SCHOOL HEALTH HINTS OUTLINED

N. Y. Medical Society Begins Campaign Against Oils In Empire State

ALBANY, N. Y. (U.P.)—The Medical Society of New York state is gathering health information from throughout the country to benefit millions during fall and winter months when the common cold is prevalent.

The society inaugurated the system last year of releasing weekly health bulletins to newspapers throughout the state. The program will be continued again this year, with the campaign directed principally against the common cold and its consequences.

Contributions come from state medical societies and physician members of the state medical societies in the Empire state.

"The society's aim is to bring attention of parents to the danger of treating children for colds with coughing medicine and other drugs," the society advises.

"With the advent of school months," the society advises, "children should be made ready for school in more ways than clothes and books. They should be made to know what the teacher says and see well what she writes on the blackboard."

In bulletins to mothers, the society advises that: "Falls are important in the diet of children as cold weather approaches."

Light Snacks Good
It's not bad for children to eat between meals depending first on the child and on his food, and second on the weather.

"Light snacks of fruit, fruit juices, whole wheat bread or rye bread are also suggested."

"Doctors who overfeed their babies to get them gain weight may also see them get excess."

"Learning to swim should be part of the education of every child on reaching the age of 6."

Coddling Disproved
Too much coddling in a child's appetite is injurious to health and should be met by termination of the meal, variety is unnecessary and undesirable.

To the father, the society says: "Don't attempt to learn facts with young sons in outdoor activities. And ending the father's part, the society says:

"There is just as much nutrition in the cheapest cuts of meat as in the most expensive ones. Minding pennies count in the food budget; routes for common sense planning."

"Macaroni and cheese are inexpensive and yet almost as nourishing as meat."

"Fish once a week improves the food balance and reduces costs. Milk is the almost perfect food, the greater value can be found."

Advice To Mothers
To the mother, the society cautions against carbon monoxide poisoning.

"Concerning coffee, it says the liquid affects the central nervous system and is injurious to health depending on the amount consumed and the nature of the drinker."

The society warns against "Milk" tubercular cases, asserting there is "no cure for tuberculosis but the slow, proved regimen of fresh air, nourishing food and sunshine."

"Also, says another bulletin, "There is no truly 'acid' condition of the body. It is always alkaline. "Acidosis" is merely reduced alkalinity."

SUGAR VALUATION SOARS IN HAWAII

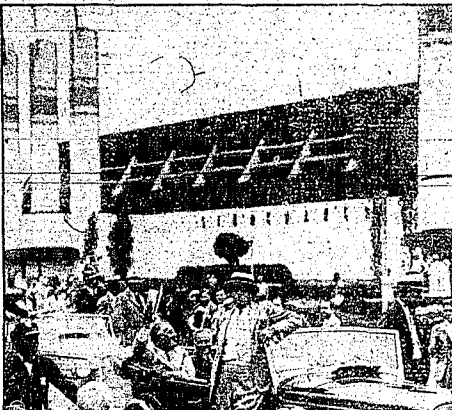
Grange at Wendell Names Candidate

PREN MOORE HAS TURKEY FIGURES

Extension Pollturvey Reports On Estimated From Questionnaire

Monthly Extension Pollturvey, as conducted by the Idaho State Turkey Questionnaire, of May 15, there will be approximately 10 percent more turkeys for the 1938 market than there were for that of 1937. This estimate is based upon replies from counties that represent 88 per cent of the turkeys of the state. While this estimate is not necessarily exact as to the true volume, it is indicative of the trend and probably is reasonably correct.

According to the replies, approximately 50 per cent of the turkey flocks are home-raised flocks. This is based on the number of turkey growers, feeding, home-raised flocks rather than purchased flocks. It is estimated that the turkey grower problem is not as great as in the past. In fact, no disease (turkey growth) did not last causes.

Larger Flocks
The response to that phase of the 1938 questionnaire pertaining to turkeys has not been so satisfactory as in former years. I recall that probably there are fewer turkey growers in the state than formerly and that flocks are larger, which may account for the reduction in the number of growers reporting. It has occurred to me that a second enumeration might be worth while, and am sending out more of the questionnaire, the same as originally went out. If enough turkey growers send in replies to this questionnaire, we will make more complete compilation and release it later in my report form in the same manner as this one.

Asks Percentage
In answering the questionnaire, please do so on a percentage basis, as to what is wanted in the estimated percentage change between 1937 and 1938. It is not expected that anyone should make a survey extending beyond his own county, and the replies should be limited to turkeys. We would also like to hear from turkey growers.

Your Baby's Health

In the matter of weaning, as in many other problems affecting children, there are two schools of thought. One holds that the best way to wean a baby is to wean it suddenly. This may be theoretically necessary in case the mother develops a serious disease, such as typhoid fever, pneumonia, tuberculosis, or a kidney ailment. Sudden weaning also may be necessary should the mother discover that she is going to have another baby.





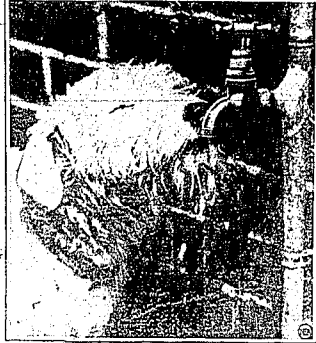
