MICHIGAN ENDS COUZENS' LONG SENATE CAREER

Primary Vote Rejects Veteran For Farmer Gov. Brucker Murphy Winning

LA FOLLETTE TRIUMPH Wins Wisconsin Endorsement; Townsends Beaten In New York Race

The 14-year senatorial career of James Couzens, widely independent Republican, was ended today in Michigan; Gov. Philip F. Feltus was elected in a first vote of confidence in Wisconsin; and Townsend followers suffered reverses in the final primaries of the 1936 campaign year.

Highlights of the results in five states:

Brocker Wins Michigan: The "regular" Republican candidate for senator, former Gov. Wilbur M. Brucker, rolled up a 3 to 2 lead over Senator Couzens who conducted no active campaign here. Brucker issued a brief statement that the reelection of President Roosevelt was his only objective. That Democrats were elected by the apparent victory of Frank Murphy, the avowed Roosevelt candidate for the Democratic nomination for governor, by more than a one and one-half to one lead over George W. W. Hunt, Murphy was free Gov. Frank D. Fitzgerald, the Republican nominee, in November.

LaFollette Endorsed Wisconsin: Gov. Philip F. LaFollette, successor in the Progressive gubernatorial primary, was given a large vote of confidence, more than 50,000 total Republicans cast for their candidates for the state senate. LaFollette had 138,316 votes compared with 125,055 for Alexander Wiley and John B. (Continued on Page 2, Column 1)

KNOX RETRACTION ENDS BANK DUEL

Pennsylvania Official Asserts Nominee Took Back Claim Of Non-Safety

DETROIT, Sept. 16 (AP)—Dr. Luther A. Harris, Pennsylvania nominee for United States senator, today said that his dispute with Frank Knox, Republican, over the latter's vice presidential candidacy made in a speech at Allentown, Pa., was settled.

U. S. LEADERS FEAR EUROPE SLIDING TOWARD WAR BRINK

Soviet Rushes Highways To Meet Western Peril

MOSCOW, Sept. 16 (AP)—The Soviet Union is thrusting with utmost speed two military highways directly toward the borders of Poland to meet what the Soviet press describes as the imminent threat of war in the west.

Thousands of conscript laborers, working in 24-hour shifts, under floodlights at night, can be seen near Moscow perfecting the eastern end of what will be a four-lane, 16-mile-an-hour highway to Leningrad and Kiev. The first cars will speed along the Moscow-Minsk road Nov. 1, day of the celebration of the proletarian revolution, according to the construction schedule.

Obvious Purpose The military nature of the highway is not avowed, but becomes obvious in view of the event. Work is being speeded out of all proportion to other equally important projects.

While peasants slowly break roads for the roadbed of the event, the government and press openly admit their fear of being attacked by Germany or Poland.

War May Be Brewing In Europe, Hull Says

NEW YORK, Sept. 16 (AP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull told an audience of 1,000 persons last night that war may be in the making in Europe and that international agreements have lost power.

The United States is increasing its arms "substantially," he said, because it is "essential."

A policy of friendliness and cooperation, embodied in the "good neighbor" phrase, in America is the only hope of avoiding complications in the present conflict.

SALINAS, Calif., Sept. 16 (AP)—Commander Louis Bloss today ordered mobilization of the American Legion here after a wild morning of fighting in downtown street between striking lettuce workers, state police and farm-vigilantes.

Navy Decides On Europe Squadron

'Temporary' Fleet Group Will Be Organized Abroad

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16 (AP)—The U. S. navy has decided to establish a "temporary" fleet group in Europe.

After numerous denials from President Roosevelt, Secretary of State Cordell Hull and the navy department that the establishment of the European squadron, the navy department announced today that upon the arrival of the cruiser Raleigh in Gibraltar, a squadron would be organized "temporarily" under the command of Rear Admiral John L. 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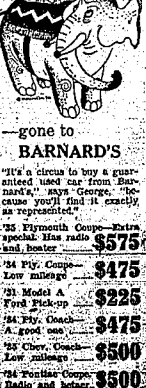
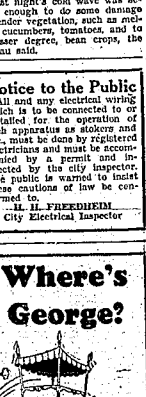
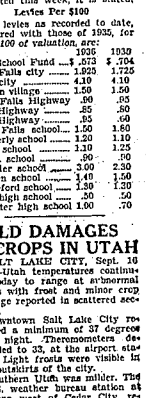
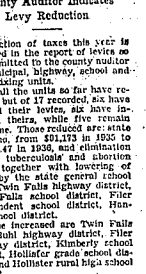
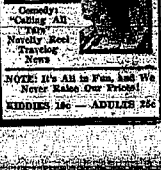
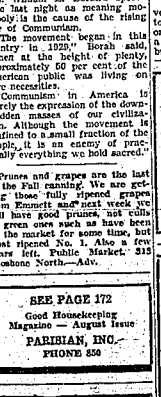
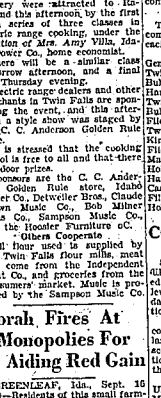
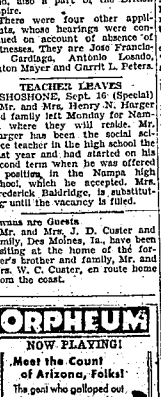
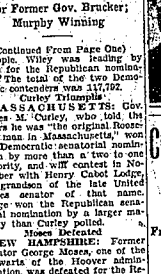
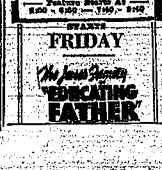
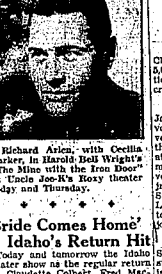
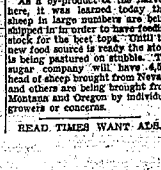
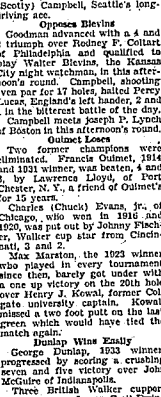
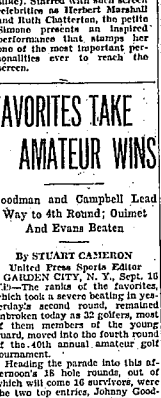
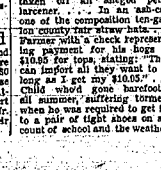
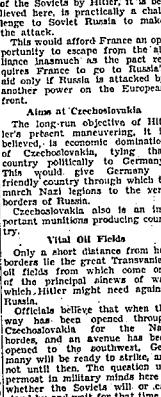
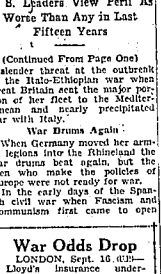
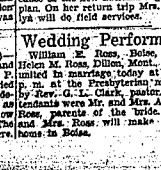
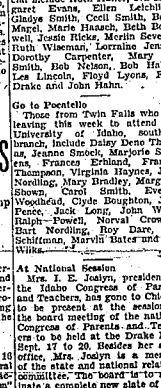
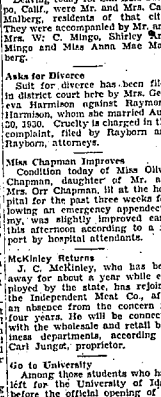
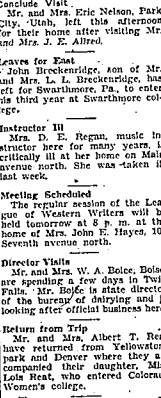
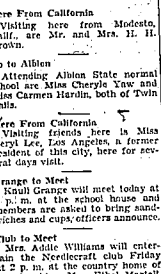
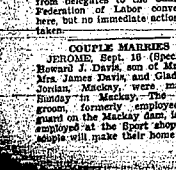
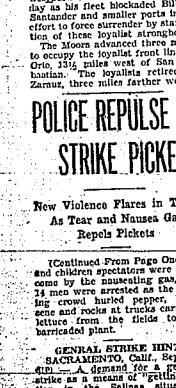
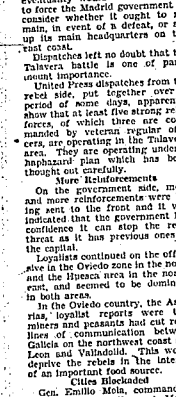
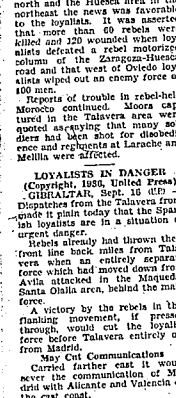
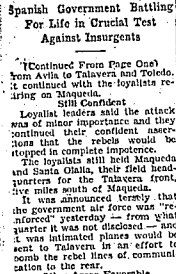
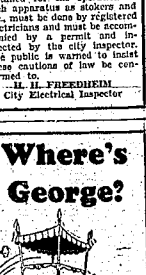
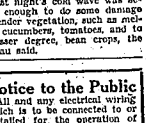
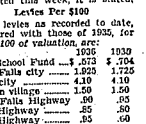
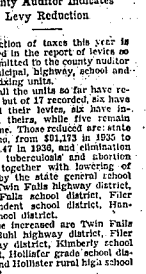
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PROTEST STALLS WATER HEARING

Application for Devil's Corral Supply Will Be Heard On October 15

BOISE, Sept. 16 (UP)—A protest by W. A. Peters of Twin Falls against applications of W. A. Walker, also of Twin Falls, for appropriation of 85 acres of water for underground water from Devil's Corral will not be heard by the state bureau of reclamation until Oct. 15.

Scheduled to be heard Tuesday, attorneys for Peters asked for a continuance of the hearing for one month. Peters earlier in the year filed a permit to develop subterranean waters near Twin Falls and dig wells to provide the Idaho City with a municipal water supply. Walker notified the department he wishes to use the water for a fish hatchery. The water would be taken from wells about three miles below the point where Peters wished to sink his wells and for this reason his objection was raised.

POT SHOTS WEST PACIFIC FLIGHT With The Gentleman in the Third Row

THE DUNCE TAKES HOLLAND The kind of political clap-trap which gives the average voter a distinct pain in the neck, and to which allusion frequently has been made in these columns comes no less a personage than Gov. Alf M. Lundon, erstwhile candidate for the high office of the Presidency of the United States.

He says, according to the United Press, that "Maine has proved that the people of this country are aroused to their DANGER and determined to preserve their system of government and life."

That was Mr. Lundon's reaction to the easily forecast election result in the Republican-bound balliwicket of Maine.

The election, to Mr. Lundon, does not mean that a strong Republican state has voted Republican, as was predicted, but he reads into it something ulterior, something bordering upon a conspiracy of genocide.

This is the sort of thing which makes for suspicion of candidates who profess such preposterous convictions. And, be it known, they are not chance phrases of an excited politician, but the studied campaign method of the G. O. P. in nation and state.

The American system of government never was in better hands than it is now, never did the people have so much of a hand in shaping their destinies, in securing responsive action, and in elevating their ideals into law.

And this nation of level-headed citizens is not to be awayed by such false doctrine as that espoused by the Lundons whose asserted feigns can be appreciated if it is the result of the general reaction they are talking about.

Constitution Day Recalls Memories Of Madison

BY WILLIS THORNTON (MEA Service)

Constitution-day, Thursday, marks not only the 149th year of the basic law of the land, but the centennial anniversary of the death of James Madison.

The Father of the Constitution, Madison, was born on the 17th of March, 1751, in the village of Port Conway, Va.

Madison was small of stature (he called him "my great little Madison"), slender handsome, and scholarly.

When the first American government under the Confederation bogged down for lack of central powers and energetic leadership, Madison was among the leaders demanding a convention to frame a new government.

When delegates from all the states assembled in Philadelphia in the early summer of 1787, Madison was then 36, and was only one of the most active delegates, but his plan for a constitution, introduced in modified form, was the basis for the final agreement.

Madison was keen, careful notes of all that went on, a brief summary of the views and arguments of every speaker.

At night, debate over, he would go to his room and transcribe those notes in a small neat hand, and then show them to the speakers, asking them to verify what he had written.

Madison was so keen in his study that he made with regard to public confidence in currency, rise and fall of exchange rates and highness or lowness of the cost of living.

Madison went home to work for adoption of the constitution.

FACTORY ADOPTS AGE-FIRST RULE

Six Men, Youngest 72, Still On Job at Kansas City Saddle Plant

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)—Six men, the youngest 72, work daily in a saddlery here, to refute any charge that age is without a place in the modern industrial world.

When the depression struck the Shipley Saddle and Mercantile company, just as when the business was started by the present owner in 1885, toward modernity, however, the company now manufactures much polo equipment.

Paul of Old Days The six old men were the first of the days when the west was young as they work in nine other companies in a dingy three-story building. The pre-depression force was the 1885.

Charles P. Shipley organized the business Aug. 13, 1885, and he watched the old west retreat before the motor car. He still has the hats used for many of the winners of the west.

The six old men, most of whom have worked with Shipley almost since the founding of the business, are: Sergei Hamble, 73, foreman; Albert J. B. Brown, 72, saddler; Joseph Marjura, 75; and Edward J. Baker, 75, formerly president of the International Harness Makers Union.

Quick Successes The company succeeded almost from the start, and received most of the business from the ranchers and cowboys. Today it has more than 4000 hats for boys and shoes, traveling bags.

The transition has taken the company to making saddles for the U. S. army, polo saddles, books and shoes, traveling bags, billfolds and virtually every type of leathergood. No effort toward mass production is made.

Foreign orders form a good part of the Shipley business, many coming from Guatemala, Belgium, Canada, England, France, Scotland, the United States, South Africa, Australia, Hawaii and India.

JURYMEN DECREE U. S. INDICTMENTS

Order True Bills on Federal Charges Against Accused At Boise Session

H. Emerson and the bank for April 27, 1935; \$20 from the bank and James Briggs on April 27, 1935; and \$100 from Julia Adams and the bank during July, 1935. Farnsworth was an employee of the bank.

17 Counts
K. F. Stringfield, Caldwell, indicted on 17 counts, allegedly took money to "injure and defraud the First National bank of Idaho, Caldwell branch, by 'misappropriating' \$150 on June 20, 1934, from the account of Henry Beck; \$25 from the McCarthy house account on Oct. 1, 1934; \$25 from HXFD and Frank Hurt during Oct., 1934; \$25 from the McCarthy house account, from the McCarthy house account, Nov. 1933; \$25 from HXFD and Frank H. Hurt, Nov. 1934; \$40 from City of Caldwell, Nov. 1934; \$100 from L. H. Waters, Dec., 1934; \$100 from Dorothy Warr, Jan., 1935; \$25.00 from C. G. Wray, June, 1935; \$25.00 from Robert Montgomery, Aug. 20, 1935; \$25 from Robinson, Oct., 1935; \$25 from A. E. Loughlin, Dec., 1935; \$25 from Charles C. Wilson, Dec., 1935; and \$25 from Western Union, Dec. 1935.

Louis Struan, Burley, indicted, charged with selling liquor without paying government tax and also growing without paying federal tax.

Indictments presented to the U. S. district court for prosecution by O. D. Heller, foreman of the jury.

Produce Shipment Figures Increase

BOISE, Sept. 16 (AP)—Idaho's boom of plenty is showing out a wealth of produce this year, such as is seldom harvested, even in the best years, figures of the U. S. F. E. reveal.

The year from Jan. 1 to Aug. 31 shows an increase of 2981 carloads of produce shipped out of the state over last year's figures. The total for this year is 10,428 carloads. In 1935, the total for the same period was 11,347 carloads.

For the month of August the total was 970 carloads as compared with 1894 carloads in August of 1935.

Of this year's total 1760 carloads were potatoes and 499 were green peas. There were 81 carloads of peaches, 13 carloads of eggs and nine carloads of cherries. There were 41 carloads of butter and 18 carloads of lettuce.
