Auto Accidents Cause Largest Number of Deaths During Holiday Week-End

20 DROWNINGS RECORDED

'Freak' Mishaps Swell Totals In Nation; Air Crashes Kill Dozen

At least 300 men, women and children paid with their lives for celebration of Labor day, it appeared today.

Deaths toll of the three-day holiday weekend, last of the summer, mounted to 228 in 30 states early today, according to a United Press survey.

Accidents in the early morning hours and reports of fatalities in secluded districts were expected to swell the toll well past 300.

Twenty of the thousands who crowded beaches and lake resorts seeking relief from "Indian summer" drowsiness, despite 25 days of life-saving officials to the beach resorts, died in accidents.

At least a dozen died in airplane crashes. Motor, fire and carcinoma added their toll.

Auto Tragedies Led

The greatest destruction—182 lives—followed the hundreds of thousands of motorists lined up the highways by fair weather to visit other cities, celebrate an auto race, or enjoy a picnic at summer cottages and picnic grounds.

Accidents on the highways were the chief cause of the traffic fatalities in anticipation of the holiday.

Five states will see the territory of Alaska held primary elections today, but as a result of the state's Maine election, time-honored political barometer of presidential election, it is a day of little political significance.

Today's primaries appeared without candidates in Vermont, though partisan forces may make use of them if the results are right.

The primaries were being held in Washington, Arizona, Colorado, Vermont and Alaska.

Tomorrow, the Georgia primary will provide a new glimpse of New Deal sentiment in the deep south.

There, Gov. Eugene D. Slatton, a Democrat, seeks the senatorial nomination in a "run-off" primary.

Washington voters choose party nominees for state and congressional offices, including an anti-New Deal Democrat, in a "run-off" primary.

Alaska voters choose nominees for territorial office and elect a delegate.

1000 ABHIANTS

SEATTLE, Sept. 8 (UP)—From 1,000 candidates, Republican and Democratic voters today will choose party candidates today for state and congressional offices.

It was a "run-off" primary that in a qualified voter, or without regard for party affiliation, will vote for one candidate on the six congressional seats to be elected.

Campaigns for the one congressional seat at stake were based largely on the issue of the relative merits of President Roosevelt and Governor M. Landon, though state issues figured, too.

The comparative merits of the two candidates may be considered of significance to some political observers.

Eight Democrats and seven Republicans were named for the one congressional seat.

The chief Republican candidates were former Gov. Holloman and Treasurer Otto A. Cane.

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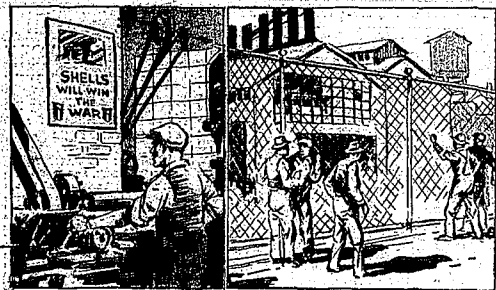
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The Story of Organized Labor

When the World War came, loyal labor achieved a triumph over anti-labor elements and supported the conflict. Through the war labor board the government took an increasing hand in labor problems. The A. F. of L. reached 4,078,710 members.



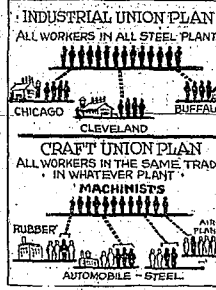
Soon a double threat was met from a determined "open shop" drive, and from radical unions, which tried both dual substance and "working from within" tactics. Under Communist direction of William Z. Foster, the best dual strategy of IDIL was lost despite expenditure of a huge strike fund.



When the depression struck, many unions were hard-hit by unemployment benefits bureaus, and the masses of workers remained unorganized. Efforts to organize "mass" industries, such as auto and textile, into industrial unions under the A. F. of L., largely failed. Union membership continued to decline.



In 1933, passage of the national industrial recovery act gave labor organizations a new lease on life. New unions and new members of old ones flocked to organize under the "New Deal." But strikes followed resistance to bargaining and San Francisco was frozen in a general strike.



This conflict between the craft union-dominated A. F. of L. under President William Green and the unions favoring the industrial plan of organization, led by John L. Lewis, now dominates the labor scene. Generally speaking, the latter also favor formation of a direct labor party, while the A. F. of L. craft unions cling to the old policy of "revival our friends, punish our enemies." On the success or failure of the drive to organize the hitherto open shop steel, automobile, metal-fabricating, rubber, and similar industries depends the direction which organized labor will take in the future.



Adverse court decisions showed labor that the final answer to its problems had not yet been found. Increasing pressure within labor organizations for political activity followed, and a group of unions within the A. F. of L. set about organizing the "mass" industries themselves.

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RUMOR EPIDEMIC DISTURBS JAPAN

Newspaper Story Results In Closing Up of Tokyo Stock Exchange

TOKYO (U.S.)—Japan is experiencing an epidemic of rumors which keep the populace suspended in constant uncertainty between fact and fancy.

In at least one case—in which a report, subsequently deemed high government authority caused a mild panic and closing of stock exchanges through the empire—the rumors have had serious results.

Police have uncovered the backbone of the stock exchange business, which was dignified by appearance in an influential Tokyo newspaper, while the sources of other stories which have gained wide circulation are being investigated.

Reporters and security men were involved, according to the police reports, in the stock exchange schemes.

Rumored Ban on Futures

A newspaper printed a story to the effect that the reform board of the government included prohibition of futures transactions in the scheme of the Tokyo stock exchange.

There was a sudden dip in the quotations on exchange stock the morning after the article was published, but hurriedly and suspended business for the day.

Some other newspapers, however, after others did likewise.

Why?—The reform board, the finance minister and the minister for the interior and commerce, who are those responsible for the rumor.

The police report declares that the rumors were spread by a certain report on the promise that the reports would receive \$5,000,000 from certain banks in advance sales of the stock. The statement expected a fall in the market.

Asa Probe

The minority political party Bekokai, has taken official action of the widespread rumors that have been circulating since the government's intention. It submitted a written request that the "reform board" be investigated.

Unofficial rumors have been current on measures the government has not yet decided on for reform of state administration, causing considerable popular unrest and disturbance in several circles," the party's statement said.

"If the cause of the leakage is found within the government, enforcement of state administration is urgently called for. If such rumors are groundless, appropriate measures should be taken by the government in accordance with existing regulations."

Dynamite Needed to Demolish Old Canal Foundations Found in Italy

TURIN, Italy (U.S.)—Large quantities of dynamite were used by a road construction corps here to demolish ancient Roman canal foundations reinforced with concrete which experts say is stronger than any produced by modern methods.

Roman ditches were used without success to remove the canal foundations which obstructed construction of "Via Roma," in the heart of Turin. Grand Teton Starts Keeping Humidity Record as Part of Control Plan

WASHINGTON (U.S.)—To help in determining the degree of fire hazard, plans for a "cumulative humidity record" have been adopted at Grand Teton National Park, Wyo., the interior department has announced. The report four fire control manuals of the United States forest service will form the basis of the project.

Daily humidity records were started on June 11, being 27 percent relative humidity as the normal average. Records for the eight-day period thereafter indicated a night excess of moisture over normal years. Further conclusions will be announced from time to time.

Two Camps Ready

Two CCC camps are assigned to Grand Teton National park and are available, at the first reports of forest fire, to carry out the technique of suppression and fire control which are among the duties in which all enrollees are drilled.

Infra-red national photographic, taken by forestry technicians of the national park service, also are helpful in early detection of forest fires, says the department.

These photographs sharpen all outlines, clearly define the horizon, regardless of any smoke haze present when the picture is taken, and provide a panoramic picture by use of which, checked with a map, the fire lookout man may quickly determine the location of suspicious smoke.

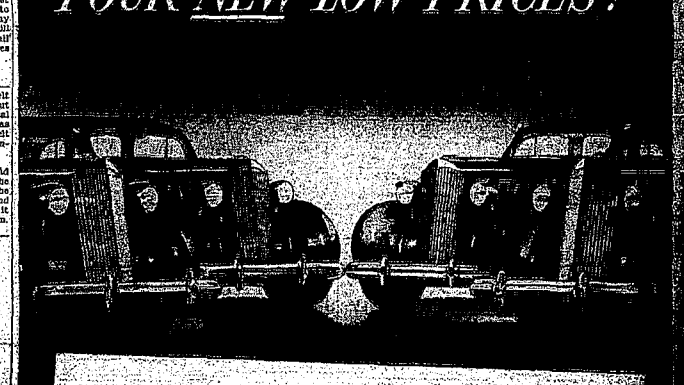

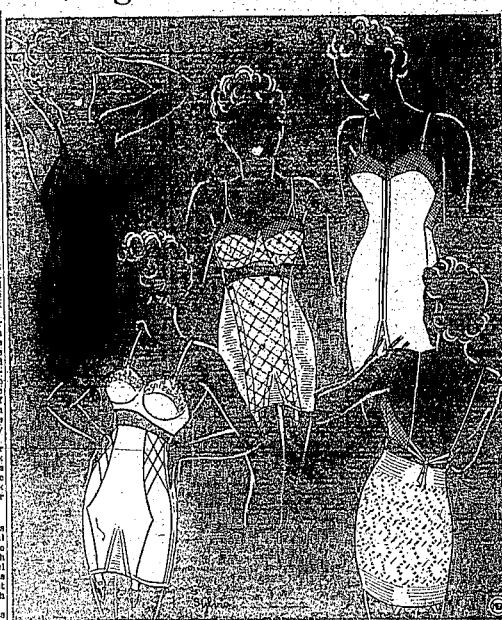

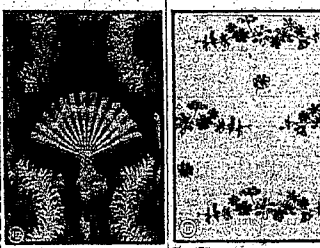

MAINE CAMPAIGN IN FINAL PHASES

Independence and Popularity Of Some Aspirants Help Complicate Race

PORTLAND, Maine, Sept. 8 (U.S.)—Republicans and Democrats entered the final campaign week today for Monday's "big Maine vote," as some of the nation's electioneers called it.

Interest centered in the battle for the U. S. senate. Governor Louis Jefferson Brann, the Democratic nominee, seeks to wrest the post from the Republican incumbent, Wallace H. White, Jr., who has represented Maine in Washington for 13 consecutive years— from 1917 to 1930 as representative and since then as senator.

Brann's popularity was attested by his election in 1932 when Herbert Hoover carried Maine by 25,000 votes, and his re-election two years later.

Opponents for the governorship are the Republican "secretary of state, Lewis O. Barron, of New York, former Mayor Harold P. Dubois, Democrat of Waterville and Benjamin C. Dunbar, Independent of Bangor, Townsland-plan supporter and longtime Baptist minister, Dubois, lost to U. S. Senator Frederick H. Hale, Republican, by only 1,200 votes in the 1932 senate race.

Nelson Johnson of Burlington, a bank president and newspaper owner, Lieut.-Gov. George Aiken of Putney, and Treas. Judge Ernest Moore of Ludlow, house speaker at the last session. None rated any issue except that of their records.

MAINE TAKES SPOTLIGHT IN ONLY SEPTEMBER BALLOTING

WASHINGTON (U.S.)—As Maine goes, so goes the nation, according to the old political adage. In the actual partisan advantage from the nation's only September election was bitterly contested, issue today on Maine prepared to go to the ballot box.

A study of the way Maine has gone in the last few decades revealed that the state vote shows a trend on the part of the nation's large Commonwealths. The trend is, however, open to dispute. Only once in this century has the state voted for its Democratic electoral vote to a Democratic presidential candidate, but both in 1916 and in 1932 its September election results showed sufficient Democratic strength to point to election of Democratic presidents.

Wilson Won

In 1912, Maine, due to the three-cornered split resulting from Theodore Roosevelt's third party candidacy, gave its electoral vote to Woodrow Wilson.

Maine on September 14, will elect a United States senator, three representatives and state constitutional officers. Bitterly contested partisan battles all along the line will have in them elements of state as well as national controversy. For example, the hooded Klu Klux Klan is pushing a "separating" project has split party lines.

House majority clerk William Tyler Page, a student of political trends for a quarter of a century, said today that the Maine vote this month should show, however, the national trend.

Upholds Tradition
"By and large as Maine goes so goes the country," said Page.

An inconclusive result, however, he said, would be election this month of a Democratic senator and three Republican house members, or of two or three Democratic house members and a Republican senator.

"If figures should show that the usual Republican majority is not quite normal, it would indicate a close national election in November," Page said.

The state now has two Democratic representatives, one Republican and two Republican senators. One of the latter, Sen. Wallace H. White, Jr., is opposed by Lieut. Gov. Brann, Democratic and former governor, in the present election. One Democratic house member, Rep. runner for re-election, Rep. Edward C. Moran.
