A CHALLENGE

Enthused over the possibilities of highway 93 extending from the Mexican border to the Canadian line, some 30 Californians and Nevadans stopped briefly here yesterday on route to the annual convention of the Four States Highway Association at Whitefish, Mont., tomorrow.

About all that could be done for the delegates here was to wish them godspeed on their mission, despite the fact that Twin Falls and Idaho should be as much concerned over the improvement of this route as are the ardent supporters of the movement from the north.

They are to be commended for their untiring zeal, for they appreciate, as this section does not yet, the unending benefits of tourist travel.

They are trying to secure the completion of a 35-mile gap in the route in southern California, and a 23-mile stretch between Clayton and Challis in this state. Also they would wish that we in this region get action on the long-delayed proposal to eliminate bridge tolls at our back-door, certainly a constant barrier to free travel over highway 93.

The caravan, representing as it does a literal invasion of Idaho by Californians and Nevadans in an effort to induce us to share in the fruits of highway travel, constitutes a challenge to the leadership of this section, which should answer the invitation of the visitors with a determined and concerted effort towards cooperation and accomplishment in a project unending in its possibilities for permanent good.

The average citizen must be getting more and more tired of the campaign orators who are going up and down the land telling all who will listen that the coming presidential election is the most fateful in the nation's history.

America isn't on the edge of a precipice. It will still be here a year from today. It's a tough country, and it will go on doing business at the old stand, regardless of the outcome of the election.

AMERICAN IDEALS AN EJECTION ISSUE

Nevertheless, there is a sense in which this campaign is going to be a landmark for future historians. How it comes out may not change the course of history; how it is conducted may be exceedingly important.

Consider this fact: America is one of the last of the great democracies in this modern world. All across Europe, in country after country, democratic institutions have collapsed and fallen. In countries where they have not fallen, they are under attack as never before.

Ordinary men all over the civilized world have come to wonder whether, after all, complete self-government is a workable possibility in the world as it exists today.

These people are watching our presidential campaign this year as never before. How will the methods of democracies conduct her affairs this year?

Will she, in a time of great stress, when men are worried and uncertain and the future is perplexing, be able to make a sane and intelligent decision or will confusion, out giving way to emotion or prejudice? With unusual importance, we shall be telling the other nations that democracy doesn't work so well, after all.

How American answers those questions may play a major part in settling the fate of democracy.

For this country, which introduced democracy to the modern world, must now justify it. It must prove that democracy can work as well in hard times as in good; that the people themselves, with unlimited discussion and a free choice, can guide the destinies of a nation as sensibly and efficiently as can a clique of self-appointed rulers.

It must demonstrate that the common folk of a great country deserve their freedom.

What happens there when election day is all-important. If we spend our time on hush-hush campaign rumors, may after the stipend speakers who devote themselves to attacks on character, and get all befuddled with unimportant side issues, we shall be telling the other nations that democracy doesn't work so well, after all.

But if we "speak straight to the live," examine the issues thoroughly and intelligently, refuse to be stampeded by fear or prejudice, and make our decision finally according to our most sober judgment—the cause of democracy in the world as a whole will get a great, new lease on life.

## COLLEGE OPENING PLANS ARRANGED

Normal Schools Starting Week Ahead of University and Southern Branch

BOISE, Sept. 9 (UP)—With state elementary public schools already in session, the state department of public instruction today was completing details preparatory to opening other state educational institutions.

Approximately 125,000 students from kindergarten through high school ages began the 1936-37 school year Tuesday.

Alhion and Lewiston normal schools open Sept. 14, as will the union training school. The dear and blind school opens Sept. 16.

The University of Idaho, at Moscow, and the Southern Branch, at Pocatello, began their academic years Sept. 21, with registration at both institutions set for Sept. 28 and 29.

5,000 A. S. Mason, John W. Condie, superintendent of public instruction, anticipated an enrollment of 2,800 to 3,000 at the university and 800 to 1,000 at the Southern Branch.

Total enrollment in all state schools last year was 110,343. Condie predicted that 125,000 pupils would be in attendance this year.

He attributed the gain to two factors. First, the increase of mining conditions in the north end of the state. Second, influx of families into southern Idaho from the drought sections of the midwest.

More Teachers.—The number of teachers employed by the state will be necessarily higher this year than in 1935-36 when 4,333 were on the state pay roll. When attendance is at its peak there will be in the neighborhood of 4,500 teachers instructing Idaho youngsters.

The cost of educating Idaho's school children was \$40,018 last year. This year it will approximate \$40,000,000, Condie believes.

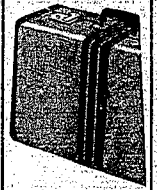
