TELEVISION WILL AWAIT PROGRESS

Engineers Want Clear Images Before Offering Sets To Public

EDITORS' NOTE: This is the second of a series on television experiments in the Twin Falls area and progress in the development of visual broadcasting.

BY JOHN F. FRANKEH
PHILADELPHIA (UP) — Radio engineers are seeking to develop methods which will produce sets with equal the clarity of home motion pictures before receiving sets are offered for sale to the public.

Rather than place a still imperfect product on the market, the engineers in the Twin Falls area have agreed to continue experiments.

"Visual broadcasting equipment," says one engineer, "will not scan an image to be transmitted from left to right, top to bottom, as does a radio set. The eye is much slower than the picture may be seen."

The impressions of the sensitive television "eye" are then broadcast.

They are received in the same manner and, line by line, a stream of electrons paints the picture on the receiving tube.

"Eye" Travels Swiftly

Actually, the electron light a spot only one-tenth of an inch in diameter. The television "eye" travels at a rate of approximately 10,000 times per second. The speed of the human eye is much slower than the picture may be seen.

The retentive power of the brain, however, allows the visual centers of the brain enable the listener-observer to see the picture.

Cathode ray tubes, in which the picture is projected on the receiving end, have been developed to a degree. First successful transmissions here were made with equipment which carried the picture over a distance of one mile. That is, the "eye" raced across the image 60 times before the picture was completed.

Gradual Improvement

Sixty-one pictures necessarily were small and indistinct. By further experimentation, the size increased gradually. By 1932, 240-line pictures were transmitted, but engineers still

Amplifiers were improved, special tubes designed, new receiving equipment built. Again a satisfactory image—this time containing 345 lines—was transmitted over a distance of 10 miles.

60 Pictures a Second

The number of successive tests were with this equipment, which sends 60 pictures a second, but technicians have decided to push experiments to develop equipment capable of receiving and decoding a picture in three days.

Although a picture as distinct and well-defined as homes wanted, it was decided to continue experiments to estimate the amount of time which will be needed to transmit a picture which will attain this clarity.

Manufacturers' representatives have come to the Twin Falls area to inspect facilities for television equipment which will make it possible to standardize the time it takes to transmit a picture. Plans for the application in operation will take some time, however.

Manufacturers Lengths

For example, sound and pictures are transmitted over two separate wave bands. In one agreement, a television equipment will be constructed to space the television and sound waves in the 1200 kilocycles or 3200 kilocycles apart so that the listener-observer will be able to receive both sound and pictures with the same dial on any make of receiving set.

Technical specifications

which are awaiting the approval of the federal communications commission make it possible to develop sets considerably sooner than had been expected according to engineers.
