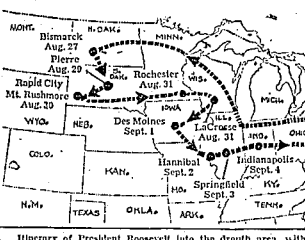

Kindness makes the world go 'round, and this is not false theory.

Apply to everyday life, to those whom you love or like, admire, honor and respect. They are kind, or kindly, or appreciative.

They are not rude, critical, cold, indifferent, unconcerned.

An excessive man comes through here with a family, and finds himself in need of money to get to Salt Lake, offering to leave his suit of clothes to be later released for \$7, and is taken care of.

All these little incidents come to light in one day right here in Twin Falls. They could be enlarged upon by the knowledge of everyone who has experienced the satisfaction of kindness, but they demonstrate the need for exemplification.

The world would be a sorry place in which to live if all was selfishness without the light of generosity. And everyone has had many opportunities each day to make his contribution toward happiness, without which there would be no need or desire even for the world to go 'round.

ROAD TO CHAMPIONSHIP
Now that the Olympic games victors have been duly crowned, heralded, and banqueted, it might be a good thing to devote a little time to the question: What does the amateur sports champion get out of it all, anyway?

He gets medals, of course, and headlines, and sometimes he is able to get a fair living out of it—a good deal as his legs hold out. But he generally has to pay—as long as they are worth all they cost.

To be superlatively good at anything, you have to devote your life to it—whether it be athletics, music, crime detection, or the making of term coats busts. The champion has to work at his job enthusiastically; he has to cut no step his calling, so to speak, between all performances.

A youngster who can swim, or run, or jump, or leave a 16-pound ball of lead faster and farther than anybody else does not get that way solely through the bounty of Nature. He must have the gift to begin with, of course, but unless he works like a trooper to develop and perfect it, he will never get his picture in the papers.

Sport is supposed to be a means of recreation, of relaxation. You go down to the corner to bowl, or out in the country to play golf, or over into the vacant lot to tuck into a bit of softball, because you get a kick out of it.

That's all sport is—except, of course, for the professionals. If you glorify in the champion, you turn sport from fun into hard work. And it is the very champion whom we glory who is apt to suffer most of all.

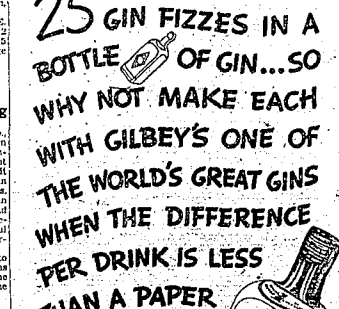

CALIFORNIA WILL VOTE ON OPTION

Proposed Amendment at Next Election Will Decide Liquor Control

BY HENRY WOOD SAN FRANCISCO, (UPI)—With repeal not yet three years old, California in the November elections will become one of the first battlegrounds in the Union for the return to local option as a stepping stone to prohibition.

Using the California "initiative" law, dry, under the leadership of the Anti-Saloon League, have won their first skirmish in the fight. By obtaining 100,000 signatures to a legislative petition they have succeeded in forcing the submission of the next election of a proposed amendment to the constitution, repealing, first, everything pertaining to liquor control and substituting for it a simple thing providing for local option.

This one sentence reads: "Every city, town, county, city and county, or territory outside of incorporated cities and towns shall have the power to regulate, zone or prohibit the sale of alcoholic beverages within its limits."

The fight, however, is not to be a one-sided one on a single clear-cut issue, for wetts sponsored an initiative petition that will place on the ballot a proposed amendment to correcting admitted abuses that arose under the system of liquor control.

Out of State In the event drys should win at the November election and their constitutional amendment become effective, it would give the liquor control entirely out of the hands of the state.

The proposed amendment of the wetts had the double purpose of preventing this and at the same time correcting a situation which they themselves admit is deplorable.

Initiative for the latter first was taken by the League of California Municipalities and other civic bodies but they were defeated by hotel and liquor interests who desire a better regulated system than the present one.

TRADE PROBLEMS TROUBLE ORIENT

War of Commerce May Be Turned Into Actual Armed Conflict

By H. O. THOMPSON
TOKYO, (AP)—New forces, led by the United States, are at work in the far east.

China is experiencing a birth of nationalistic feeling. Japan, wrestling with agrarian problems at home, is fighting also for increased trade abroad.

For the moment the warfare is one of cotton bolts and bales of silk. But with the twisting, driving impetus of trade and nationalism, looking at cross-purposes in an atmosphere of traditional suspicion, it may turn suddenly into the deadly business of bullets, bayonets and bombs.

Cautious trading, thus far has submerged the likelihood of an immediate armed struggle. But delicate relations have developed between China and Japan, between Japan and the Soviet Union to a lesser known but important degree between Japan and Great Britain.

Britain involved
"It China or the Soviet rises in arms against Japan, it is more probable than at the time of the Manchurian incident that Great Britain will be embroiled in the war," writes H. H. Kinsman, of the intelligence bureau of the foreign office in a magazine devoted to Japanese ascendancy in the far east.

"Japan has never been more critically situated than at present."

"It is best with powerful enemies on three sides—Great Britain, armed economically; China, armed spiritually, and the Soviet Union, armed in all directions."

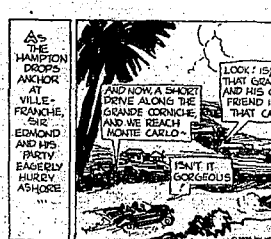

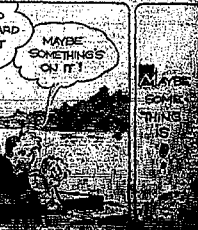

London Institute Finds Good Most Important Product Being Developed

LONDON, (U)—There is no scientific evidence to warrant the view that Ethiopia is a country of vast potential mineral wealth, the Imperial Institute reports in its current bulletin.

It is said, is the most important mineral product so far developed, the amount output being in the neighborhood of 22,000 ounces. Platinum was discovered last century near Xolo, but the amount present was not enough to justify working the primary rock.

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Your Baby's Health

Whenever a new solid food is added to baby's diet, always begin with a small amount—not more than a teaspoonful. As new foods are added, the baby's course will take less of the foods that it has been getting.

The refined or white cereals are given first, because they are more easily digestible and less likely to be laxative than the whole grain cereals.

Cereals should be cooked with salt and water, or with milk, according to the instructions accompanying the specific product.

Use of new pured green vegetables frequently are begun as early as the fifth or sixth month, and by the ninth month may occupy an important place in the diet. They are prepared preferably by boiling or baking.

The water in which the vegetables are cooked should not be discarded, because it contains some of the valuable salts.

Remember that the substances eaten by the baby may appear in the bowel movements. The mother should not be worried if the red coloring of the stools of the first of some of the other vegetables, are visible in the excretions.

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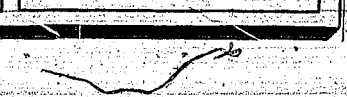
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
