PILOTS Risk Lives Today After Bloodiest Opening Day in Event's History

Louise Thaden Takes Prize in Bendix Race; One Dead, Four Injured

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 5 (UPI)— Michael Dethroy, French aviator and former record holder, signed record holder, took a firmer grip on his position as leading pilot in the Bendix trophy race today, when official figures for the qualifying races yesterday revealed his average speed of 274.47 miles per hour over a five mile course.

The powerful Czechoslovakian had circled around the triangular course at such speed that he lapped one entry in the race.

AND NEXT COMES THE FAIR

Uppermost in the minds of most residents of this section next week will be the Twin Falls county Fair and Rodeo opening at Filer for a five-day run, Tuesday.

The entire countryside is expected to join in the fun, and Twin Falls may be relied upon to do its part, along with the other towns and cities in the county.

This fair is rapidly taking on the proportions of a state fair, and no such is attracting not only statewide interest but statewide exhibits.

Twin Falls county prides itself primarily on its agricultural resources and for that reason it is impossible to greatly to stress the importance of this asset in such a fair as that which exists.

In addition, in order to provide an attractive entertainment program, the rodeo feature has been instituted, along with the racing program.

All this goes to make of the county fair at Filer the biggest entertainment event in this section of the state, and deserving of the patronage of every resident, old and young.

Twin Falls county next week, then, invites the world, to attend its fair, to enjoy it, and to do everything to keep it as successful this year and in the future as it has been during the previous 17 years of its existence.

NEW, ADVANCED SAILOR

The sailor in Uncle Sam's fleet used to be a gaunt and shaggy person who could lay out on an ice-coated yard in a howling winter gale, split dead to windward, and lick any three waterfront tavern keepers single-handed.

He was rough and he was tough, and his officers ruled him with brutal hands of iron because they knew that, if they didn't, he was apt to pitch them bodily out of the cabin windows.

This old-timer has gone off to oblivion along with the square-rigged sailing ships that were his home, and the modern generation of sailors is as unlike him as the aircraft carrier Saratoga is unlike Old Ironsides. And in this difference there is a great deal more than a mere loss of picturesqueness.

An order went out the other day from the U. S. navy's bureau of navigation, in Washington, announcing that, due to a shortage of officers, a great many battle stations on the fighting ships traditionally filled by commissioned officers hereafter would be taken by enlisted men.

"The intelligence and competence of the enlisted personnel of the navy," remarked the order, "is higher today than it ever has been before in the history of our navy, and it is confidently felt that utilization of chief petty officers and other petty officers . . . will permit the navy to carry on without reduction in efficiency."

All this would seem to leave the modern sailor about three laps ahead of the fabulous old-timer.

Now the old-timer was just as good a man as the traditional traditions of the sea say he was. He could reef and furl, knot and splice, pull his weight in a small boat, and take his 60 lashes with the cat without uttering a whimper.

But he could no more have filled one of the battle stations traditionally reserved for commissioned officers than he could have jumped over the moon.

For with all his seamanship and his sturdy self-reliance, the old-time sailor was usually pretty much of a clod. The waterfront and the forecastle were his only school, and the teachers in those institutions believed firmly that to spur the rod was to spoil the child. He was a marvelous fighter if properly led—but he had to be led.

Now look at the modern sailor. He has an education better than that of the average officer of Decatur's day. He is at home among intricate technical devices that would have had the old-timer tugging his forelock in helpless bewilderment. At sea he is a skilled craftsman; ashore, he is a gentleman.

We often indulge in a great deal of silly talk about the glory and romance of the sea in those old, departed days—the days of iron men and wooden ships, as the old saying has it.

It's about time we realized that the modern sailor is actually a better man than his predecessor. The navy department knows it, and is trusting our national defense to a reliance on the fact.

FADE-BLUE PENNANT

The good-natured controversy between French and British seamen over whose ship really deserves the blue pennant symbolic of Atlantic supremacy approaches the ludicrous.

British claimants of the title cite a Queen Mary trip which averaged 31.01 knots. French claimants refer to a trip made by the Normandie some months back in which she averaged 30.84 knots.

But it would seem that when the speeds of two ocean liners come as near being equal as that, the actual distance doesn't mean much for practical purposes.



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
