THE AVERAGE IS WHAT COUNTS All the elements of a typical fall harvest are upon us, outstanding in any such survey being the good and the bad features which predominate at this season.

Unseasonal weather brings losses to some crops, at the same time tending, perhaps, to boost prices by virtue of yields having been cut down. In other instances there are big yields in some crops, with the price unsatisfactory.

At this season also, growers wish they had planted some crops other than those they did, and through it all runs necessarily for each grower paying strict attention to the marketing of the products he has on hand.

Indication of a big sugar beet yield is one of the important developments of the season. There are to be three factories operating in the south-central section, with thousands employed in the harvest.

After all the losses and all the gains have been counted, it do doubt will be found that this will have been an outstanding year here agriculturally.

During the past year, for instance, 92 per cent of the men who were found to be illiterate at the beginning of the year have been attending classes regularly.

Here is an activity which is every bit as important as the forest conservation work, if not more so. The prime qualification for citizenship in a democracy is that a man be at least literate.

The CCC, by bringing educational opportunities to men who had been denied them, is amply justifying its existence.

And it should be possible to say this without thought of the current political campaign. The CCC is not a partisan issue. It is a national program that has worked.

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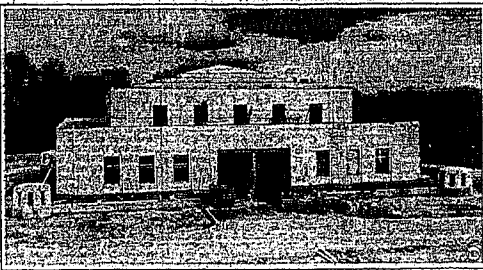

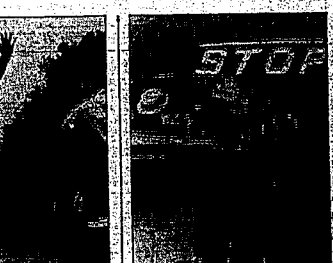

# Your Baby's Health

By DR. MORRIS FREEMAN

For babies, as for growing, the conditions of sleep make a great deal of difference. Everybody knows that two factors most necessary for sound sleep—darkness and quiet—are exceedingly hard to achieve in our modern times.

Use of artificial light has become so universal that it is exceedingly difficult to find places to sleep in which there is complete darkness. Even if they say of light may be sufficient to serve as a stimulus to awaken a sleeper.

It is even more difficult to secure quiet. We have our motor cars for every four or five people, and at least one radio for every family. This means plenty of noise.

In the large cities, the rattles of street cars and the roar of motor cars and elevated trains all serve to make sleep difficult, even for those who can easily adjust themselves to disturbances.

One specialist has even recommended the use of nightcaps to serve the double purpose of keeping the head warm and shutting out noise.

The mattress on which the baby sleeps should be firm, but soft enough to be comfortable.

(Baby should be covered lightly, but well enough to be warm.)

The clothing should be sufficiently loose to permit the body to breathe freely, but tight enough to keep the child from falling out of bed or getting into trouble. Flowery designs are unnecessary for small babies.

If the baby's feet become cold it is no harm enough, if there is too much clothing, or if there is lack of fresh air in the bedroom, the baby's sleep will be disturbed. Most mothers now know that babies ought to have fresh air, but few of them know just how much fresh air the baby should have, and for that matter, may have no idea of what constitutes fresh air.

Babies ought to be put outdoors to sleep as early as two weeks of age. If born in the summer months, they should be taken outside at least six weeks of age.

Since it is difficult for people living in modern city apartments to open the baby outside, the best substitute is to put him dressed as if he were going out, in his car, in front of an open window. Then the door of the room should be closed to prevent a direct breeze or draft from blowing over the baby's head.

face of the baby before it is taken outside to prevent chapping. There is little to be gained if the baby is put outdoors, swaddled in heavy clothing, and its face covered with a veil.

A veil over the baby's face keeps out the beneficial rays of light and keeps in the moisture from breathing. Under such conditions, the child soon becomes damp and uncomfortable.

Among other causes of disordered sleep is obstruction of the nose by mucus, infection, or a cold. Obviously, these conditions will prevent a child from sleeping, and certainly should be called to the prompt attention of a doctor.

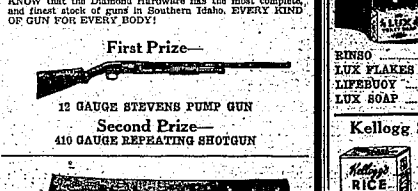
