desperate civil war that is now raging, the government has had one big piece of luck in that the air force and the navy largely remained loyal.

Had they joined the rebels, the government would have had only an entrained mob with which to fight soldiers, sailors, and airmen whose job is fighting.

How They Laid Up
As the fog of propaganda and counter-propaganda, broadcast from the government's Madrid radio station and from the rebel's Bilbao station—clears, the lineup of the opposing sides seems to be as follows:

For the government—The police and the civil guard, nearly all the regular army, and all the navy. In addition, there are the armed Socialist and Communist militia, the Socialist trade union "volunteers" numbering 1,000,000; the Spanish central trade union, numbering 600,000; and local groups of loyal citizens—in the various towns who have been armed by the government.

For the rebels—Nearly all the cavalry, artillery, and infantry regiments of the regular army, including the Moorish troops and the Foreign Legion, the monarchist factions, chiefly organized into volunteer militia, and the Fascist organizations, headed by Jose Primo de Rivera, son of the late dictator Primo de Rivera.

Numbers are on the side of the government, but the bulk of the trained and equipped men are on the side of the rebels.

JAPANESE BONDS SELL OUT FAST

Nipponese Fleet to Buy Small Denomination Securities From Government

BY H. O. THOMPSON
TOKYO (U. S. P.) — It looked like the morning of world armaments opening in Japan the moment the patient attitudes a long line of humbly straggling through sun-drenched streets, but in reality it was the Japanese public buying government bonds.

Bus girls, housewives with baskets strapped upon their bodies, clerks, photographers, laborers in their newly designed "jappi" coats moved slowly along waiting for their turn at the purchase counter.

It was a contrasting counterpart of the American effort to sell "baby" bonds to persons of modest means. In the United States the plan met a technical repulse; in Japan the issuance of small denomination bonds was greeted with great public enthusiasm.

Line Form at Midnight
Purchasers lined up at midnight, nine hours before the new issue was to go on sale. By daylight they had formed a line three blocks long. By midnight there were some 10,000 in line, a queue that extended two blocks to the railroad tracks, along the tracks for nearly a quarter of a mile and spilled over into a shopping street near the Imperial Hotel.

Extra police were on duty and a medical relief corps watched for possible heat prostrations.

The sale continued for two days with no lessening in the public interest.

Special Price Offered
A feature of the sale that attracted many purchasers was a special price of 900 which goes to the holder of a few "lucky number" bonds. In addition, the interest rate was attractive. The bonds yield 3.8 per cent. The postal savings bank rate is 2 per cent.

The bonds were for ten yen (about 21 cents) and purchases limited to five pounds for each person. Some of those who wanted to invest more than that bought their five bonds and then went back to the end of the line to await another turn at the counter.

The total issue was for 10,000,000 yen (about \$2,000,000), all of which was snapped up within a few days.

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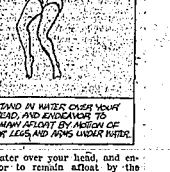

Gunglione spent 14 months in east Africa. At the end of the campaign he has joined the famous "Toselli" battalion of the Italian Expeditionary Corps in Ethiopia through some of the most dangerous phases of the war.

NEWSPAPERS OF 1830 EXHIBITED

Early Journals Displayed At Centennial Exposition Show Odd Trends

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—News as it was written and displayed more than 100 years ago is being exhibited at the University of Texas Centennial Exposition here.

Copies of early Texas papers, dating back to 1830, are included in the exhibit. Examination of the papers indicates that different things made news during the "barbed wire and rawhide" era of Texas.

A copy of the Texas Republic, published in Brenner, July 6, 1830,

Two stories on page one: A speech about forming a state government takes up most of the page.

The editor of the Telegraph and Texas Register, published in San Felipe de Austin, Oct. 17, 1833, preferred poetry to news. More than one-third of his front page is devoted to a poem, "Dawn."

To amplify a letter concerning Texas independence covers all the page.

In still another half of the front page is devoted to advertising. The rest of the page contains news on the climate of Austin and the laws passed at the third session of the Fort Worth Congress.

On the Jan. 15, 1866, edition of the Dallas Herald appears a story of an expedition fought in the Civil War. It is listed simply as "In Sunday's Mail."
