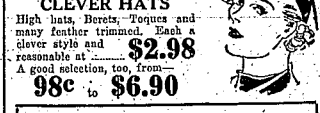

BARZILLA CLARK OPENS CAMPAIGN

Candidate for Governor Will Be Principal Speaker at Boise Meet

BOISE, Sept. 11 (Special)—Barzilla W. Clark, Democratic nominee for governor, will launch his campaign here Monday evening, according to word received today by Ira J. Taylor, state chairman.

Anticipating delegations from all southern Idaho counties, Chairman Taylor forecast a "surprising display of strength" at the Boise meeting, which will draw Mr. Clark's first campaign appearance in the Capital City.

Visiting from Boise, Idaho, State headquarters, county organizations, and the Young Men's Club are cooperating to stage the event and advance registration of voters.

Personal invitations have been sent to all state and congressional candidates on the ticket, urging them to participate in the evening program, Taylor said.

Additional features for the occasion will include a band procession through the streets in which several hundred automobiles will participate, and a dance in the Hotel Boise following the main address.

Clark's appearance in Boise, Chairman Taylor explained, is in answer to constant demands among local followers of both political faiths to have the Democratic candidate for governor on a public program in an early date.

Enthusiasm which developed resulted in the decision to make Clark's appearance here the official No. 1 event of the party's fall campaign.
