MAN'S HOBBY IS SNAKE CAPTURE

Strouhan Busy Hunting New Varieties Before Reptiles Hide for Winter

POPPLAR BLUFF, Mo. (AP)—A. Hinrichs' present objective is to capture before winter the 7 known varieties of snakes not represented in his collection of Missouri reptiles.

With a battered hat on his head he wears boots on his feet, he binds most of his time tramping southward in the woods to find a drainage ditch before the flies "hole up" for cold weather.

His collection now includes all sorts of reptiles — rattlesnakes, copperheads, black-necked hoppers, cottonmouths and water moccasins.

Dr. Hinrichs segregated rattlesnakes keeps his snakes under wire screens covering in a long terrace. There they live snugly enough, but just to be on the safe side, the water container is herded off at one end and up and down snakes in the other. Only one snake is a mystery. Before Hinrichs could dig the king snake out of the tangled, one poisonous snake was found.

Further Also Collector

When Hinrichs started collecting snakes he was following in the footsteps of his father, the late Capt. Charles Hinrichs, a Civil War officer. Nearly a quarter of a century ago his large collection was private manager of extensive properties. The son still owns a parcel known to be at least 20 years old. It is the only remnant of his father's collection.

Hinrichs has declined many offers for his snakes, explaining that it is a family hobby. Someday, perhaps, said he, he may turn the whole lot loose in their native haunts.
