Y., Sept. 20 (UP) — President Roosevelt blurted into the thick of his campaign for re-election today with a slashing repudiation of doctrines alien to the principles of American democracy and a sharp counter-attack on his opponents' charges that he is supported by Communists. Addressing the New York state Democratic convention in the first major political speech of his ballot battle with Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas, the President attacked the Republican campaign party for its "do-nothing" attitude in the depression crisis and turned the fire of their Communist charges against them with the assertion the G. O. P.'s lethargy created a "fertile field for Communism."

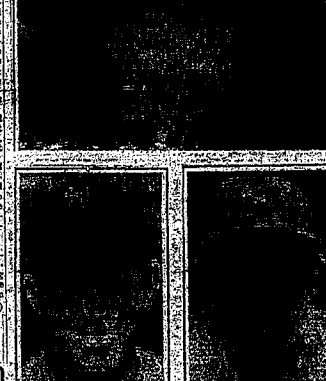

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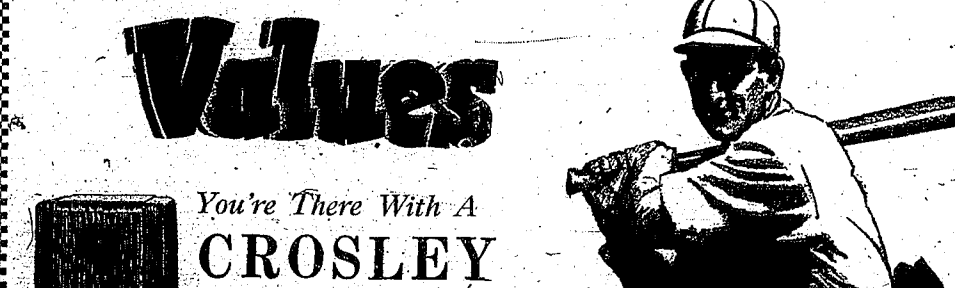

## SENTIMENT GOES WITH TERRYMEN

NEW YORK, Sept. 30 (AP)—The New York Yankees, American League winners, are going to march on to the world championship, according to a poll conducted among baseball writers, by the Chicago Tribune.

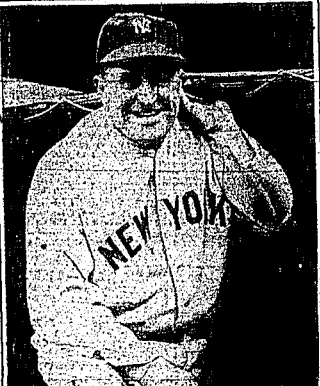
But the New York Giants are sentimental favorites, and the majority of the scribes are playing a hunch that they will win out in a three-game series.

"I'm Looms Large

Virtually all the writers interviewed qualified their nomenclature of a Yankee triumph with an "if" that Hubbell, portable singer of the Giants, comes through with a hit in game three.

Hoyle Stockton, of the St. Louis Post Dispatch, said "it comes to me as an upset if the Giants would win, but this is a year of ups and downs, and why not give the Giant victory and Hubbell, who is a sentimental favorite."

Tommy Bridges is Only Star to Retain an Individual Championship

NEW YORK, Sept. 30 (AP)—Baseball's record keepers faced a big job today in listing the 1936 major league leaders. Only one exception—a complete revision of last year's individual championships—remains to be done.

Tommy Bridges, first-ball pitcher of the Detroit Tigers, was the lone big leaguer to retain his individual title, having pitched out 273 innings, the all-time record.

Walter Johnson, pitcher of the Washington Senators, batted the 1935 American league lead in runs, replacing Vesley Evers of the Boston Red Sox who was tops in 1935 with 25 victories in the "most games won" category.

Manago Fans 237

Van Lingle Mungler of the Brooklyn Dodgers fanned 237 men to replace Dizzy Dean who set the pace last year in the National League. The big right-hander also led in bases on balls with 857 strikeouts.

Carl Hubbell, voted the most valuable player in the National League by a poll conducted by Sporting News, monopolized other pitching honors in the league, his 317 innings and six defeats displacing Bill Lee of the Chicago Cubs as the leading pitcher, and his 181 strikeouts topping all other hurlers.

Hubbell led in the strikeout category with 324 strikeouts last year in 282 games won.

Walter Jagers

In the batting department, Paul Waner of the Pittsburgh Pirates, is the new National League champion with an average of .373. It was the third time Paul has set the pace in hitting, and he replaced his teammate, Floyd (Red) Vaughn who led last year with .356. Mel Ott succeeded Walter Jagers as home run king in his circuit with a total of 53, one less than Jagers' 485 mark.

Applying Total American League averages, Jimmie Foxx of the Philadelphia Athletics ran away with the American League batting race, his average of .387 and home 58 runs being the record mark set by Rudy Meyer of the Washington Senators, who had 49 homers.

Announced by Durale Leu, manager of the Yankees gave him the honor, Hoot Grebb, manager of the Red Sox, led 1935 with a total of 36.

Repper Martin of the Cardinals hit the most home runs, 31, in the St. Louis Browns had 34 thefts.

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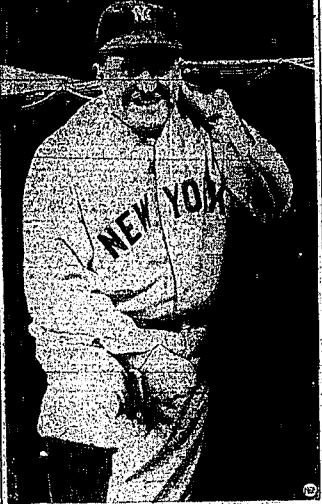
