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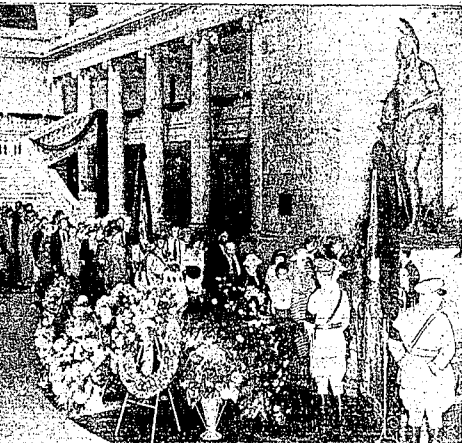

**INNOCENTS STILL DIE**

Americans read with horror the lurid stories from Spain of a conflict taking an average of perhaps 1,000 lives a day. At least 40,000 are dead in Spain in the death struggle that is now more than a month old.

Horrible! Yet in the last seven months 18,500 Americans have also been killed, violently, their blood crimsoning the pavements and agonies no less sickening and sharp.

They are just as dead as their Spanish brothers, without even such satisfaction as there may be in dying for a cause.

They are the traffic victims. If their toll increases during the latter part of the year, as it usually does, then the Spanish list will be higher this year than ever before. Last year 37,000 died, probably a greater cost of life than the Spanish revolt toll to date.

This in spite of widespread safety driven and a mass of publicity for highway safety that has not been equaled in years.

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# TOWNSEND WILL SHIFT PROGRAM

### Announces Four Changes Will Be Inserted in Pending Congress Bill

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 8 (AP)—Four changes, one of which would make eligible for pension benefits persons who had served more than 30,000 miles, will be inserted in the Townsend old-age revolving pension bill now pending before Congress, Dr. Francis M. Townsend announced here.

"The first one will be a provision that the transaction tax would be applied in annual pension collections," Townsend said.

"The second change will be the withdrawal of the provision which provided that persons earning \$2,000 a year or more would not be eligible to transfer under the plan. The third would be that the transaction tax would be levied on the pension checks made to every state, making the tax universal. The fourth change would be to let pension checks made to be deposited in banks and money be made available to trade through a checking system."

"The elderly pension plan leader secured the committee's consent both on the political parties and on the Senate," Townsend said.

# RUSSIANS CLAIM CONSUL BOYCOTT

### Declare Manchukuo Trying to Drive Soviet Officials Out of Country

MOSCOW, Sept. 8 (AP)—The long-standing enmity between Soviet Russia and Japan flared up again today when government agencies here charged that Japanese-dominated Manchukuo was attempting to drive Soviet consuls from its territory.

"Officials cited the recent incident at Tsitsihar when an employee of the Soviet consulate was arrested on charges of being a spy and a boycott against the Soviet agency was started," the Soviet official news service said.

The Japanese-Manchukuo powers have assumed an exceptionally unbecomingly line of behavior respecting Soviet consulates, especially with the aim of creating conditions which would make it impossible in Manchukuo will be intolerant," the news service said.

### TIN CANS USED AS PAVING HELP

Discarded Waste Found Good When Used in Roadbed of Streets

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (UP) — Tin can alloy is a reality, not a myth, in West Palm Beach. For nearly 10 years Superintendent D. D. Howard of the department of streets and public improvements has been utilizing discarded tin cans for street building purposes, collecting the cans from the city incinerator.

The cans take the place of about half the amount of crushed rock that would otherwise be used in the street base, saving half the cost of the roadbed.

According to Superintendent Howard, they make excellent streets, and thoroughfares with a foot thick layer of tin cans rolled down to half that thickness are holding up as well as those surfaced with rock.

Six months after the cans are spread over the roadbed and rolled the tin undergoes oxidation and the cans are transformed into a firm, hard mass.

The plan originally was used in California.



# Behind The Scenes in Washington

Behind the scenes in Washington, the political maneuvering is intense. The Republican leadership is divided, with some favoring a more aggressive stance against the Democrats.
