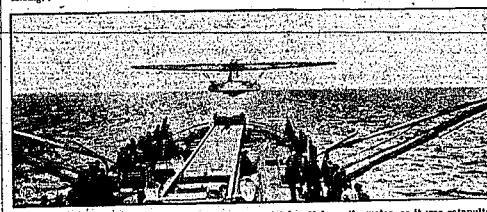
BLAZING TRAIL FOR NEW MAIL ROUTE



After speeding through fog and heavy rain, and against strong headwinds most of the way, the Douglas flying boat Zephyr, is shown above as it taxied to its dock at Fort Washington, N. Y., at the end of a 2,500-mile non-stop flight from the Azores in 23 hours, seven minutes. The Diesel-powered ship averaged slightly more than 100 miles per hour in blazing a new air-mail route over the North Atlantic.

SPANISH BATTLE IS CRITICAL TEST

Fighting Southwest of Madrid Looms as Carrying Fate of Revolution

The battle in the Talavera region southwest of Madrid, Spain, today is a critical test of strength which may decide the fate of the revolution.
The rebels, well-trained, well-equipped and with a superior air force, battered at the loyalist lines in a determined effort to reach Madrid and then push on to Madrid.
Opposing them is a numerically superior but ill-trained and ill-equipped army which makes up in ferocity and courage what they lack in military skill.
Loyalist Forces Back
The loyalist forces, demoralized by the loss of the front and the fact that they are almost completely surrounded, are in a desperate situation. The government, however, pours more reinforcements towards the front and planned a counter-attack.
Reinforcements who were sent in the direction of the Guadarrama mountains directly north of the capital, where an artillery attack was planned.

The other main scene of action was on the Aragon front north of the capital. Government communications claimed success and reported the loyalists were in control of Sitabam, which has been held by the rebels for weeks and is the key to Huesca and Zaragoza.

Triple Menace
The rebels were threatened with attack on three sides, leaving only the direct western route to Valencia open.
Elsewhere in Spain, scattered fighting and small advances in progress. 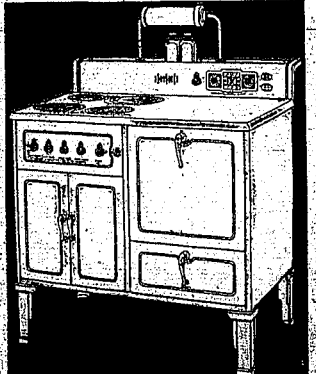

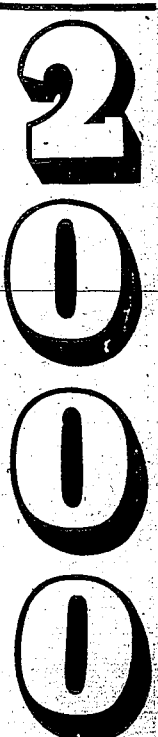

HERE ARE HINTS FOR HOUSEWIVES

Mrs. Amy Villa Offers You Suggestions You'll Find Are Valuable

Hints and suggestions for housewives by Mrs. Amy Villa:

Pantry for Christmas pies will be more flaky if you mix the flour, salt and shortening, then store it in your refrigerator until ready to bake. Add the water to the mixtures when you are ready to make the pies. The mixed dry ingredients will keep almost indefinitely, but once moisture is added the unbaked dough will darken after about three days in the refrigerator.

If an egg beater or electric food mixer is used to beat partially frozen ice cream or sherbert it should be used on low or medium speed. Too rapid beating breaks down the air cells and reduces the volume and hence the number of portions of the finished dessert.

To thoroughly clean the inside of your refrigerator, soda and luke-warm water are recommended. Add two tablespoons of soda to each quart of water.

Flavoring in cakes is not nearly so apt to be forgotten if it is measured right into the milk or other liquid.

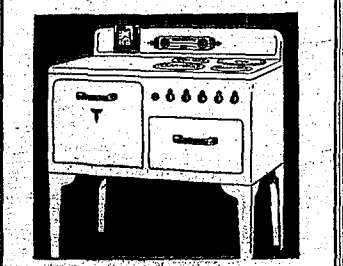

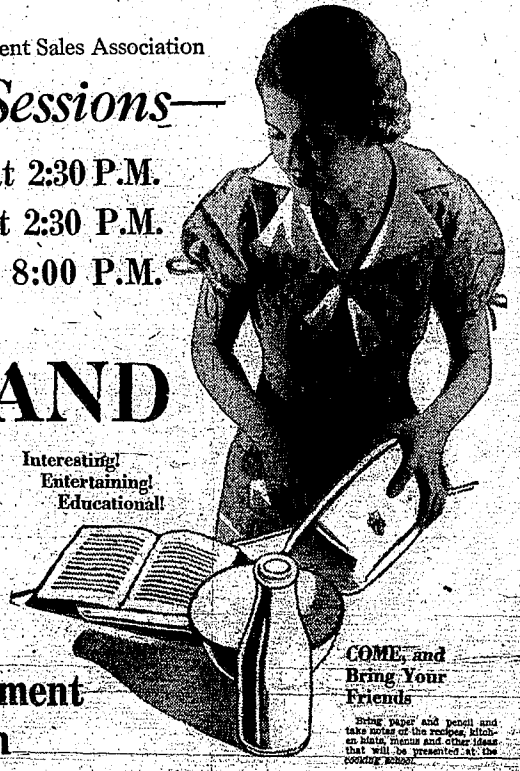

MEN'S HALL HAS RADIO EQUIPMENT

New Dormitory at Moscow Is to Have Unit System With Built-In Special

MOSCOW, Sept. 15 (Special)—Built-in radio equipment of the latest design, combined with the unit system, will be installed in William Sweet hall, new men's residence building, under construction at the University of Idaho.

Authorizations to install the modern unit radio system was made by the board of regents at its recent meeting in Boise. University authorities carefully investigated the radio question that they found that the majority of the men who would live in the new hall have and would continue to operate radio sets in their rooms. Such sets averaged not less than \$25 per radio.

Without a central aerial and wiring system, the many individual aerials on the sides and roof of the building would be most unsightly. Furthermore, the added fire hazard caused by each student doing his own makeshift wiring, would raise insurance rates. Built-in radio was selected as the logical remedy.

The built-in radio will be made by the Siltson Sound Laboratory, successful builders for the job. A small loud speaker will be installed on the ceiling of each study room. This will connect to a dial switch mounted on the wall, much the same as an ordinary light switch.

Each room will be tuned to three channels or different stations, any one of which may be selected in with the wall dial. A fourth channel will be used for room communication only.

The head of the men will be a centrally-located master tuner. Instantly he can receive any three different stations on the regular broadcast band. The tuner is selected by men living in the hall should the tuner be located in the pick of the best program on the air. At any time a special program is desired, all that needs to be done is turn on the master tuner. The head of the new station will be an every room radio in the building. Study rules probably will limit radio operation to certain hours, said Robert F. Gagne, director of men, who will be in charge of William Sweet hall when it is completed in February. A switch in the master tuner will make this item simultaneously dead.

The communication system will make it possible to buzz any one of the 200 men in the building, or not the projector's office. Whether on a dial tone or buzz from the ceiling loud speaker will be the reason to the telephone on the office, depending on the huzz or signals accepted.

The Modern Trend in Methods Of Cooking

Cooking methods—are we really capable of doing them properly? evaluating the modern ones today.

Let's journey to the time of our grandmothers. Let's examine their methods of cooking. Let's see whether they are called "Cook-Boiler" to remember the old cooking pot and the wood box stove, or "Cook-Boiler" to remember the dry for the wet wood, the well-seasoned or the green wood, which at various times filled it? As a result, do you remember how sometimes the oven heated itself—how more often it did not?

Measuring Cuten Little wonder, then, that few, if any, scientific methods of measuring ingredients were even thought of. Our grandmothers measured ingredients as "spoons." Many recipes called for such uncertain measurements as "a size of hens were laying good"—or four "just enough for the cake." It was a "good" thing, a "temperature control" was understood.

Moreover, after the meal had finally been cooked and served, do you remember, when asked that still remained—that of scouring the pots and pans—over what that of cleaning, scouring and burnishing the old cook stove itself?

You Deserve Tribute Certainly we should pay tribute to those grandmothers of ours. They were literally sententious in their "galling." They accepted it resignedly because they had no other choice. Their cooking tasks were tedious and confining. To have any "luck" what they had to watch, "Necessity" and "mother" their food for hours. It was a laborious and unprofitable of food for their families each week, each month, each year—labor which would make them glad to be shut out.

Gradually, however, a transition began to take place. In the days of the "mother" marked improvement in the convenience of the cooking methods. The wood box and the coal scuttles disappeared; other and more modern cooking fuels came into use; cooking methods took a distinct step forward.

Recipes Changed Recipes began to change, too. The use of measuring spoons and measuring cups gradually came into vogue.

Still, however, there remained the necessity of hovering over, or keeping a watchful eye on, one's cooking. Many of the old cooking uncertainties and failures still remained. The coffee pot continued to boil over, the rice continued to stick to the bottom of the pot. The great meat still be scoured, it must still be heated from time to time all during the roasting period.

Our mothers knew no freedom, no ease, no relinquishing of responsibility so far as their cooking was concerned.

Dawn of Electricity Early in the 20th century a young man by the name of George A. Hughes, was intrigued with the possibilities of cooking by electricity. In the quarter of a century during which the electric range has been undergoing its development, discoveries of never, simpler cooking operations have gradually been made.

TEXAS DEVELOPS CACTUS PRODUCT

New Industry Looms as Big Boom to Ranchers Under Patented Process

By JAMES P. DOBBS
DALLAS, Sept. 14.—An industry is being developed in Texas from a plant which ranchmen have spent much time and thousands of dollars to destroy—the cactus.

While this industry is in its infancy, careful examination of articles produced from cactus stalks shows them to be of such toughness, strength and durability that the future of the business seems assured.

Texas A-M, University of Texas graduate in pathology, has spent the past few years and now is using it as raw material for the manufacture of cactus, gravel, handbags, fans, vases and other articles. Every part of the cactus, from the stalks and leaves or joints of the cactus. The patent application for the process is pending.

Major Industry Possible
Estimates over the value of the cactus manufactured products are destined to become a major industry in Texas.

Texas needs a new crop besides cotton and wheat, says a professor of botany at the University of Texas, said while examining products of his plant "it occurred to me that here is such a crop—cactus which should be raised to benefit to the people of the cactus region."

Dr. H. C. Thayer, another professor of botany at the university, also was impressed by the product. This seems to point the way to a new and valuable industry for one which will be of great value to ranchers of the state," he said.

Called Ideal for Cane
Two articles most extensively manufactured from the cactus are walking canes and fans. The canes—one of which was given to President Roosevelt—are made from the long stalks and have proved to be of unusual strength. Since the stalk is a hollow, perforated tube, the canes also are light in weight.

The fans are fashioned so as to retain the shape of the cactus leaves. Before they are placed on the market, suitable eyes of assorted colors or combinations are added with a special lining.

Capped With Wand

Texas cactus-producing areas are the southern western and central parts. Although a number of species are involved, there are divided roughly into two types—the flat-jointed opuntia, commonly known as the prickly pear, and the cholla.

For years Chinese students have been subjected to severe disciplinary measures usually enforced by cane or ruler, and often, the Ministry of education believes, as a result of pedagogic injustice.

Thalberg's own studio, Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, closed its doors for 24 hours, and its lights tonight until midnight to-morrow, in memory of the production genius who was largely responsible for the organization's position in the industry.

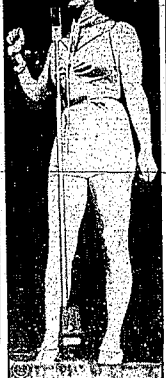

DEVICE DETECTS SPURIOUS COINS

Sydney, Australia, Bank Uses Machine That Reveals Counterfeiters

SYDNEY (AP)—What is said to be the first infallible spurious coin detector has been installed at the head office of the Bank of New South Wales. Bank officials declare the machine is the first revolution in the handling of money.

The machine has detected spurious coins that had previously defied all known means of discovery. It detects a counterfeit coin in an inch of a second. In three minutes it can handle 1,000 coins, detecting every spurious one.

The machine is controlled electrically. The coins are placed in a large bowl on top, and pass into a vertical chifter, in which they are analyzed by electricity. The good coins are automatically counted and registered. Bad coins are rejected into an opposite compartment.
