

YOUTH SCHOOL IS SET FOR WEISER

Girls and Women to Receive Training for Work in Private Industry

A national youth administration training school will open shortly in Weiser and will be continuous through the year with each group of girls attending a four-month session, according to word received here by H. H. Burkhart, co-director of Idaho co-operating agency for public instruction.

A special effort is made to place the girls in private industry upon completion of their course in the school. It is stated that the school will accept 150 girls who will be between 15 and 25 years old.

The curriculum of the school includes home management, social science, English, science, adjustment, more vocational training, and cultural opportunities for the work in the creative arts. Out-door exercises, swimming, hiking, personal hygiene, and health education, is included in the physical education program.

Unemployed girls and women desiring of gaining admission to the school are advised to communicate with the state Y. A. director for detailed information. It is announced.

Last year the Federal Residential school was held in Weiser for an eight-week period. One hundred girls attended.

Adoption of resolutions by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce board of directors opposing at this time the creation of a national park in the Sawtooth mountains indicates definitely the twosided nature of the agitation for such a proposal.

It is understood that certain interests are urging the proposition, and on grounds which they may sincerely believe to be beneficial, but it is manifest that there are many detrimental reasons against converting the Sawtooth valley area into a government playground, and these would not be opposition from the local chamber which is among the staunchest supporters of anything good for any part of this region.

The park agitation is perhaps a case of over-enthusiasm; one which sounds good when first proposed but fraught with liabilities, as has been pointed out in these columns.

Too often such a suggestion would be met only with unreasoned approval, when in fact, there are serious objections to creating a national park in a territory which now is open to the world.

It is well to have healthy argument on the proposition now, rather than to let the agitation continue to the point of the actual creation of such a park, and then have it open to criticism which would be too late.

One of the most encouraging signs of changing thought that is the comparative calm which greeted announcement that "American" factories in Spain were being seized by the left wing government, now fighting for its life.

It is safe to say that 20 years ago any such announcement would have been greeted by a national wave of indignation and a stiff-backed diplomatic note insisting that "American rights" be respected or else.

What happened this time was a formal note of protest from Secretary of State Coughlin, Hull, cautioning Spanish authorities that they would be expected to account for the situation after the fighting is over.

That was more a matter of form "to keep the record straight" than any sort of threat to do anything about it immediately. And the public indignation, if any, was practically inaudible.

The reason is not only a change in thinking, however, but a change in the international setup under which great business operates.

The average man is apt to think today, "Well, whose business is it? Is it 'American' in any real sense of being the property of, or in the real interest of the American people?" Or is it just something that happens to be owned by a couple of fellows who happen to be Americans?

In the case of Spain, there is a double reason to ask questions. For 10 years there has been going on in Spain a sort of game of hide-and-seek between the government and a dozen large American corporations with interests in factories there.

It began under the Rivera dictatorship, when a scheme of taking out the Rivera trust. Rivera ordered that foreign firms with Spanish subsidiaries should pay a tax based on the corporation's total earnings, regardless of what part of those earnings were made in Spain.

To duck that tax, many corporations simply incorporated their Spanish branches in Spain, with Spanish directors and stockholders through whom they could continue control.

But, legally, ownership is Spanish. So when the fighting and terror is over, and the State Department tries to get an adjustment for destruction or seizure of American property, it may find polite Spanish officials lifting polite Iberian eyebrows and asking "What American property?"

All of which means that American interests abroad are not scanned with the same glasses which they were 20 years ago. Even if they are so scanned, they may prove to be different today.

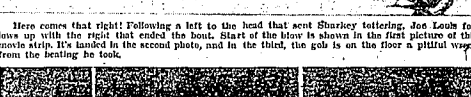

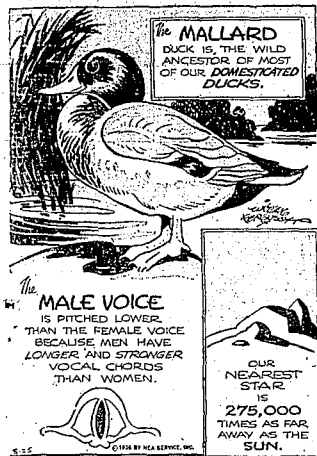

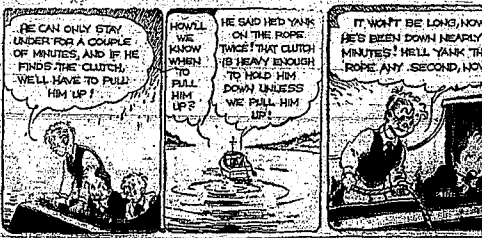

CANCER EXPERTS TO ATTEND MEET

World Famous Scientists Will Gather for Institute At Madison, Wis.

MADISON, Wis., (AP)—America's first cancer institute will attract world famous scientists who have devoted the most productive years of their lives seeking a cure for the disease to the University of Wisconsin campus Sept. 7, 8 and 9. Investigators whose contributions to the scientific and medical world based upon careful laboratory research are being considered among the most advanced data available in treating the dreaded disease have been invited here by Dr. William B. Stovall, director of the state laboratory of hygiene and chairman of the three-day conference.

The institute, financed by the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, has as its purpose, according to Dr. Stovall, to bring together internationally prominent investigators for a critical analysis of the cancer problem, for an exchange of ideas among themselves and for the stimulating effects such a meeting will have on young investigators.

Dr. Stovall explained further that the institute will seek to translate the expert knowledge and consideration of the results of research into the possible for an exchange of that knowledge on organization of a plan to control the ravaging disease.

Included among the outstanding cancer research investigators from foreign nations who will speak at the institute's general sessions and lead round table discussions are Dr. Lew Kreyberg of the University of California, Los Angeles; Henry Couland, chief of the department of X-ray therapy for cancer of the Rouss Institute of Paris, France; and the University of Paris, foundation of Marie Curie Honor.

Dr. Maigie Thurlow MacCallin, associate professor of histology and embryology at the University of Western Ontario in London, Ontario, Canada, has the distinction of being the only woman scientist on the institute's speaking program. Dr. MacCallin is known throughout the medical world for her extensive research into the inheritance of cancer.

American cancer research workers who will appear on the program include Dr. C. C. Little, director of the Kinross B. Jackson Laboratory for Cancer Research at Bar Harbor, Me.; Dr. Edgar Allen, professor of anatomy and chairman of the department of anatomy at the University of Michigan; Dr. J. H. Anderson, biologist of the U. S. new health service at Boston.

Also Dr. S. P. Heintzmann, chairman and director of the research institute of the Lankenau hospital and professor of pathology at the University of Pennsylvania; Dr. Dmitri Novak, associate gynecologist of Johns Hopkins medical school at Baltimore; and Dr. J. B. Murphy, director of cancer research at the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research, New York.

Still others scheduled to speak include Dr. James Zwigg, professor of oncology at the Cornell university medical school and a member of the staff of the Memorial hospital for the treatment of cancer of New York; Dr. Giacchino Pavia, physician at the New York Memorial hospital of New York; and Dr. Warren H. Lewis, department of embryology of the Carnegie institution of Washington, at Baltimore.

PUDDLE' DEVICE USED FOR ROADS

Accident Discovery Leads to Improvement in Method of Mixing Materials

FREDERICKSBURG, Va., (AP)—A revolutionary "puddle process" of road building is being tested in a new experiment.

The new process was discovered by accident. While building an airport landing field, part of the field became soaked in a rain and would not dry quickly. It was paved, another over, and left as is. Two weeks later it was discovered that this part of the field was firmest and smoothest.

A month later the section was used as a concrete finishing surface.

Road-building experts, delighted with the result, are building a four-mile road in the Fredericksburg Battlefield park by the new process. They will lay the new road on an experiment station to determine how well it "holds up" under frost and truck traffic.

The usual method of laying a road is to put down a heavy bed of gravel then, coating it with a top dressing of oil, tar and asphalt.

Under the "puddle process," a thin gravel base is laid down. On top of this is spread a mixture of gravel, sand, asphalt, oil and water. Then the whole mass is allowed until it is a sort of thick black mud. Finally, it is rolled under a 15-ton roller and left to dry. Gradually the mixture hardens and it looks like black concrete.

Engineers building the new road believe that it will be impossible for water to seep through the foot-thick "puddled" mixture, and that there will be no danger from freezing.

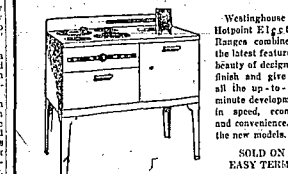

POWER OUTPUTS LARGER IN U. S.

Generating Capacity Increase Result of Allotments From WPA Funds

WASHINGTON (AP)—Generating capacity of non-federal public owned electric plants has been increased by 67,000 kilowatts as a result of WPA allotments as of Aug. 1, 1938. WPA Administrator Harold L. Ickes has announced.

The amount of current the plants could generate would supply the electric needs of more than 1,000,000 homes, it is estimated by engineers.

WPA allotments provide for addition of 43,840 kilowatts capacity to the Diesel plants of the nation; 255,000 kilowatts capacity to the hydro-electric plants; and 23,825 kilowatts to the capacity of the steam plants.

Total Capacities
Nationwide capacity of Diesel plants is 286,720; of hydro-electric plants, 443,740; of steam, 1,201,655, a combined total of 1,845,655 kilowatts.

WPA allotments have been made from request from political subdivisions, many of which sought allotments only after the proposal had been approved by a majority of voters in elections conducted in accordance with the state laws.

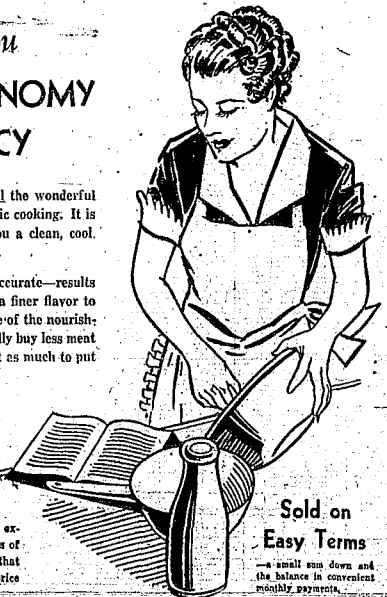

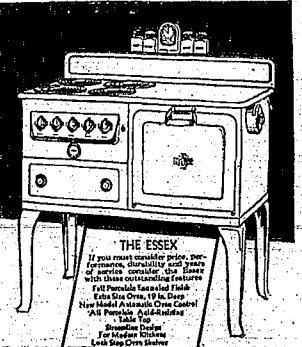
