LANDON BLASTS AT NEW DEAL'S TAX ABSURDITY

Speeds Move to Meet F. D. R. After Hitting "Cockeyed" Legislation
PLEDGES FISCAL REFORMS
Republican Nominee Declares State, Federal Systems Need Overhaul

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 27 (UP)—The Republican presidential candidate put yesterday to rest the charge that he was a "cockeyed" New Deal tax legislator, the 1936 Republican candidate of the old.

Speaking here in the wind-up of his first campaign tour, Landon pledged reform of the "unadvised" 1935 Roosevelt tax act and pledged himself to tax reform for war, cost savings and abundance.

"Pledges 'Hidden Taxes'"
The Republican candidate recommended that government reform "hidden" taxes and derive most of its revenue from direct taxes on corporate and individual incomes. He said the tax act of 1935 was a simple system of bookkeeping for the government, but he pledged himself to tax reform for war, cost savings and abundance.

"Nidulating suggestions that the price will pay the Roosevelt bill, the cost of government in all income over \$5,000 would not now pay the cost of government."

Governor Landon left last night for Toledo after addressing a crowd estimated at 25,000. President Roosevelt is expected to announce a "New Deal" program in the near future.

"On his first tour, Landon spoke in politically important spots, including New York City. He is expected to leave in November for his long-awaited campaign here but his bare fist campaign last night."

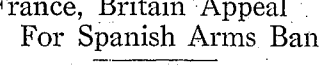

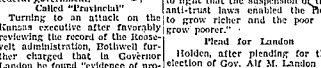

SECRETARY DERN

Passing of Dern Brings Tributes From Colleagues

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 (UP)—The death of Secretary of War George H. Dern died at heart disease at Walter Reed army hospital.

The war secretary expired at 10:55 a. m. EST, after waging a losing fight against ravages of the influenza attack last spring, which had left him with a critical heart condition.

Dern was the first New Deal cabinet officer to die while on active duty. Secretary of Treasury William Woodin was the first Roosevelt cabinet member to die but was on leave of absence at the time. Sen. Thomas Walsh came east.

Family at bedside
The death was announced by Dr. Fritz Meyer, European head of the army medical service, from Boston only yesterday at the president's request.

64 Years Old
Dern, 64 years old since last month, had been confined to Walter Reed hospital since April 1935. He at first had appeared to respond to treatment and even conducted business from his bedside.

There was no indication whether Dern's death was a heart ailment or an immediate appointment to fill the vacancy caused by Dern's death.

Assistant Secretary of War Harry H. Woodring was in charge of the department for the past year.

Technical Discussions Booked To Occupy Limelight At Boise Session

BOISE, Aug. 27 (AP)—Intensive review of facts learned in medical school days will keep Idaho's doctors busy when the State Medical Association holds its 44th annual meeting at Boise, Aug. 31, Sept. 1, 2, and 4. TRANS-OCEAN AIR RACE PROMOTED

French Plan Aerial Circumnavigation To Honor Lindbergh's Solo Flight

PARIS, Aug. 27 (AP)—The air ministry decided today to promote a blue ribbon air race from New York to Paris, open to pilots of the world, in commemoration of the tenth anniversary next year of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's New York to Paris solo flight. Prince George Bissess, president of the International Aeronautic Federation, accepted the task of organizing the race. Air Minister Pierre Cot and Prince Bissess expect about 20 starters and believe the winner will reach Le Bourget in less than 29 hours, compared to Lindbergh's time of 33 1/2 hours. Cot will invite Lindbergh to greet the arrivals at Le Bourget. Prince Bissess may invite the United States National Aeronautic association to organize the departure from New York.

As a whole, the world's air supply comes from the Federated Malay States, Bolivia, China, India, Java, the Dutch East Indies, Nigeria, Austria, and Alaska.

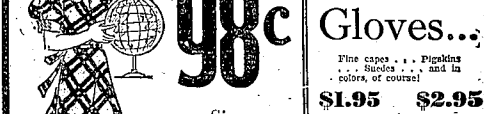

LONG RACE WILL ATTRACT FLIERS

Turner and Hallop get U. S. Bid For International Distance Flight

PARIS (UP)—The longest and most arduous race in the history of aviation, 13,620 treacherous miles from Paris to Saigon in French Indochina will start from Le Bourget airport at dawn Oct. 25, with fliers of a dozen nations competing for nearly \$50,000 in prizes.

The race will be under the joint sponsorship of the Aero club of France, the Aero club of Indochina. The aerial "sporting code" of the Federation Aeronautique Internationale will be used, according to the French air ministry. The contest is announced as the conclusion of the grueling contest it will buy the winning plans, preserving it as a mental endowment of high speed design.

Entries have been received from British, French, German and Italian aviators and negotiations are underway to induce two of America's outstanding racing pilots, Lt. Harold G. Gatty and Capt. James G. Hallop — to enter. The entry fee is \$250, of which half will be handed over to the winner of the race.

Return Via Cairo

The route of the contest will be by way of Paris, Baghdad, Alahabad, Saigon and return by way of Bangkok, Rangoon and Paris.

The first leg of the long flight will be the most grueling, 2,922 miles from Paris to Baghdad. The next stage, Baghdad to Alahabad, is only 125 miles shorter and the aerial from Alahabad to Saigon measures 1,930 miles.

On the return trip the fliers will make a loop of 285 miles from Saigon to Cairo and one of 1,025 from Cairo to Paris.

The contestants will be required to halt at the quarter control points but may stop off at between points if necessary. If, however, they do not make the first leg, Paris to Baghdad — in non-stop flying they must make one of the other four legs on the way to Saigon non-stop.

Fuel Tanks Sealed

Gasoline tanks will be sealed at Paris, Baghdad and Alahabad by representatives of the Aero club of France and there will be officials along the route at intermediate points to care for plane which are found between the control points for refueling. Each plane will carry several barographs, one official and one as a check.
